

Science: Students will learn about Earth systems (hydrosphere, biosphere, geosphere, and atmosphere) and how they interact with each other. They will also discuss the impact that humans (biosphere) have on each system.

Reading: Students just started reading historical fiction books that take place during the American Revolution. This will allow students to build connections to what they have learned and are currently learning in Social Studies. They will practice and review skills that they have learned throughout the year while they are reading this book. We are also discussing primary and secondary sources.

Writing: Our last writing focus is on opinion writing. While students will practice writing opinions in many different ways, they will also tie this in to their state restaurant project as well.

Math: The month of May we will focus on wrapping up algebraic patterns and coordinate planes. Then we will finish the year working on measurement and geometry. This will include converting different types of measurement. They will also learn about attributes of shapes and how to find the volume of rectangular prisms.

Restaurant Project: This project is an exciting, culminating project that 5th grade students complete each year. The students start by picking a state that they want to research. They will complete different writing components including: informational paragraphs, menu descriptions, and a persuasive essay. They will also be learning about applying for jobs, calculating sales tax, writing checks, and so much more! Students can also design and create a 3D model of their restaurant. The restaurant is not a requirement, but we highly recommend that they make one. We will start this project around May 13th and it will finish with a Restaurant City presentation on May 31st from 2:00-3:00pm. You are all welcome to attend and see the amazing projects.







#### **Spanish - Profesora Phillips**

The 5th grade Spanish students are practicing the date and weather. Throughout the month of May, we will continue working on basic conversations and discuss the importance of Cinco de Mayo in the United States and Mexico.

#### Art - Mrs. Hemker

Our clay unit took a bit longer than expected, but now that clay is complete we will move on to cardboard construction and various ways to join cardboard to create a finished 3-D sculpture. We will also be working on a Pop-Art Self Portrait.



#### Reading - Mrs. Schultz

Hello!

Our 6th grade readers are just starting a mystery genre study unit and a poetry unit. They will learn the different elements of poetry; they will recite a poem to the class and practice writing poems themselves. Student's will also be reading mystery books and completing assignments that ask about suspects and clues in their novels. The end of the year will have presentations about human rights.

#### English - Mrs. Buisman

During the month of May, 6th grade English students will be writing and creating their informational human rights books. Topics include genocide, sexual orientation, workers' rights, women's rights, poverty, terrorism, and more. Students will also be reviewing homophones and practicing verbs in grammar. We will end the year with a mystery read aloud that includes videos to uncover the mystery.

#### Science - Mrs. Jarosh

As our 6th graders enter the final month of their 6th grade year, we will continue investigating physics concepts in our Motion & Forces unit. Students designed and tested Newton's Laws cars. They built, tested, collected and analyzed data to help learn about each of Newton's Laws of motion. Our final unit will focus on ecology and the environment. Students will be learning about biomes, species interactions, population dynamics, and have the opportunity to dissect owl pellets! Thank you all for a great year in science!











#### Spanish - Profesora Phillips

The 6th grade Spanish students are talking about food, likes and dislikes. They can ask each other about their favorite foods and express their least favorite! Students will be working on a like/dislike book next week. Sixth graders will end the year by making sugar skulls and learning about the Day of the Dead.

#### Art - Mrs. Hemker

In May, 6th graders will be working on Artist Trading Cards. Many techniques will be explored through these tiny works of art. Students will also do some research about a famous artist and paintings creating both a poster and a masterpiece reproduction.





#### Social Studies - Mrs. Jeranek

It's hard to believe how quickly this year has gone! Students have been exposed to many new information on ancient civilizations throughout the course of 6th grade. I hope they have enjoyed their journey back to 1000 BCE as much as I have!

World Religions will continue to be our unit in May! Our focus will be acceptance and respect of religious beliefs throughout the world, so we better understand historical conflicts and values of others. We continue to learn through various literature and informational texts and on-line sources. By the end of the unit, students will have a World Religions booklet to summarize, reflect and connect information about religions (origins, symbols, scriptures, beliefs & traditions) they learn with what they already know.

It's been a great 6th grade year!



#### Math - Mrs. Jehn & Mrs. Adams Regular Math

We are finishing Chapter 9 learning about statistical measures including mean, median, and mode as well as quartiles, interquartiles, range, mean absolute deviation. The concepts of measures of variation and mean absolute deviation were new to students and may bring back fond memories of a statistics course you might have taken years ago. These are difficult topics and very abstract for 6th grade minds.

These skills are necessary for us in Chapter 10 which is the last chapter of the book and how we will spend most of May. This chapter is all about data displays including stem-and-leaf plots, histograms, box-and-whisker plots. They will need to use what they learned about measures of center, measures of variation, and statistical questions in the previous chapter to describe the center, spread, and shape of the displays.

It's been a fabulous year with students striving to learn despite rigorous work and higher level math skills being required. They have really excelled and done a wonderful job. Enjoy the summer!

#### Accelerated Math - Mrs. Jehn

Students completed Chapter 14 reviewing topics such as solving and graphing ratios, rates, and proportions, so they could work with slope and direct variation. In May, we will complete Chapter 15 titled Percents. Have your student work with you this summer to determine percent mark ups, discounts, and simple interest which are all skills from this chapter and for life.

They have done a tremendous job this year tackling difficult problems requiring high level thinking skills. They will be finishing the second half of the 7th grade book next year and then all of the 8th grade book. The skills will continue to become more difficult but their effort, perseverance, and willingness to learn will pay off for them. Keep up the great work!

**6th Grade Math Message** - Because of <u>your</u> generosity, we were able to spend the week of state testing working with the information from our statistical measures unit by completing the Oreo Stacking Challenge. We are incredibly grateful for all the Oreo donations you made. If you haven't had a chance yet, check out the school district's facebook page to see photos of the fun. We will finish May and the school year with a few other math projects utilizing concepts from throughout the year.







#### Reading -Mrs. Rochester During the month of May, students will be researching and creating a

website related to a specific environmental issue to follow up their environmental issues book study. The students were put into groups based on a common environmental issue. Be sure to ask your child about their research topic! 7th graders will also be finishing up the school year with an SSR (self

choice) book study. The students have already chosen books and started reading. As a final activity for these books, students are creating a One-Pager. The students are expected to analyze different elements about the book they are reading. These elements will then be put on a 12 x 18 piece of paper. The students are expected to read every night in order to finish the book. Most of the reading and work on the One-Pager will need to be completed outside of class



#### English - Mrs. Martinson

The 7th graders will be finishing their Vietnam research project by typing a final draft of their 4 paragraph essay with in-text citations and a works cited page. We continue to work on our compound sentences and parts of speech through Kahoots and Quizizz on-line games for practice. The final writing project will be an alliteration book. The students will write and illustrate a book to share with kindergartners and 1st graders.

#### Social Studies -Mr. Mahlum

For seventh grade social studies the students will look at laws in our society. We will examine why we have laws, the different types of laws, and what happens when those laws are broken. The final unit of our year will focus on state and local governments. We will study the role these levels of government play in our lives and who represents us in these levels.

#### Math - Mrs. Weber

We have started our unit on circles. We will be learning to find circumference and area of a circle while using PI(3.14). We will also study composite figures and learn to find area and perimeter by breaking those shapes into smaller, more recognizable shapes. We will be completing a scale drawing project the week of the school forest in connection with English class. We will end the year with some work on surface area and volume. What a fast year!!

#### Pre-Algebra

We just finished up our unit on linear functions. We will begin the study of real numbers (square and cube roots) and the Pythagorean Theorem the second week of May. We will take a short break to complete a scale drawing picture in connection with English class. We will finish our real numbers unit after the break and spend a few days reviewing surface area and volume if time permits. What a fast year!!

#### Half Math - Mrs. Coe

The seventh grade students will only have half math for the first part of May before they go to the school forest! The time will go so fast! We are starting to work with circles and composite figures with Mrs. Weber. We will dive into the equation for area of a circle and estimate the area of many different objects in the classroom. We will also practice all of the equations for area and perimeter they have previously learned to help prepare them for area and perimeter of composite figures.

#### Half Accelerated

We only have three weeks left in accelerated half math to finish up our castle project. We will also be working on the application of functions and the introduction of roots and rational and irrational numbers before the school year is over!





#### Art - Mrs. Hemker

7th Grade students will continue to work on improving their drawing skills using different techniques, styles and approaches. May's main projects are a planned composition collage, and Altered Posters.

#### Spanish - Profesora Phillips

The 7th grade Spanish students are working on describing themselves and others. They will complete a project based assessment next week to describe a character using the verb SER and several adjectives we have learned. To end the year, seventh graders will be working on school vocabulary, the verb tener, and telling time.



#### S.T.E.M. - Mr. Jones

For the rest of the school year the 7th grade students will be testing their engineering skills by making a paper rollercoaster. The goal is to design, test, and build a paper rollercoaster that is reliable, interesting, low cost (each material has a value), and takes the longest time to send a marble down the track. The team that makes the marble stay on the track for the longest time and spends the least amount of money wins!



In science we have been learning about body systems and the the power of the brain! We've tried meditation, tested our nerves, and experimented with reaction time. Students all came up with their own body system experiments that they should have done mostly at home and then shared with the class.



The 7th grade camp out is coming up in May. Please keep May 20-24 free of appointments, so you won't have to worry about rescheduling problems.

The campout is here! Paperwork was sent home and should be returned asap if it hasn't been already. The dates are May 20-24 and students should know if they are the first half or second half of week, so please try to avoid scheduling any appointments, trips, etc. during their time. If you have questions, don't hesitate to e-mail Mr. Baker.









# English - Mrs. Sackett

The days in 8th grade are quickly winding down. In English, we are wrapping up the year by enjoying Mark

Twain's classic novel, The Adventures of Tom Sawyer. This will be a great way to end the year as we will appreciate the lasting piece of literature and have discussions about the complex characters and themes we discover in the text. Along with reading this book, we will also be presenting our argument presentations and completing our review of the parts of speech by creating a parts of speech comic book. Save the comic sections of your newspapers and send them to school with your student to help with the comic book. It has been a pleasure working with each 8th grader. Thank you for sharing your student with me!

#### Mrs. Bentzen Regular Math (Chapter 9, Placement Test)

We will study one more unit on data analysis and displays before wrapping up the year.

The objectives for Chapter 9: \*construct and interpret scatter plots \*find and assess lines of fit for scatter plots

\*use equations of lines to solve problems and interpret the slope and the y-intercept

\*use two-way tables
\*choose appropriate data displays

We will FastBridge test on May 13 and 14. We will take an algebra placement test (dates: May 21-24) to be used as another measure of whether your son/daughter is ready for Algebra I next year. We will end the year making flexagons. Very cool stuff!!!!

# Algebra (Chapter 9, parts of Chpts 10 & 11, Final Exam)

We will study one more unit on radicals and geometry connections before wrapping up the year.

The objectives of Chapter 11: \*graph square root functions

\*simplify radical expressions
\*solve radical equations
\*apply the Pythagorean Theorem and Its
Converse
\*apply the Distance and Midpoint
Formulas

We will FastBridge test on May 14. We will take our algebra final (Chpts 6-11) on May 24. This will give your son/daughter the experience of taking final exams at the high school. We will end the year making flexagons. Very cool stuff!!!

#### Half Math - Mrs. Coe

8th grade math students will finish the year wrapping up our probability the statistics unit. The students are going to be creating a carnival in the classroom. Each student will work with a partner to create a carnival game where they will figure the theoretical and experimental probability. We plan to invite other classes over to play our games to complete our project during the last week of classes!

#### Half Math Advanced

Algebra students in half math will be comparing linear, quadratic and exponential functions and relating them to real life to see the significance of math in the working world around us. To finish out our school year, we will be creating catapults, finding the maximum height and distance of our catapults, graphing our launch using quadratic functions and seeing if we can adjust our catapults to make them fly higher and farther. I can not wait to see which group wins!

#### Social Studies - Ms. Morgan

May is a busy month for 8th grade students. Among the many activities they will take part in is the annual Civil War Day on Friday, May 17. This experience provides the students with the opportunity to "live" the lives of soldiers during the year 1863. With the help of local reenactors, students drill and eat a Civil War era meal enjoyed by soldiers of the day. Students will also learn about Civil War related topics including: Cordella Harvey, Union soldier, confederate soldier, load & fire a musket, Sailor, Artillery, blockade runner It is a culminating activity for a look at the

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tumultuous time that nearly tore our country apart.

Students will learn:

\*causes of the Civil War

\*the long lasting impact of the Civil War on our country's history

\*key events of the war that nearly tore our country apart

\*what life was like during the war from a variety of different view points

\*how our country was put back together following the war

Congratulations to Morgan Quackenbush, Madison MacRogers, Madison Odenbach, Kendra Hillyer, and Priya Oshan on representing WSMS at the Wisconsin National History Day Competition in Madison last month! If your visiting the La Crosse Main Library, check out some of our student's NHD projects on display.

#### S.T.E.M. - Mr. Jones

In 8th grade STEM we moved away from the programming and built our own Rumblebots out of various materials. The students had to place their rumblebot creations on a vibrating track to make it move forward. Once all rumblebots were built and tested, we raced them. A good time was had by all.

For the remaining time that I have with the 8th graders we will be designing our own nosecones for a paper rocket. These nosecones will be 3D printed. We will then launch the rockets and graph the results.

#### Art - Mrs. Hemker

During the month of May, students will be creating a Pop Art piece that will represent the individual artist in some way. They will also be working on exploring the elements and principles of art and creating a personalized project proposal.







#### Spanish - Profesora Phillips

The 8th grade Spanish students have been working on Mi Comida Favorita or My Favorite Food. We have worked on how to share what we like: Me gusta and what we do not like: No me gusta. We have also been working on basic conversations and communicating in small groups. We will finish the year with our family unit learning how to describe and share about different family members.

#### Reading - Ms. Friell

**Supplies**: To be prepared for class, students must bring the following to class every day: pen/ pencil, iPad, book of choice (fiction or non- fiction), and a reading binder. The students' reading binders stay in the classroom, so they only have to get it off the shelf at the beginning of class!

**Independent Reading:** Students have been reading books of their choice since the second week of school. They should be reading these books at home on a daily basis (a minimum of 20 minutes). They are also given 20 minutes to read their choice books during Reading class. Please ask your son/daughter to tell you about what he/ she is reading.

**Vocabulary**: In addition to "A Word A Day" (from the book 100 Words Every Middle Schooler Should Know) and studying Greek and Latin roots, students should be using context clues strategies while working with new words in the fiction and non-fiction works we read as a class.

As we just finished reading *The Giver*, students will be completing a variety of activities to demonstrate their learning. Some of them include writing from a subjective viewpoint, a compare/contrast paragraph, and a character analysis. In contrast to the fictional, dystopian world of *The Giver*, we will finish the year reading about Anne Frank and the world she lived in during the Holocaust.

#### Science - Ms. Smith-Waller

Where has the time gone the last couple of months? It is hard to believe that we have almost completed another school year, and within a few months our students will be going into high school to start another exciting adventure in their lives. We had a great year in science this year, and we are looking forward to a few last weeks of fun science activities. During the month of May, we will finish up our study of weather and climate. We will try to get outside to make observations when we can. For the last couple of weeks, we will change our focus and learn a little bit about minerals and rocks. I like to finish out the year with a rock walk where we will try to identify rocks around West Salem. Let's finish out the year strong!

Our <u>Music Alive</u> magazine articles will be on music of video games and summer music festivals.


#### General Music 5 - Mrs. Glasel

West Salem Middle School students (6 & 7) will be visiting the West Salem Outdoor Education Center before school is out. La Crosse and surrounding counties are common areas that are found to be populated with deer ticks causing exposure to Lyme Disease. It is important for people who work or recreate outdoors to learn the facts about the disease and how to prevent it. By taking some simple precautions, we can all continue to safely enjoy the pleasures and benefit of outdoor activity.

#### WHAT IS LYME DISEASE?

Cause: deer tick bite. A deer tick is half the size of a wood tick.

**Symptoms:** vary a great deal. Within 2-32 days after a tick bite, may experience fever, fatigue, headache, aching joints, nausea and/or a rash that is roughly circular in shape and is usually found at the site of the tick bite. Don't panic if someone gets bitten by a deer tick. It is not necessary to be examined by a doctor unless symptoms occur.



**₽**ADA

**Precautions:** when in wooded areas, wear long sleeves, pants and high socks (with pants tucked into socks). Light colored clothing will make ticks easier to find and remove. Walk in the center of trails to avoid brushing against vegetation. Conduct through "tick checks" on yourself and children regularly when out in wooded areas for any length of time. Prompt removal of ticks, even after they have attached, can drastically reduce disease transmission. To remove a tick that is attached, grasp it firmly with tweezers and close to the skin as possible and gently pull it straight out. If tweezers are not available, grasp the tick through a piece of tissue. Once the tick is removed, wash the bite area with soap and water and apply an anti-septic to the site. See a doctor if symptoms occur.

When outdoors, you may wish to use aerosol repellents for deer ticks, Please follow the directions on the product you are using. It is suggested you apply repellents on clothing only, from the armpits down.



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# Working Together for School Success



#### Prepare for exams

Your tween will remember more information if he

studies for finals over a longer period of time rather than cramming. Suggest that he create a study schedule and stick to it. He could also join a study group to stay on track.

#### **Words inspire confidence**

The way your middle grader talks about herself can affect her self-esteem. If you hear her make a negative statement like "I can't do this" or "I'm just not good at this," have her turn it into a positive one. *Examples*: "I'll try" or "I'm working on it." Then, set an example by doing the same for yourself!

#### A first aid kit

Ask your child to make a home first aid kit. He can fill a container with bandages, gauze, adhesive tape, and antiseptic wipes. Show him how to use the supplies so he learns what to do if he or someone else is injured. Encourage him to put the kit where family members can find it easily, perhaps in the hall closet.

# Keep your brain in gear

When the school year ends, the learning doesn't have to. Keep your tween's mind active all summer long with ideas like these.

#### Take up a hobby

A hobby gives your child a meaning-ful way to spend time while she practices various skills. For example, knitting requires math and attention to detail. And chess promotes strategic thinking and patience. She could take a community center class or watch how-to videos. Then, suggest that she set a goal like knitting a scarf or beating you at chess before summer ends!

#### **Explore the community**

Visiting new places will build your tween's general knowledge. You might tour a museum or hike in a state park, for instance. During your adventures, encourage her to ask a docent or ranger questions or to read signs to learn about the exhibits or wildlife.



Your child can get a head start on a subject she'll study in school next year. For example, if she'll take Spanish, she could download a free app to begin learning greetings and other phrases. Or if she signed up for engineering, she might look online for projects to try like designing a water bottle rocket or a solar panel.

#### **Summer routines**

Setting up a routine can add structure to your child's summer on days when he's home. Try these tips.

- **Eating.** Plan regular family meals to stay connected with your middle grader. Also, have him help you stock healthy snacks and lunches he can prepare on his own if you're not home.
- **Sleeping.** Getting enough sleep is important for good health year-round. Set a reasonable bedtime, and have your tween get up by a set time. This is especially important
- **Chores.** Keep your child in the routine of having regular responsibilities. You might give him a list of jobs for the week (laundry, vacuuming) and let him decide which day he'll do each task.  $eq^{C}$



# Ways to handle peer pressure

Peer pressure can be positive when friends motivate your middle grader to read a good book or work out. But when he's pressured to do things that *aren't* good for him, he needs to be able to resist. Share these strategies.

**Listen to instincts.** If your tween is pressured to do something he knows isn't right (shoplifting, bullying), suggest that he ask himself, "Would I want my parents to know?" or "Is this safe (local, kind)?" If

to know?" or "Is this safe (legal, kind)?" If the answer is no, he should listen to his instincts.



**Practice responses.** Together, brainstorm ways to say no, such as, "No thanks, I'm not into that" or "I don't want

to get kicked off the swim team." Also, help your child think of ways to get out of uncomfortable or unsafe situations like being pressured to try alcohol. Agree on a phrase he will use in a call or text to you if he needs a way

out. *Example*: "Can you put my clothes in the dryer?" That's your cue to pick him up right away.  $\epsilon^{\alpha}$ 

#### **Break into coding**

Learning to code will make your child a better logical thinker and problem solver. It could even lead to a career one day. Spark her interest with these suggestions:

■ Can your tween and a friend draw identical pictures without seeing each other's papers? First, each person draws a 10-by-10 grid on her own paper. One person secretly chooses a crayon and draws a shape in any box on her grid. Then, she writes code telling the other person how to copy her drawing (starting in the bottom left-hand corner of her paper). Example: R3 U2 BT = move right three boxes, move up two, draw a blue triangle. Now it's the other person's turn to draw a shape and write code. After a few rounds, they can see if their drawings match.

■ Help your middle grader find a computer class or club at school or the

public library. Maybe she'll create a mobile app or build a Lego robot. Or she might use coding to make online games at a site like *code.org*.  $\xi^{C}$

Building sibling bonds

My daughters are busy with their own friends and don't spend a lot of time together. How can I help them be closer?

A Suggest that your girls set aside "sister time" on a regular basis. They could take turns deciding what to do. Maybe your older daughter will teach her little sister to bake. Or perhaps your younger one will show her big sister a science project she

did in school. They might even find ways to combine their talents or interests—say, by doing food-related science experiments.

Encouraging your daughters to support each other will also strengthen their relationship. Say your younger one is disappointed about not getting invited to a sleep-over. Quietly suggest to your older daughter that it would mean a lot if she comforted her little sister. She might show her funny videos or write a note about why she's a great sister, for instance.



#### 'Zines by tweens

My son Brian recently submitted a short story

about pet adoption to a teen magazine. That gave him the idea to publish his own 'zine, which he explained is a mini

print magazine. He decided to focus on animal welfare and call his 'zine Paws and Claws.

In each issue, he highlights an animal in need of adoption. He prints a photo and

description from our local shelter's website and pastes them into his 'zine. The 'zine also features the adventures of his rescue hedgehog. He takes pictures of Hedgie curled into a ball or snuggled up in a blanket and writes funny captions.

Now each month, Brian makes photocopies of his 'zine and mails

them to friends and

relatives. Sometimes he even gets "fan mail," which motivates him to keep writing.
