

Grade Level News...



Reading - Mrs. Schultz

This last month of school students are participating in a FREE READ genre study. This means they can

choose any fiction book from any genre. Students will be completing a contract about their novel. There will be three checkpoints scattered throughout the month of May to ensure students are keeping up with their reading. At each checkpoint, they create a reading goal and also a choice activity about their novel. This information can be found on a cherry colored page in their Reading binder.

Sixth graders will also work with prefixes and suffixes, continuing to build our vocabularies. Close reading will be sprinkled throughout the month, with students working on using higher level thinking skills and digging deeper into texts. Through the end of the school year we will continue to be teamed with English, with a focus on parts of speech and poetry.

English - Mr. Tashner

I can not believe that it is already May!! WOW! Students have been working very diligently on their Human Rights books. They will be turning finishing them up by the middle of this month, and it will be their last paper for the year. We will continue to stay combined with Reading and will finish up pronouns and review the three parts of speech we learned this year. We will also be starting simple sentences.


Science - Mrs. Jarosh

As our 6th graders enter the final month of their 6th grade year, we will continue to be busy in science class by wrapping up our Motion, Forces and Simple Machines unit. Our final unit will focus on Ecology and the environment. Students will be learning about biomes, species interactions, and population dynamics. Thank you all for a great year in science!

The learning targets for the unit are:

1. Discuss how organisms meet their needs

- 2. Explain why populations change in size and what factors limit population growth.
- 3. Identify adaptations of organisms and explain how they help organisms survive.
- 4. Explain how organisms interact with their environment.
- 5. Identify and explain the three types of symbiotic relationships.
- 6. Understand how energy flows through an ecosystem.





Project & Inquiry - Mrs. Ebert

In P&I, students often hear the phrase it's about the "ing" not the "thing" to remind them that the process is more important than the product. As students completed their first challenge - their cardboard arcade games - it was important for them to document their problem solving experiences in their Learning Log (google document). Additionally, all students completed a self-assessment after experiencing all other students' games. To date, their P&I grade is comprised largely of their willingness to articulate their experiences in this Learning Log.

We've lightened up our load, moving from cardboard to paper for construction material. Students learned to construct eight different paper mechanisms which can be used to generate movement. They've created a book to showcase these pop-up mechanisms, and now they're applying their paper engineering skills to develop a more deliberate, creative, purposeful project. As usual, details for the project can be found on Edmodo.

As we make our way to the end of the year, we'll combine our big and small paper engineering skills with concepts learned in science. Students will work in assigned teams design and construct a paper roller coaster within a given set of constraints ("rules") which will accomplish a specific goal regarding duration of travel. We'll wrap up the year with a little light-hearted roller-coaster competition.





Social Studies - Mrs. Jeranek

It's hard to believe how quickly this year has gone! Students have been exposed to many new information on ancient civilizations throughout the course of 6th grade. I hope they have enjoyed their journey back to 1000 BCE as much as I have!

World Religions will continue to be our unit in May! Our focus will be Acceptance and Respect of religious beliefs throughout the world, so we better understand historical conflicts and values of others. We continue to learn through various literature and informational texts and on-line sources. By the end of the unit, students will have a World Religions booklet that covers six categories for each religion: origin, holy book, symbols, place/s or worship, festivals, and beliefs.





Math - Mrs. Jehn Regular Math

We are in Chapter 9 learning about statistical measures including mean, median, and mode as well as quartiles, interquartiles, range, mean absolute deviation. The concepts of measures of variation and mean absolute deviation will be new to students and may bring back fond memories of a statistics course you might have taken years ago. These will be difficult topics and very abstract for 6th grade minds.

These skills are necessary for us to start Chapter 10 which is the last chapter of the book and how we will spend the end of May. This chapter is all about data displays including stem-and-leaf plots, histograms, boxand-whisker plots. They will need to use what they learned about

measures of center, measures of variation, and statistical questions in the previous chapter to describe the center, spread, and shape of the displays.

It's been a fabulous year with students striving to learn despite rigorous work and higher level math skills being required. They have really excelled and done a wonderful job. Enjoy the summer!

Accelerated Math

Students will be working through Chapter 14 in May reviewing topics such as solving and graphing ratios, rates, and proportions so they can work with slope and direct variation. We will finish this chapter by the end of May and will be just beginning Chapter 15 titled Percents. Have your student work with you this

summer to determine percent mark ups, discounts, and simple interest which are all skills from this chapter and for life.

They have done a tremendous job this year digging in to tackle difficult problems requiring high level thinking skills. They will be finishing the second half of the 7th grade book next year and then all of the 8th grade book. The skills will continue to become more difficult but their effort, perseverance, and willingness to learn will pay off for them. Keep up the great work!







Reading -Mrs. Rochester During the month of May,

During the month of May students will be finishing writing their

script and filming their documentaries (on iMovie) related to a specific environmental issue to follow up their environmental issues book study. The students were put into groups based on a common environmental issue. Be sure to ask your child about their

research topic! 7th graders will also be finishing up the school year with an SSR (self choice) book study. The students have already chosen books and started reading. There are questions about specific elements of novels that the students will be answering about their book. The students are expected to complete these questions with each section of the book they are reading. The students are expected to read every night in order to finish the book. When the students are in class, they will be discussing

their books with peers as well as discussing with me.



English - Mrs. Martinson

In May, the 7th graders will be completing their third and final writing piece which is the argument. The students are creating a Google slide show and will present their argument to the rest of the class. The slide show will include their claim, two reasons of support with evidence and an expert quote. They will also include a video clip to support their side. The last part of speech that we will work on this year is adjectives. Finally students will be assessed on compound sentences. We have been working on compound sentences all year. Keep reading and writing over the summer! Enjoy!

Social Studies - Mr. Mahlum

In May the students will focus on state and local government. We will first take a look at how Wisconsin is set up and who are the people making decisions for our state. Then, we will turn our attention to some of our local governments. We will learn how La Crosse County operates as well as the Village of West Salem.

Art - Ms. Engen

The 7th graders have been working with scale while making clay sculptures. They also have been increasing their observational drawing skills by practicing various "right-brain" type drawing activities. We are looking forward to keeping the Middle School tradition alive by painting wall blocks in May!







Math - Mr. Jones

In 7th grade regular math and advanced math we will be finishing Chapter 10: Probability and Statistics. Common Core Standards for Chapter 10:


- *Understand representative samples and populations.
- *Use samples to draw inferences about populations.
- *Compare two populations from random samples using measures of center and variability.
- *Understand that probability is the likelihood of an event occurring, expressed as a number from 0 to 1.
- *Develop probability models and use them to find probabilities.
- *Find the probabilities of compound events.

After the school forest campout week we will be finishing the year with a project creating polyhedrons. Be on the lookout for this cool project coming home.



Science - Mr. Baker

April went by quickly! We have been going through the various groups of animals and looking at body structures. As promised, we smelled up the science room when dissected worms, crayfish, and frogs! Not everyone enjoys these days, but it is a great experience and the kids did awesome! As we close up the groups of animals, we will be spending most of our time with environmental science topics as we lead up to the campout!



Students should have brought home a packet of information, including if they are going Monday through Wednesday or Wednesday through Friday. We will talk a lot about what things to pack as we get closer and know what the weather will bring.











English - Mrs. Sackett

The days in 8th grade are quickly winding down. In English, we are

wrapping up the year by enjoying Mark Twain's classic novel, The Adventures of Tom Sawyer. This will be a great way to end the year as we will appreciate the lasting piece of literature and have discussions about the complex characters and themes we discover in the text. Along with reading this book, we will also be completing our review of the parts of speech by creating a parts of speech comic book. Save the comic sections of your newspapers and send them to school with your student to help with the comic book.

Mrs. Bentzen Regular Math (parts of Chpts 8 & 10, Inequalities, Placement Test)

We will explore the concepts of volume and surface area of cylinders and cones. We will work on writing and reading scientific notation. We will also learn the basics of solving and graphing inequalities.

We will MAP test on May 11 and 12. We will take an algebra placement test (dates: May 23-26) to be used as another measure of whether your son/daughter is ready for Algebra I next year. We will end the year making flexagons. Very cool stuff!!!!

Algebra (Chapter 9, parts of Chpts 10 & 11, Final Exam)

We will identify, classify, add, subtract, multiply, and factor polynomials. We will solve quadratic equations using square roots and the quadratic formula. We will compare linear, exponential and quadratic equations. We will simplify radicals.

We will MAP test on May 11. We will take our algebra final (Chpts 6-10) on May 25. This will give your son/daughter the experience of taking final exams at the high school. We will end the year making flexagons. Very cool stuff!!!

Social Studies - Ms. Morgan

May is a busy month for 8th grade students. Among the many activities they will take part in is the annual Civil War Day on Friday, May 19.

This experience provides the students with the opportunity to "live" the lives of soldiers during the year 1863. With the help of local reenactors, students drill and enjoy a Civil War era meal enjoyed by soldiers of the day. Students will also learn about Civil War related topics including: life of Billy Yank, life of Johnny Reb, Manual of Arms, History of Battle Flags (including a detailed look at the history of the Confederate flag beyond 1865), medical care, and women of the war. It is a culminating activity for a look at the tumultuous time that nearly tore our country apart.

Students will learn:

*causes of the Civil War

*the long lasting impact of the Civil
War on our country's history

*key events of the war that nearly
tore our country apart

*what life was like during the war
from a variety of different view
points

*how our country was put back together following the war

Science - Ms. Smith-Waller

We will continue to learn and understand about the inside of the Earth, and the forces within that shape the land and create events such as earthquakes, volcanoes, mountains, and sea- floor spreading. We plan to map the ocean floor, identify the mid- ocean ridge, and understand how and why the Earth is constantly changing. After our study of plate tectonics, the 8th grade science students are ready for their "mini" chemistry unit to review the structure of an atom and the periodic table of elements. We will use this knowledge to begin learning about the various types and characteristics of rocks and minerals. Students will learn to identify more than 30 types of rocks and minerals. This is often a very exciting and interactive unit. 8th grade students are welcome to share any rock or mineral collections that they may have at home.

We will be following these essential learning outcomes...

- Understand how plate tectonics can cause earthquakes, volcanoes, and mountain ranges and use data to predict these events.
- 2. Understand the structure of an atom and be able to draw a simple model of an atom.
- Identify the elements that make up certain rocks and minerals and identify 50+ rocks and minerals found in nature.
- 4. Understand what causes the rock cycle and describe how the rock cycle works.







Spanish - Profesora Tofstad

The Spanish 8 students have been working on "Mi Comida Favorite" or My Favorite Food. We have worked on how to share what we like: Me gusta and what we do not like: No me gusta. Students have been working very hard on conjugating AR verbs as well as ER and IR verbs. We have even tackled the irregular verb of hacer. We will conclude this unit with a project based assessment due the first week of May.

Right now, your eighth grader should be able to understand the following paragraph:

Para el desayuno, yo bebo jugo de naranja. Me gustan los huevos y el cereal. Para el almuerzo como el sándwich y bebo el agua. Tomo el agua porque es nutritivo. Cuando tengo hambre, yo tengo ganas de comer la fruta. Me gustan mucho las bananas y las uvas. No me gustan las manzanas. Cuando tengo sed, yo tengo ganas de beber el refresco.

The food unit transitions into our family unit called "En Mi Familia" or In My Family. The goals for this unit is to talk about their families. They will learn to share about

their family member's characteristics, ages, likes and dislikes. Your student will learn how to express possession, give dates, and make comparisons.

The 8th grade students have worked hard during this trimester and should be proud of what they have learned.

Reading - Ms. Friell

During April 8th graders studied media literacy. This began with the interpretation of WWII era propaganda while reading The Diary of Anne Frank (the play version). They learned about persuasive techniques and analyzed different types of media. Specifically they focused on the following strategies: testimonial/ethos, plain folks, bandwagon, glittering generalities, and logos. They identified these techniques in current commercials and magazine ads.

We will read <u>The Giver</u> in May. They will analyze many aspects of this award winning, thought-provoking novel by Lois Lowry. Parents are encouraged to read this novel and discuss it with their son/daughter.



Eighth Grade Promotion Night

Eighth graders will be honored on Thursday, June 1, at a ceremony celebrating their promotion to ninth grade. The ceremony begins at 7:00pm in the Heider Center. All families and friends are cordially invited to attend.

Attire for all 8th graders will be the 8th grade class shirt. Please note that all students will participate in the ceremony. If promotion is in doubt, the certificate will not be signed, but all students will participate.

Please join us for the celebratory event.





The students are continuing to work on their keyboard skills as they are learning sharps and flats (the black keys). They also are switching back and forth between different hand positions (C, G, and Middle C positions). They will also learn a few simple song that include eighth notes.

The students are now working on a GarageBand project, which takes a different approach by creating audio books. They should bring in a sound books, from which they will create a list of sounds that they need and sample their sounds in GarageBand. Then each student will read the book into the app, add the sound effects, and add music that is fitting for the mood of the story.

Our Music Alive magazine articles this month focus on the importance of Sun Records Studio, history of the music of video games, and summer music festivals.

General Music 7 "Guitars and Musicals" - Mrs. Glasel

These students are continuing to work on the guitar by using the first 5 strings as well as learning how to play guitar music using tablature. Two new concepts this month will include learning how to play pick-up notes in incomplete measures and sliding the hand up to 5th fret.

The students are watching the musical West Side Story, which is a 1950s story that takes place on the West Side of New York. It is based on the Shakespeare play Romeo and Juliet, and the students are learning about the similarities between the two stories.

General Music 8 "Keyboards and Guitars" - Mrs. Glasel

After the students finish their songs on their chosen instrument for the trimester, they will be performing in a mini-recital for the class and finishing off the year with a trimester test. They will also be completing a written paper on a video they will watch on information about their instrument.

Students who are on their 3rd trimester of their instrument are learning about:

Guitar - bass accompaniment; dynamic levels Keyboard - major scales and many different hand positions

Students who are on their 2nd trimester of their instrument are learning:

Guitar - pitches on the 5th string; reading tablature Keyboard - middle C position and continuing to get comfortable with the black keys

Students who are on their 1st trimester of their instrument are learning:

Guitar: pitches on the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd strings; C and G7 chords Keyboard: intervals of a 4th and 5th and playing both hands together more often

Choir - Ms. Nimm

6th & 7th Grade Choirs - It is concert month for all three choirs! You are invited to hear the 6th and 7th grade choirs perform on Monday, May I 5. The concerts will be held in the Heider Center. 6th graders should report at 5:30pm with the concert starting at 6pm. 7th graders should report at 7pm, and the concert will start at 7:30pm. All students should wear their orange polo shirts, black pants, black socks, and black shoes.

8th Grade Choir - The 8th grade choir will be performing at the Heider Center Monday, May 22. Students should report at 6:30pm, and the concert will start at 7pm. This is a student led concert, so the dress code will be slightly different. More information will be sent out once a final decision has been made by the group!

Soundscapes - The 7th grade class has been using the Garageband App on their iPads to create several different pieces of music. The first was a song of their choosing. The second was background music for a commercial. The final project for the class will be a focus on how music can change the feeling of a movie scene. Students will be creating their own scenes and adding different types of music to make their scenes come alive.

African Drumming - African Drumming students have been using the Garageband App on their iPads to create percussion ensembles which were shared with the class. As the school year comes to a close, the group will be playing percussion ensembles from countries that are not usually thought of when it comes to drumming circles.

West Salem Middle School students (6 & 7) will be visiting the West Salem Outdoor Education Center before school is out. La Crosse and surrounding counties are common areas that are found to be populated with deer ticks causing exposure to Lyme Disease. It is important for people who work or recreate outdoors to learn the facts about the disease and how to prevent it. By taking some simple precautions, we can all continue to safely enjoy the pleasures and benefit of outdoor activity.

WHAT IS LYME DISEASE?

Cause: deer tick bite. A deer tick is half the size of a wood tick.

Symptoms: vary a great deal. Within 2-32 days after a tick bite, may experience fever, fatigue, headache, aching joints, nausea and/or a rash that is roughly circular in shape and is usually found at the site of the tick bite. Don't panic if someone gets bitten by a deer tick. It is not necessary to be examined by a doctor unless symptoms occur.

Precautions: when in wooded areas, wear long sleeves, pants and high socks (with pants tucked into socks). Light colored clothing will make ticks easier to find and remove. Walk in the center of trails to avoid brushing against vegetation. Conduct through "tick checks" on yourself and children regularly when out in wooded areas for any length of time. Prompt removal of ticks, even after they have attached, can drastically reduce disease transmission. To remove a tick that is attached, grasp it firmly with tweezers and close to the skin as possible and gently pull it straight out. If tweezers are not available, grasp the tick through a piece of tissue. Once the tick is removed, wash the bite area with soap and water and apply an anti-septic to the site. See a doctor if symptoms occur.

When outdoors, you may wish to use aerosol repellents for deer ticks, Please follow the directions on the product you are using. It is suggested you apply repellents on clothing only, from the armpits down.

Short Stops

Check your mail

What's in the bulk mail that arrives in your mailbox?

Opportunities for your child to discover writing strategies! What was the writer's purpose? (To persuade you to buy something, to inform you about an issue.) How did he achieve that purpose? (With facts, statistics, or words appealing to emotions.) Ask your tween if the strategies worked: Does he want the product or agree with the position?

Sun smart

Encourage your child to be smart about outdoor safety habits this summer. Have her drink lots of water to stay hydrated—when she's thirsty, with meals, and while she's active outside. Also, make sure she knows to wear sunscreen even on cool, overcast days, since harmful UV rays still come through.

Well-earned thanks

A simple thank you from students and parents means a lot to teachers, staff members, and coaches. Your middle grader could hand-deliver a card saying what he has learned from them. And you might send an email mentioning why you're grateful the person was in your child's life this year.

Keep on learning

Year in review: Your child has learned a lot in many different subjects, from language arts to math to science. Flash forward: By practicing skills during summertime, she can hang onto what she learned and gain even more knowledge. Try these ideas.

Read across the map

Print out a United States map, and hang it in a hallway. As a family, set a goal of coloring in every state by reading books or articles tha

reading books or articles that take place there or mention it. If your tween reads a novel that's set in Arizona or you read a magazine article about sightseeing in Georgia, fill in those states. *Idea*: At summer's end, encourage her to pick a state and write her own tale about it.

Take math on the road

Have your middle schooler practice doing math in her head with this car-trip activity. Suggest that she add, subtract, multiply, or divide numbers she spots along the way. If she sees a sign for 7th Street and a 25 mph speed limit, she might multiply 7 x 25 or divide 25 by 7.

To turn it into a game, let her call out the problem. The first person to answer correctly gives the next equation.



Designate a corner for storing odds and ends—say, cardboard, index cards, and aluminum foil. When your tween says, "I'm bored," see if she can figure out ways to use them in a science experiment or engineering project. Cardboard tubes could become a marble "roller coaster" to test gravity. Aluminum foil and index cards might be engineered into a shiny skyscraper. Have her research ideas online or in books.




Starting a business in middle school brings job experience and the chance to earn money. Help your middle grader tap into his inner entrepreneur with these tips.

■ **Find a niche.** What does he like to do? What is he good at? Maybe he loves animals and would enjoy walking or feeding pets. Perhaps he is strong in math and could tutor younger children in multiplication and division.

■ **Advertise.** Suggest that he make flyers to place on community bulletin boards or distribute to neighbors. He should tell relatives and friends about his business and ask them to pass the word along, too. €

Foster loyalty

You want your middle schooler to be a good friend and a good student. Learning to be loyal will help him do both. Here's how.

With friends. Watch for opportunities to bring up what loyalty looks like in friendships. For example, if he mentions that a buddy said something mean about another friend, ask what a loyal person would do (defend his pal by



pointing out a different viewpoint).

Also, share examples from your own life. Perhaps you were invited to an event and really wanted to go, but you stayed loyal to the friend you had already made plans with.

At school. Your child's school is his community, and being loyal to it influences his success there. Help shape his attitude by letting him hear you speak positively about his school and the teachers. To foster school pride,

encourage him to attend after-school events like pep rallies and art shows, even if his "crowd" isn't involved. He'll show loyalty not only to his school but also to the students who are participating. € \

A natural explorer

Spending time with nature helps your tween connect what she's learning in school to real life—and can even boost her critical and creative thinking. Share these strategies.

Be a nature reporter

What kinds of plants, trees, and animals live in your area? Suggest that your middle grader start a journal to record what she sees. She could sketch and label objects and living things, describing where and when she saw crabapple trees or chipmunks, for instance. Encourage her to research anything she doesn't recognize and share what she learns.

Plant an herb garden

Your child can dig into herbs by planting her own. In the process, she'll learn how



they can be used and what conditions they grow best in. She might create a themed garden—say, a "Mexican Food" garden with cilantro and oregano. Have her ask neighbors for clippings or look for inexpensive seeds in stores. Then, she could plant them in small pots to place on a windowsill or outdoors.


The last couple months of the school year have become one of our
