

Example of a Working Bibliography Page

A Working Bibliography lists all of the sources you found when researching your topic. You may decide not to use all of these sources when completing your project. Use the example below as a guide to formatting your working bibliography page. Note the following:

- The page is numbered in the upper right hand corner following your last name.
- The title Working Bibliography is centered at the top.
- Sources are listed in alphabetical order.
- Sources are double spaced like the research paper.
- Sources that wrap to the next line are indented ½ inch (hanging indent) on the 2nd line.
