Letter from Superintendent Ryan Rieber

Preparation

During summer, I try to do my best to find time to sit and read and mentally recharge for the next school year. I wish that I was as a fanatic reader as my wife, Kim, who I am very envious of in how quickly she can read through a book, but that is not a strength of mine. However, I often look back at past books that I have enjoyed and learned from to try and make connections to where we have been or where we will be going as a school district. For myself, it doesn't take long after a school year or season concludes that I naturally start thinking about and preparing for the next one. I went back and reviewed the book The Servant by James C. Hunter. In this book, I found passages that I feel resonate with where we have been these past two years as a school district.

In a portion of the book the main character, John Daily is preparing to listen to a daily lesson. The conversation by the teacher involved change and continuous improvement. It went as follows, "Change takes us out of our comfort zone and forces us to do things different-

ly, and that's hard. Challenges to our ideas force us to rethink our positions, and that's always uncomfortable. Rather than working through things and tolerating hard work and discomfort, many are content to stay forever stuck in their little ruts." Although there were uncomfortable moments and challenges over the past two years, I am proud that we did not stay "stuck in our little ruts."

A coach involved within this daily lesson commented that, "Continuous improvement is crucial for people as well as organizations because nothing stays the same in life. Nature shows us clearly that you are either alive and growing or you are dying, dead, or decaying." The teacher follows by stating, "Almost everyone buys into the idea of continuous improvement but by definition it is impossible to improve unless we change. It's those brave souls on the cutting edge who are challenging and asking the questions that will lead the way for others."

This portion of the book helped me to reflect on the past two years and how our district stands today as we prepare to start our first "normal" school year since August of 2019. I am so proud of the partnerships, cooperation, and conversations that we have had with

our staff, school board, and community. These conversations were not always easy, but they were necessary conversations that helped us to change, rethink, and continuously improve for OUR KIDS! I feel that there is no better time to be a Panther than right now. We are set and preparing for an outstanding school year and we are so excited for our students and staff to refill our buildings and campus at the end of the month.

Over the past couple of weeks we have gotten the feel of this excitement through our summer school program, along with youth and high school athletic camps. It is a sure sign that the preparations for the school year are beginning. Fall co-curricular meetings are occurring in preparation for the upcoming fall seasons, and we are excited to begin these restriction-free.

As preparations begin, I want to thank all of those within the district that work behind the scenes. There is a lot of work accomplished while our students are not present in order to have our buildings ready for their return. This summer, some of those projects included a renovation of the Heider Center parking lot, adding a new parking lot between the Panther Den and our tennis courts, updating the flooring in the high school library, and painting and updating some flooring at the elementary school. Through the generosity of local donors and grant funding, we have teamed with a local contractor to have solar energy added to our middle

school. There have been 288 solar panels installed to help conserve energy, lower rising energy costs, and to utilize as an education tool for our students. We are so appreciative of those that have given of their time, resources, and efforts along with our team here on campus in preparation for our students return on August 29th.

As we look forward to the upcoming school year, I want to thank all of our parents and residents of the West Salem School District for providing us the opportunity to work with your children, grandchildren, friends, and neighbors. We are successful because of your help and support. That dedication allows us to fill our buildings and classrooms with the best educators around! We all have a passion for working with our students, and I know that passion to serve our students, district, and community will be more apparent this year than ever before. We are fortunate here in West Salem, yet, we also know and want to keep the mindset of continuous improvement on the forefront of our thoughts and actions. Thank you West Salem! We are so excited to serve with passion and are looking forward to what is to come in the 2022-23 school year.

2022-2023 Health Information and Reminders

Medication at School

Medication forms, which are available at most clinics and will be available at registration and online, are required for the following:

• All prescription medications that need to be given during school, including inhalers carried by students (must be signed by the parent and the physician).

State statue and school district policy do not permit any prescription medications to be given at school without a written statement signed by the physician and the parent or guardian. This includes the use of inhalers for students with asthma. (Students may not use or carry an inhaler without written permission from their physician.) Medication needs to be in its original container and properly labeled. Please do not send medication in a baggie or an unlabeled bottle, as it cannot be given.

A new medication form is needed each time the medication is changed, and a new one is needed for each school year.

During online registration, you will be able to sign off on certain over the counter as needed medications. For scheduled, daily medications, a signed medication form is needed for each medication and for each child. This form must be signed by a parent and the prescribing provider. A separate medication form is needed for each medication and for each child. If you feel your child may need any over the counter medication during the school year, please check with the school nurse for availability. *Availability is not guaranteed. Please send medications if needed. Over the counter medication may not be stored in backpacks. All over the counter medications that may need to be given during school that are not electronically signed off on at registration also require a signed medication form.

Substances that are not FDA approved (i.e. natural products, food supplements) will require the written instruction of a medical practitioner and written consent from the student's parent or guardian.

Student Immunization Law Age & Grade Requirements to enter the 2022-2023 School Year

Ages Pre-K through 4 years:

4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 3 polio, 1MMR**, 3 Hep B**, 1 Varicella*

Grades K and 1

4 DTP/DtaP/DT (1st dose after 1st birthday), 4 polio, 2MMR, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella*

Grade 5

4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 4 polio, 2MMR, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella*

Grades 6-12

4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 4 polio, 2MMR, 1 Tdap, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella

*Varicella is the chickenpox vaccine. Chickenpox disease history is also acceptable.

**MMR is measles, mumps, and rubella. Lab evidence of immunity is also acceptable for MMR and also for Hepatitis B.

Any student not up to date by the 30th day of school may be excluded from school by state statute. What you need to do to avoid exclusion is:

- Provide school with month, day and year of the required immunizations
- Have your child immunized OR
- Sign a <u>waiver</u> (also available from School Nurse office)
- In the event of a communicable disease outbreak, such as measles, children who are not vaccinated are often required to stay home from school and school-related functions until the outbreak ends or they get vaccinated, for their safety.

District Begins First Ever Solar Project

The district is very excited to have officially kicked off it's first ever solar project! The project at West Salem Middle School began in July, where 288 panels are being installed across the rooftop. They will produce approximate-

ly 140,000 kW of energy in the first year of use, offsetting 22% of the building's energy costs. This project is made possible by a very generous anonymous donor, as well as grant funds received from The Midwest Renewable Energy Association's Solar on Schools program and the Hammond Climate Solutions' Solar Moonshot program out of San Diego, CA. Not only will the system help save on electrical costs and reduce the district's footprint, it will also offer several educational opportunities for our students to learn about solar energy, such as how the system operates, the cost savings, and the long-term impacts on district sustainability.

Annual Notices

At the beginning of each school year, school districts are required to publish certain annual notices. These are as follows:

Child Find & Referral Notice

Upon request, the School District of West Salem is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies, and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. A referral may be made by contacting Heidi Horton, Director of Pupil Services, School District of West Salem at (608)786-1064 or by writing her at 405 East Hamlin Street, West Salem, WI 54669.

Student Privacy Rights under the Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment (PPRA)

PPRA affords parents of elementary and secondary students certain rights regarding the conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams. These include, but are not limited to, the right to:

- *Consent* before students are required to submit to a survey that concerns one or more of the following protected areas ("protected information survey")if the survey is funded in whole or in part by a program of the U.S. Department of Education.
 - 1. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parents;
 - 2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
 - 3. Sex behavior or attitudes;
 - 4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
 - 5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
 - 6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
 - 7. Religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or student's parent; or

- 8. Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility.
- Receive notice and an opportunity to opt a student out of-
 - 1. Any other protected information survey, regardless of funding.
 - 2. Any non-emergency, invasive physical exam or screening required as a condition of attendance, administered by the school or its agent, and not necessary to protect the immediate health and safety of a student, except for hearing, vision, or scoliosis screenings, or any physical exam or screening permitted or required under State law; and
 - 3. Activities involving collection, disclosure, or use of personal information collected from students for marketing or to sell or otherwise distribute the information to others. (This does not apply to the collection, disclosure, or use of personal information collected from students for the exclusive purpose of developing, evaluating, or providing educational products or services for, or to, students or educational institutions).
- Inspect, upon request and before administration or use'
 - 1. Protected information surveys of students and surveys created by a third party;
 - 2. Instruments used to collect personal information from students for any of the above marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes; and
 - 3. Instructional material use as a part of the educational curriculum.

These rights transfer from the parents to a student who is 18 years old or an emancipated minor under State law.

The School District of West Salem has developed a policy regarding these rights, as well as arrangements to protect student privacy in the administration of protected information surveys and the collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes. The School District of West Salem will notify parents of these policies, at least annually at the start of each school year and after any substantive changes. The School District of West Salem will also directly notify, such as through U.S. mail or email, parents of students who are scheduled to participate in the specific activities or surveys noted below and will provide an opportunity for the parent to opt his or her child out of particiption of the specific activity or survey. The School District of West Salem will make this notification to parents at the beginning of the school year if the District has identified the specific or approximate dates of the activities or surveys at that time. For surveys and activities scheduled after the school year starts, parents will be provided reasonable notification of the planned activities and surveys listed below and be provided an opportunity to opt their child out of such activities and surveys. Parents will also be provided an opportunity to review any pertinent surveys. Following is a list of the specific activities and surveys covered under this direct notification requirement.

- Collection, disclosure, or use of personal information collected from students for marketing, sales, or other distribution.
- Administration of any protected information survey not funded in whole or in part by the U.S. Department of Education.
- Any non-emergency, invasive physical examination or screening as described above.
