

Reading - Mrs. Schultz

January will begin the 6th grade unit on Social Issues. During this unit students will learn about discrimination, do

research on social issues, read newspaper articles, and read one or more novels dealing with race relations in the mid-1900s. The unit begins with mini-investigations on important events and people of the Civil Rights Era. We will look critically at some of the actions and opinions of people during the Civil Rights Movement and those in the novels, revisiting and connecting with the types of conflicts we explored in Touching Spirit Bear. Another aspect of this unit is to realize the diversity of human experience and see this period of our history through the eyes of the newspaper reporters, people who were living at the time, and the characters in our novels. Students will also be working with words again this month. Happy 2018!

Science - Mrs. Jarosh

I'd like to introduce Mr. Randy Dammon, who will be my long term substitute while I am on maternity leave beginning January 8th. Mr. Dammon is a retired physics/physical science teacher who is excited to share his knowledge with your child. He has subbed for me multiple times this year and loves the questions that 6th graders ask! During his time here, students will be exploring electricity and magnetism!

The learning outcomes are listed below as guiding questions we will look to answer:

What are the properties of a magnet?

How do magnetic poles interact?

How can an atom behave like a magnet?

How can magnets be changed?

How is earth like a bar magnet?

What are the effects of Earth's magnetic field?

How do electric charges interact?

What is an electric field?

How is an electric current produced?

How are conductors different from insulators?

What causes electric charges to flow in a current?

How does resistance affect current?

What are the basic features of an electric current?

How do you calculate electric power?





English - Mrs. Buisman

In January, sixth grade English students will continue to focus on argument writing. Students will research to find evidence that supports their claim on a given topic. Students will continue to work on producing quality writing.



Spanish - Mrs. Tofstad

¡Feliz Año Nuevo! Sixth graders are in full swing this month in Spanish class. We are starting a new unit where we will learn to share what we like to do or what we dislike to do. We will also begin to learn to share our likes and dislikes of different foods. ¿Te gusta comer pizza? Grammatically, we will focus on the verb gustar-to like, as well as the verb serto be. For many Mexican families, as well as many latino families, the holidays continue with the celebration of Día de los Reyes Magos, celebrated on January 6th, and Día de los Candelarios, celebrated February 2nd. We will briefly investigate some cultural practices of both of these two celebrations. Wishing you the very best as we kick off the new year! Lets make it a good one!



Math - Mrs. Jehn Regular Math

We will complete Chapter 4 in the first few days of January - Areas of Polygons. Students will have learned the areas of parallelograms, triangles, trapezoids, and composite figures and will work with polygons in the coordinate plane.

Chapter 5 follows which includes ratios, ratio tables, rates, unit rates, comparing ratio and rates, percents, and converting measures. This is one of my favorite chapters because it is so applicable to their lives now and forever. Who doesn't want to find the best deal or price and save the most money? When was the last time you had to tip a server or hairdresser? Ask your child to shop

with you to help you find unit price, compare purchases, and find the best buy - happy shopping and saving!

Accelerated Math

In December students completed Chapter 5. Please continue to encourage your child to help you figure out how to tip someone, how to find the discounted price using coupons, or how to find the better buy when comparing similar products of different brands. These are great life skills to have!

Student began Chapter 6 before the break and will finish in the first few weeks of January. The title of Chapter 6 is Integers and the Coordinate Plane. For most students understanding positive and negative

numbers comes easily because they have grown up seeing positive and negative temperatures. Later this year, when students learn to use the basic math operations with these integers, this concept becomes a little more difficult and students really have to extend their understanding of integers.

We will continue into Chapter 7 by the end of January which brings us to Equations and Inequalities including writing and solving one-variable equations with the four basic operations and writing equations with two variables. Students will also learn to write, graph, and solve inequalities using the four basic math operations.







Reading -Mrs. Rochester

7th graders will be finishing their dystopian books at the end of January. Many of


the students have enjoyed reading these books and have read more than one during class! Many of the books chosen are part of a series, so if the students enjoyed the first book, they can continue reading the series on their own. Instead of quizzes during this unit, the students wrote in their journals about specific topics related to dystopias. The students also participated in many meaningful discussions with others reading the same book as well as other dystopian books. They discussed many different aspects of the book including character motives and development, theme, and plot. As a culmination of this unit, the

students will have a choice of many different projects to complete to show what they learned throughout the novel. The students will be given class time to work on these; however, they may need to finish at home. The students will also continue working with Greek and Latin roots. 7th graders should also be reading at least 25 pages between reading classes

Social Studies - Mr. Mahlum

In January we will look at some of the countries found in the book titled <u>Gathering Fireflies</u>. Each student will draw a map of one of the countries and label many of the important geographical features. During the last couple of weeks of the month students will continue examining the different Amendments to our

Constitution. We will focus our attention on the voting rights Amendments during this unit.



Science - Mr. Baker

Before winter break, we finally started talking about genetics! Students have also been working on a family pedigree project where they need to track one trait through their family tree. This is a great time to be talking to your kids about any interesting family history you may have. Genetics will continue through January and students will be modeling genetic inheritance using marshmallows and then testing their tongues to determine how likely they are to enjoy broccoli! Mixed in, we will also be taking a winter trip to the school forest to do some cross country skiing,

snowshoeing, and winter forest ecology.

English - Mrs. Martinson

In January, the 7th graders will begin the informative writing piece. We will start with a week's worth of work on background knowledge on The Vietnam War and the Hmong fighting in the Vietnam War. Then each student will be assigned a topic related to **Gathering Fireflies** and/or The Vietnam War. Part of the note taking process is figuring out key words to search and finding appropriate web sites to search for material. Ms. Diederich has put together a web page on the library page to help students get started with their searching. We will spend a couple of weeks taking notes for the essay students will be writing in February. We continue with our parts of speech review by

taking verb notes, practicing nouns, pronouns, adjectives, and compound sentences. This work is on-going all year long.







Math - Mr. Jones

Regular Math

We will be working through Chapter 5: Ratios and Proportions. Common Core Standards for Chapter 5:

*Find unit rates associated with ratios of fractions, areas, and other quantities in like or different units *Decide whether two quantities are proportional using ratio tables and graphs *Identify the constant of proportionality in tables, graphs, equations, diagrams, and verbal descriptions *Explain what a point (x,y) means

on a proportional graph in context,

particularly (0,0) and (1,r), where r is the unit rate.

*Use proportionality to solve ratio problems.

Advanced Math

We will be covering Chapter 4: Graphing and Writing Linear Equations. Common Core Standards for Chapter 4:

*Use similar triangles to explain why the slope is the same between any two points on a line. *Graph proportional relationships, interpreting the unit rate as the slope.

*Compare proportional relationships represented in different ways.

*Derive y = mx and y = mx + b




Project & Inquiry -Mrs. Ebert

After a short stretch of class discussions and a few worksheets, the students are happier now that they are constructing mechanisms. They are learning how to use their VEX materials which include an array of metal pieces, shafts/axles, hardware, gears, sprockets, wrenches, etc. Unlike many "kits," the combinations and applications with these VEX materials are endless. In seventh grade, students utilize them to learn about mechanisms.

mechanism, the team endures a little question-and-answer session with Mrs. Ebert to review important concepts. Then each student documents the construction and its features on his/ her iPad. The result is an

impressive Pages document! Ask your son/daughter to share it with you! Construction of the ten mechanisms will continue into January.











Math - Mrs. Bentzen

Regular Math (Chapter 4) We started

Chapter 4 called "Graphing and

Writing Linear Equations" on December 7. We will finish this chapter on January 23rd.

The objectives for Chapter 4:

*understand that lines represent solutions of linear equations

*graph linear equations using x-y tables

*find slopes of lines by using graphs, tables, and two points on the line

*identify parallel and perpendicular lines using slopes

*write and graph proportional relationships

*find slopes and y-intercepts of graphs of linear equations

*graph linear equations written in slope-intercept form

*graph linear equations written in standard form

*write equations of lines in slopeintercept form

*write equations of lines using the slope and a point and by using two points

Algebra (Chapter 6)

We finished Chapter 5 (Writing Linear Equations) on January 12th. We will take a Semester Exam on Chapters 1-5 on January 18th (good practice for high school). We will then learn how to solve and graph linear inequalities (Chapter 6).

The objectives of Chapter 6:

*write, solve, and graph one-step and multi-step inequalities

*learn to reverse an inequality sign when multiplying or dividing by a negative number

*solve and graph compound inequalities using "and" and "or"

*solve absolute value equations using "or"

*solve and graph absolute value inequalities using "and" and "or"

*graph linear inequalities in two variables

Art - Ms. Lotspaih

The 8th grade class has been very busy in the art room! After completing their portfolios, students worked with oil pastel to create an abstract drawing that symbolized their favorite quote. This was a wonderful way for students to express their individuality! They recently completed designs for t-

shirts they will wear to 8th Grade Promotion. The 8th grade class will be voting on the top three designs and the winner will have their artwork printed on t-shirts for everyone to wear. This is an incredible opportunity for students to display their creations.





Social Studies - Ms. Morgan

We will be beginning our research project. This year students will be selecting a historical topic of interest to them. The only requirements will be that the topic must be at least 25 years old. Additionally, the topic must match the qualities someone receiving the Medal of Honor must meet: commitment, courage, sacrifice, integrity, patriotism, and citizenship. Upon completing their research in February, students will be producing a short iBook on his/her topic.





Reading - Ms. Friell

Independent Reading: Students should be reading independently at home on a daily basis (a minimum of 20 minutes). They are also given 20 minutes to read their choice books during every Reading class. Students learned how to use a variety of websites to find titles that interest them and titles within their lexile range. Please ask your son/daughter to tell you about what he/ she is reading!

Journal Entries: Students are required to complete journal entries (in class). These journal entries are saved in google docs and turned in via google classroom. That way they are never lost and can be used as a reference throughout the year. They will write about their own books and the class read-aloud. Journal entries ask them to address specific aspects of the books (story elements, literary devices, mood, tone, style, etc.).

Vocabulary: In addition to "A Word A Day" (from the book 100 Words Every Middle Schooler Should Know, 100 Words To Make You Sound

Smart, and www.englishcompanion.com), students continue their study of Greek and Latin roots. We also work with new words in the fiction and non-fiction we read as a class.

All of the 8th graders finished the novel Freak the Mighty by Rodman Philbrick before winter break. In January 8th graders will write an essay about the novel. The essay will address many of the 8th grade ELA standards including analyzing theme, characters, plot, and how a filmed production "stays faithful to or departs from the text."

English - Mrs. Sackett

Winter Break was needed, and now we are back and ready to continue to improve our writing. Before break, we were in the middle of working on our research papers. We will continue where we left off in the writing process and eventually get to the point of publishing our work. First, we will use our notes to complete the outline. Next, we will draft and revise. Finally, we will edit and publish. We are learning to start with a strong thesis to guide the rest of the paper. Part of the process of writing this paper is learning about and using proper parenthetical citations to credit the sources from our research.

Additionally, we will continue to review and learn more about parts of speech. The next part of speech we will learn is the adverb. As always, we will continue to practice writing compound and complex sentences.

Science - Ms. Smith-Waller

Happy New Year! As we completed 2017 we worked on our Geologic Timescale Project, which we will finish up this month. In 2018 we will continue to study Earth's changing surface focusing on weathering and erosion. When we finish looking at Earth's surface, we will learn about what is inside the Earth as we study about plate tectonics, earthquakes, volcanoes, and mineral and rock classifications. Glad to have you all back in the classroom!

Unit Objectives:

- 1. Describe the unique geological features in Wisconsin (moraines, drumlins, drift-less area, etc).
- 2. Describe the events in Earth's history and identify the geological time periods in Earth's history.

Future Objectives

- 3. Describe the processes of plate tectonics, the types of plate boundaries, sea-floor spreading, and subduction and explain the evidence of why each of these processes happen.
- 4. Understand how plate tectonics can cause earthquakes, volcanoes, and mountain ranges and use data to predict these events.

After a fantastic fall weather wise, we are beginning to focus on our net wall strategies as well as some archery and classroom time. During our classroom time, we will be paring up with the one and only Mrs. Dederich for some digital citizenship lessons.



General Music 6 "Keyboards and More" - Mrs. Glasel

The students have been working on learning how to read music on the grand staff. They have begun playing two fingers at the same time and are even playing both hands together in isolated spots. They are learning about intervals (2nd, 3rd, 4th) and the difference between melodic and harmonic intervals.

They are now using the GarageBand app to create a composition using pre-recorded loops. They will work on getting the loops to sound good together in a musical way through balance, layering, and good compositional techniques. Even though we are not writing the music, we are still learning how to arrange the music to make a great sounding composition. It is also helping them learn how to use more of GarageBand's features.

Our Music Alive magazine article this month focus on Vinyl Records and older types of recorded music.

General Music 7 "Guitars and Musicals" - Mrs. Glasel


The students are continuing to practice songs with 4 strings on the guitar. Later this month, they will learn some very simple one finger/three string chords (C and G7 chords).

The students have completed watching the musical <u>Fiddler on the Roof</u>. They found the story to be interesting, sad, and even funny in parts. They learned that the Jewish culture in the early 1900s is very different than ours, and there were a lot of struggles. Later in the month, we will will jump to the US culture in the 1950s with <u>Bye</u>, <u>Bye Birdie</u>.

General Music 8 "Keyboards and Guitars" - Mrs. Glasel

The students are playing at different levels depending if they were new to my class and learning guitar or keyboard for the first time or have taken my general music classes before and are at a more advanced level. To express what each group is doing would be difficult, so I encourage you to ask your child what they are learning specifically on their instrument.



Bullying typically peaks in the middle grades, as tweens try to figure out where they fit in with their peers. These ideas will help your middle schooler know what bullying can look like—and learn how to be a part of the solution.

Recognize

Ask your child if he has seen bullying at school. Discuss how bullying comes in many forms, including spreading rumors, making threats, or leaving someone out on purpose. Even if your tween hasn't seen anyone trip or punch a fellow student, he might realize that the kid who is frequently called names or whispered about is being bullied.

Stand up

Children who are bullied need to know they have someone on their side. If your middle grader witnesses bullying, he can calmly step in by saying something like "That's not funny" or "You're being mean." Or he might ignore the bully and address the target: "Let's sit at another table" or "I think your shoes are cool."

Report

Tweens may be afraid that bullying will get worse if they tell an adult. But explain that school staff can often resolve an issue without revealing who reported it. For example, if your child sees a kid knock papers out of someone's hands on the bus, he could alert the driver. At school, he can privately tell a teacher or the principal about bullying—and encourage other students to do so, too.

Better public speaking

Public speaking is part of school life, from giving class presentations to leading team meetings. Here are ways your tween can boost her skills and confidence.

Find an audience. Practicing will calm her nerves. She might give her speech in front of a mirror, present it to family members, or even use a pet as her audience.

Get rid of "extras." Pesky filler words such as *like* and *um* can slip into your tween's sentences without her realizing it. Suggest that she record her speech and play it back, making a tally mark each time she hears an unnecessary word. Then, she could focus on reducing the number of marks each time she practices.



Middle Years

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No problem!

When your tween has a problem, how she handles it can determine whether she overcomes it or remains stuck. Help her see problems as opportunities in disguise with these steps.

Let it in perspective. Knowing that problems are a normal part of life may keep your middle grader from feeling stressed out by them. Share a similar problem you had at her age (forgetting about a big test) or recently (a disagreement with a friend). Then, explain how you resolved it.



2. Consider options. Encourage your tween to investigate solutions instead of ignoring a problem. Say she loses a library book. She might call the library rather than letting fines pile up. She may be surprised to find they will give her an extension to look for the book—or that the cost of replacing it is less than she thought.

3. Reframe the situation. Put-

ting a positive spin on a problem will help her solve it. Instead of thinking, "I hate it when Crystal cancels our plans," she could tell herself, "Now I've got time to finish that book I'm in the middle of." \mathbb{F}_{3}

Keep a learning journal

My older daughter recently mentioned she's keeping a "learning diary" for her college classes. Is that something that could help my middle schooler?

A learning diary is simply a place for students to reflect on their studies. Keeping one is a great way for your tween to think more about what she learns.



Suggest that your middle grader get a notebook she likes and label each entry with the class and date. She might write about topics that interest her, like how a novel she read in English helped her understand an important period in history. She could also record questions and ideas to investigate, such as a science experiment to try.

Encourage your girls to share their journals from time to time—your younger daughter will get a glimpse of what goes on in college!

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Parent

Connect without electronics

My son Eli got in the habit of playing video games the minute he got home from school. When I tried to talk to him, his eyes stayed glued to the screen, and he barely responded.

So I made a new rule: no screens for the first hour after we all get home from school and work. That way, we can reconnect and talk about our day. Sometimes we play a

quick card game or tell jokes before I start dinner and Eli does homework.

Next, we're going to try something "radical"—an entire device-free evening.

If we need the tablet or computer for homework or our jobs, that's okay. But "recreational use" is off limits for that pight. I have Eli will see that family company.

reational use" is off-limits for that night. I hope Eli will see that family comes first—and that it's possible to survive for a few hours without electronics.

Community service for tweens

Being involved in the community can teach your middle grader compassion for others and give him a sense of belonging. Consider these tips:

■ Start by volunteering together. Community centers, places of worship, and your local United Way can suggest family-friendly opportunities. You and your child might sort donated clothing for a homeless shelter or bake cookies for a charity bake sale.

■ When your middle grader is ready to volunteer on his own, he could ask his

school counselor about options. Perhaps he'll be paired with a student who has special needs so they can read together in the school library. Or he may join in a park or stream cleanup day.

Tip: Encourage your tween to keep

a record of his volunteer experience that includes supervisors' contact information and his dates of service. This will come in handy when he applies for jobs or programs in high school.
