

Check, check, testing...

Looking back to my days as a student, I remember parading down to the gymnasium for special programs referred to as "lyceums." The programs would typically begin with the principal taking an old microphone held together with athletic tape. He'd flip on the power switch, clear his throat and with a deep voice, utter, "check, check, testing." If you say "check, check, testing" today in our schools you'll likely become involved in a lengthy discussion about assessment strategies. From a series of brief calibrated checks to the laboriously long state testing program, our business is rapidly becoming one of check, check, testing.

From a positive standpoint, the more than twenty years of national and statewide emphasis on standards and assessment has improved educational practice. It has resulted in more consistent instruction through the implementation of a standardized curriculum and produced a uniform set of results providing "accountability" to parents and taxpayers. Simply put, a more focused curriculum with proven methods to monitor progress has resulted in an increase in student achievement.

The downside of this movement is the all too familiar obsession with and blind reliance on the results. Politicians and policy-makers love to twist the data to demonstrate the "failure of our schools," or the "success of a new program." From a recent national news story about how our country has fallen farther behind Shanghi, China to those in our state government using the data to support vouchers or district "sanctions," the testing fever has reached a boiling point. As an example, it is widely known the most reliable predictor of school-wide performance remains connected to the percentage of test-taking students who live in poverty. Therefore, the Chinese government offers up the test scores from the affluent urban center of Shanghi as representative of their nation while leaving out millions of rural poor children in eastern China. This would be like the United States sending in the results from the Twin Cities Metro area in Minnesota as being representative of our entire nation and leaving out inner-city Detroit, the Appalachian Mountains and rural Mississippi. It has become silly.

Locally, the positive effect of the standards and assessments movement has been an increased attention to detail within our curriculum and the use of assessment results to help individual students and teachers. The looming "black cloud" or potential negative impact is the ever-increasing focus on standardization often comes at the expense of opportunities for more unstructured learning. Given our mission of "igniting creativity, innovation and excellence," we are wise to proceed with caution: caution that an over-emphasis on standardization may result in "extinguishing" creativity and innovation rather than igniting them.

As I reflect on my years in the education profession and consider the amount of testing we now include in our programming, I recall the words of Steve Fredrick, the former superintendent for the School District of Melrose-Mindoro. Steve, originally from the great state of Iowa, would fondly offer his "assessment" of the testing movement by suggesting "hogs don't get fatter by weighing 'em." In keeping with Steve's homespun wisdom, I offer we continue making wise use of our assessment tools and perfecting our curriculum all with the balance and wisdom necessary to nourish our children more often than we measure them. Check, check, testing....





Who may participate in open enrollment?

•Students in 5-year-old kindergarten to grade 12 may apply to participate in open enrollment.

•Open enrollment for prekindergarten, 4-year-old kindergarten and early childhood education is limited. Parents should call their resident school districts to find out if their preschool-aged children qualify for open enrollment.

How and when may parents apply?

The open enrollment application period for the 2014-15 school year is from February 3-April 30, 2014. The application period closes at 4:00 p.m. on April 30, 2014. Late applications will not be accepted for any reason.

Parents may apply in one of two ways: •On-line (recommended) at

http://sms.dpi.wi.gov/sms psctoc.

•Although on-line application is recommended, paper applications may be obtained from the Department of Public Instruction and must be delivered (hand-delivery is recommended) to the nonresident school district.

Important open enrollment dates

February 3 – April 30, 2014 – Parents must submit applications online or directly to the nonresident school district.

June 6, 2014 – Nonresident school districts must mail notices of approval or denial. If the application is approved, the school district must notify the parents of the specific school or program to which the student is assigned. If the application is denied, parents have 30 days to file an appeal.

June 13, 2014 – Resident districts must notify applicants if the application is denied. If the application is denied, parents have 30 days to file an appeal.

June 27, 2014 – Parents of accepted applicants must notify the nonresident district if the student will attend the nonresident district in the 2014-15 school year. If the parent fails to make this notification, the nonresident district may refuse to allow the student to attend the district.


