MORNING PROCEDURES

Doors open at 7:30. At this time, students will be allowed into the building, or they may stay outside on the playground until 7:43, when the bell rings.

Students are expected to be in their classrooms and ready for instruction at 7:50.

Absences, appointments, and messages

If your child will be absent from school, please call the office by **7:50** in the morning. In the event you receive the voice mailbox, leave a message that includes your child's name, grade, and the reason for the absence. If your child is ill, **please be specific with his/her symptoms.** We are required by state law to report numbers of students ill with strep throat, stomach flu, colds, and chicken pox, so it is important that we have accurate count. We do not report student names, just numbers. If your child's absence is not called in to the school in a timely manner, it is considered an unexcused absence and consequences may be assigned to the student.

You may also call ahead or send a note to the office with any pre-planned absences. We will document it, and you will not have to call again on the day of the absence.

If you notify your student's teachers, PLEASE notify us as well, as sometimes the information doesn't make it to the office.

If your child needs to be picked up for an appointment, please send a note or call the office ahead of time so that your child can be given an out-pass in advance. We appreciate advance notification as it eliminates the need for us to find your child at the last minute when they are being picked up. If your child brings a note from the medical or dental appointment as verification, it is not counted toward the 10 days allowed for your child to be absent from school. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping your child's attendance up to date and informing the school of absences in a timely manner.

We receive many calls daily from parents asking us to relay messages to their children. Please make every attempt to relay these messages to your child before they leave for school.

Middle School Security...

The middle school doors will be locked during school hours of 8:00am - 3:10pm. When coming to the middle school, you will need to be buzzed into the building by using the button located on the east wall of the main entrance (on East Ave). Once you enter the building, please sign in the office.

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5th Grade December Update





Math: After finishing our 2nd unit, we will be doing an ugly sweater project. This project will apply what the students learned in the first trimester. Then, we will be starting our third unit. This unit focuses on multiplying and dividing fractions. As always, knowing your multiplication and division facts is extremely important for this unit!

Reading and Writing: With the new trimester, we are shifting our focus to informational text and writing. We focus on finding the main ideas and details, recognizing text features, and looking at different text structures. Students will apply that knowledge to their informational writing.





Social Studies: Students will continue to study different explorers. They will focus more on the Western Hemisphere exploration. After they complete their explorer simulation, they will start to focus more on the first English settlements in America.

Science: Students will start their next science unit in December. This unit will focus on planets and space. As part of this unit, students will complete a project about a space- related topic. The majority of the project will be completed during science class in the month of January.





D.A.R.E:

Students will begin weekly D.A.R.E. lessons with La Crosse County Deputy Cody Bernhardt. This program gives kids the skills they need to handle the pressures that adolescence brings. This will eventually lead to a reflection paper and visual project. Our D.A.R.E. program will end with a graduation ceremony on Thursday, March 10th.





6th Grade

Math - Ms. McKinney and Mrs. Jehn

In November, we completed Chapter 3 which includes algebraic expressions and properties. Students really had to work hard to wrap their minds around using letters in math rather than numbers. They are learning that a numerical expression has numbers and operations but an algebraic expression has numbers, operations, and symbols. Terms, variables, coefficients, and constants are just a few of the new vocabulary words they have worked with to write and simplify expressions. This unit is a building block to future work in algebra.

We will spend December in Chapter 4 using the area of a parallelogram to derive the area formulas of triangles, trapezoids, and composite figures as well as how to graph them in the coordinate plane.

Accelerated Math - Mrs. Jehn

At the end of November, students completed Chapter 5. Please continue to encourage your child to help you figure out how to tip someone, how to find the discounted price using coupons, or how to find the better buy using unit price when comparing products and prices. These are great life skills to have!

In December, students will also finish Chapter 6 - Integers and the Coordinate Plane. For most students in our state, understanding positive and negative integers comes easily because they have grown up in a place seeing positive and negative temperatures. Later this year, when students learn to use the basic math operations with positive and negative integers, this concept becomes a little more difficult, and students really have to extend their understanding of integers.

Science: Mrs. Jarosh

Students have been working hard learning about the Periodic Table. They demonstrated their ability to recognize the first 20 elements and have enjoyed "The Periodic Table" song! This work sets the foundation for students to be able to draw models of simple molecules and understand the basics of chemical reactions. Each student will be choosing their own element to research!

Combined Reading & English: Mrs. Buisman & Mrs. Schultz


OMG-N-G! Oh My Gods and Goddess, we are studying Greek Mythology! Gods, Goddesses- the immortals; men, women, and heroes- the mortals; these beings will be the focus of our next unit of study on myths. Myths are stories which teach morals or lessons and proper human behavior. In some instances, myths give explanations of nature and why things are as they are. This December, we will be combining Reading and English to explore Ancient Greek myths and Greek Drama. Students will investigate fractured fairy tales to see how authors have given those traditional stories a modern twist with added humor. Then, in groups, the sixth graders will create and perform a skit involving one of the myths studied, giving it their special twist to "fracture" it. At the end of December, the Greek Drama Festival will feature the best groups from each class and their mythological creation! We plan on live streaming and recording this performance so the adults can enjoy the creations as well. Be sure to find out your student's favorite Greek myth, god, goddess, or hero!

Social Studies: Mrs. Jeranek

Ancient Egypt has been our focus for the last few weeks of November. We explored the location and geography of Egypt, researched the unintended (nature-made) and intended (man-made) technologies that improved Ancient Egyptian lives. Some of those technologies are still used throughout the world today!

Throughout December, we continue our studies of Ancient Egypt with a focus on Economy: the jobs people held and the conflicts that occurred between social classes. Egyptian Religion allows us to study scientific and mathematical developments necessary for pyramid construction and mummification to reach the afterlife. We will also look at Egyptian gods and goddesses and Israelites movement out of Egypt to reach the Promise Land.

To culminate our unit, students will be asked to research an Egyptian topic they'd like to know more about. Focusing on informational text, note taking, and summarizing, students will share their findings with their classmates. As this develops, more details will be provided!



7th Grade

Language Arts - Ms. Friell

Classroom Supplies: All students are required to have a binder and two composition notebooks (one for grammar and one for writing). The binder and notebooks are left in the classroom so they are never lost and remain easily accessible.

Agendas/Lessons: A general plan is posted on the Homework Hotline. The specific plan (along with any materials) is posted in Google Classroom. If a student needs to miss school, please check GC for required work.

Each class period, we practice working on sentences and parts of speech.We've reviewed nouns, verbs, and adjectives and are working on writing complete and compound sentences. In December, students will practice writing the following: paragraphs using the R.A.C.E.S. strategy, compare/contrast paragraphs, and summaries.

Math 7- Mrs. Weber and Mrs. Piersma

We hope you had a wonderful Thanksgiving. We have just finished up our first trimester. It is crazy to think we are in December already. We started a new unit on inequalities. It uses many of the skills from Unit 3 so hopefully it will seem easy to the kids. Happy Holidays to everyone.

Pre-Algebra- Mrs. Weber

I hope you all had a great Thanksgiving break. It is hard to believe it is already December. We have completed 2 of the in-school mathcounts competitions, with one left at the end of December. There are six 7th graders in the top 12 right now with a great chance of making the mathcounts team! That is amazing. Keep working hard, everyone, and congrats on finishing up the first trimester strong!!

Reading - Mrs. Rochester

The 7th graders will be getting into their dystopian books.A dystopia is a undesirable society that usually has a group of people making negative decisions for the rest of the society. During this unit, the students were given a choice of nine books to read. If they did not like one of the nine books, they were given the choice to go to the LMC and choose a dystopian book for this unit. Some of the topics the students will analyze and write about will be characterization, setting, conflict, rebellion, and theme. As a whole group, the students will be discussing characteristics of dystopias, finding examples in the book they are reading as well as looking at real life examples. Students will be expected to complete the assigned reading in 14 class days. The students will have more reading with this unit, therefore, they should be bringing their dystopian books home to finish reading that was not done in class. There will not be quizzes during this unit. Instead, the students will be keeping a journal. The topics the students will write about will also be the topics they discuss with other classmates. 7th grade students will continue to study Greek and Latin roots.

Social Studies - Mr. Mahlum

For 7th Grade Social Studies, the students will start to look at the different Amendments to the Constitution. We will first look at the Bill of Rights. Then, we will turn our attention to some of the other Amendments. Students will see the importance of all of these rights and how they have shaped our country.

Science - Mr. Baker

Throughout November, we have been learning all about how cells get their energy. This involved photosynthesis, respiration, and fermentation! Students got their heart rates up to an 80's workout or Just Dance videos for our respiration lab, measured the amount of oxygen produced in plants, and inflated gloves for our fermentation lab! Some students may have even made bread at home as part of a bonus activity! December is all about body systems, so ask them what body system they are working with and have them explain what experiment they are doing!

Science - Ms. Smith-Waller

The first trimester of school is over, and we are continuing to focus on plate tectonics, volcanos, earthquakes, and locations of fossils around the world. We will be working on a group project where students will research a topic supporting Plate Tectonic Theory, then present their findings to the class. That information will then be used to write an essay on how the distribution of fossils and rocks, continental shapes, and

seafloor structures provide evidence of the past plate motions. After we finish up this unit on plate tectonics, we will move on to learn more about Earth's history and Geologic Time. Here's to another great trimester!

Essential Learning Outcomes:

- Analyze and interpret data to provide evidence for phenomena._
 - MS-ESS2-3: Analyze and interpret data on the distribution of fossils and rocks, continental shapes, and seafloor structures to provide evidence of the past plate motions.
- Construct a scientific explanation based on valid and reliable evidence obtained from sources and the assumption that theories and laws that describe nature operate today as they did in the past and will continue to do so in the future.
 - MS-ESSI-4: Construct a scientific explanation based on evidence from rock strata for how the geologic time scale is used to organize Earth's 4.6-billion-year-old history



Social Studies - Ms. Morgan

Early December finds us brushing up on the basics of our U.S. government and looking at the history behind its creation. Did you know that Act 55 requires every Wisconsin high school student to score at least a 65% on their districts Civics Test for Graduation? We've been brushing up on some of the facts. How well do you think you could do? Give it a try at https://www.uscis.gov/sites/default/files/document/questions-and-answers/100q.pdf.

After our study of the U.S. government, students should be able to:

- 1. Explain why people form governments.
- 2. Compare and contrast the Articles of Confederation to the Constitution.
- 3. Provide a basic description of the functions, powers, and requirements of each of the branches of the U.S. government.

Regular Math (Chapter 5) Mrs. Bentzen and Mrs. Coe We finished up Chapter 4 at the end of November. We will be covering Chapter 4 called "Systems of Linear Equations" in the month of December. 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English/Language Arts - Ms. Meyer and Ms. Sackett

In 8th grade ELA, we have been focusing on identity since the start of the year. Beginning in December, we will transition from identity to diversity where students will choose a book to read with a character representing a diverse group. We will use the topics from their selected books to generate ideas for their research pieces. Students will

do some practice note taking with the teachers to prepare them for eventually taking their own notes for a research paper. Although our major writing focus is changing, our classroom routine is staying the same, allowing for plenty of practice reading and writing a variety of pieces.



Trimester I, Music 5 - Mrs. Glasel (Kjos) and Ms. Nimm (Burdick)

This past month we continued singing and talking about folk music. Our emphasis was on spirituals and their hidden messages. We also sang patriotic songs in celebration of Veterans Day and studied the history of the Star Spangled Banner. We listened and watched 5 versions of the song and used our music vocabulary to describe the music. It was great to hear which one they chose as their favorite and why.

We also were introduced to SQUILT (Super Quiet Un-Interuppted Listening Time). We listened to some well known music and had to pick out the tempo (speed), timbre (tone qualities), and mood of the music. Then, using the music vocabulary that we learned this trimester, we wrote a response about the music.

We continued to accompany our singing on the autoharps and barred instruments, and continued to play the bucket drums, recorders, and cups to reinforce our pitch and rhythm learning.

It will be sad to see these groups of students leave our music classes to move on to their next Allied class. We had fun singing, playing instruments, and doing a lot of movement activities this trimester. Looking forward to seeing you in a music class in 6th grade!

Trimester 2, Music 5 - Mrs. Glasel (Czajka) and Ms. Nimm (Massig)

Your music class will take on a little different format by having music every day for a trimester. Let's meet your teachers.

Mrs. Glasel is in her 32nd year of teaching, all here at West Salem. Along with band, she taught 5th grade for the first 16 years before moving completely to the middle school to teach 6th - 8th grade general music and band lessons. When the 5th grade moved to the middle school four years ago, she began to teach 5th grade again and realized how much she missed teaching these energetic kids.

Ms. Nimm is in her 16th year of teaching, all here at West Salem, just like Mrs. Glasel! She also teaches Choir (6, 7, 8), Soundscapes (7), and African Drumming (8).

Our classes will be based around the four main concepts of performing, creating, responding and connecting, so that will involve a lot of moving, singing, listening, and rhythm/pitch activities. We learn about songs reflecting American history and culture as well as different holidays.

General Music 6 - Mrs. Glasel

Music Reading - The students are continuing to play the keyboards. Now they are now reading music on the grand staff (bass and treble clefs), but are still only playing one hand at a time and learning musical elements of dynamics, slurs, ties, and intervals.

Music Appreciation - We are finishing up the Elements of Music packet, and we now will be able to use that terminology while composing. Our next composition will be the GarageBand Loops project which uses pre-recorded short musical segments called loops.

Our Music Alive magazine articles this month will focus on different string instruments.

General Music 7 - Mrs. Glasel

The students are continuing to play songs on the guitar. They just added the third string to their songs.

The students just finished up watching the musical <u>Hello, Dolly</u>, in which they learned about the complexity of storylines and character development. The next musical, <u>Fiddler on the Roof</u>, is a more serious musical with a look at the Jewish culture, their traditions, and how those traditions change throughout the musical.

6th Grade Choir - Ms. Nimm

Students have been continuing to rehearse choir music in preparation for their January concert. They have also been working on reading music using Do, Re, Mi, and Sol. We will have a few Holiday song sing-along days before Winter Break to help celebrate the season.

7th and 8th Grade Choirs - Ms. Nimm

The choirs will be presenting their concerts on Tuesday, December 14 at the Heider Center! The 7th grade students should report to the high school by 5:30pm, and the concert starts at 6pm. Their concert music features songs from around the world. 8th grade students should report to the high school by 7pm, and the concert starts at 7:30pm. Their concert music features tried and true 8th grade favorites from past years.

All students should wear their black music polo, black pants, black socks, and black shoes.

Soundscapes - Ms. Nimm

Throughout December, students in Soundscapes will be diving into a variety of music genres using Music Alive Magazine. They will read about, discuss, and listen to music from each genre.

African Drumming - Ms. Nimm

Students have recently finished How-To videos for Ensemble 5. These videos will be shared with students in the 7th grade Soundscapes class. The next unit will focus on non-traditional instruments and creating rhythmic patterns using the group "STOMP" as inspiration.

Spanish - Mrs. Phillips

6th Grade

¡Bienvenidos! Welcome to second trimester Spanish sixth grade! Our first unit will include introductions and basic vocabulary. We will practice letter sounds, numbers, calendar and weather vocabulary. We will also talk about different songs and cultural practices of Mexico and Central America. ¡Feliz Navidad, prospero año y felicidad!

7th Grade

¡Bienvenidos a la clase de español! The 2nd trimester 7th grade Spanish class will begin by reviewing basic conversations and asking each other questions in Spanish. We will also talk about cognates and discuss different parts of the song ¿Puedo ir al baño?.

8th Grade

¡Bienvenidos a la clase de español! The 2nd trimester 8th grade Spanish class will review introductions, classroom phrases and get to know each other through special person interviews - en español! Students will be developing speaking skills by describing themselves and others.

Spanish 1/8th Grade Elective

Spanish elective students are making a lot of progress in reading and building confidence in speaking. During the month of December we will read the book "Brandon Brown Quiere un Perro" and continue working with high frequency vocabulary.

Healthy Living - Mr. Brewer, Mrs. Olson, Ms. Serres, Mr. Reader

The Healthy Living team will be teaching some activities from around the world. Students will be experiencing Cricket, Rugby, and Wrestling this month. With the cold weather and snow approaching, we are transitioning indoors. Please make sure that your child has athletic shoes for the days that they wear boots to school. Happy Holidays!

STEM - Mr. Jones

6th Grade STEM

A new trimester means new students for STEM class. My new students will spend the month of December designing and creating a foot orthosis for a child in need. Throughout this process, the students will learn about the design process in engineering.

7th Grade STEM

We will be learning about multiview sketches and technical drawings in 7th grade STEM. We will use what we've learned with those sketches to design and create a puzzle cube to bring home.

8th Grade STEM

Students coming in will spend the month of December starting their paper roller coaster designs. Students are given a budget to create a roller coaster that last the longest when sending a marble down the track.

Robotics

My robotics students have been working hard creating a pull toy out of vex parts. These pull toys took a little longer than I planned for, mostly because of the intricate designs that the students came up with! Art - Mrs. Hemker

Grade 5

Welcome to MS, grade 5 families! This month, 5th graders will be working on a variety of portraits. A painting of a dog or another animal that represents them is the first focus. Later this month, portraits will turn to a more realistic style where we will look at facial features and proportions. If time allows, we will also be working on an abstract painting of our names.

Grade 6

As we begin the Trimester, 6th grade will be working on some mini-works in various styles. Our first project will include creating a portfolio for storage. Students will fill this portfolio with completed works by the end of the trimester. Our first large scale project will guide a review of material use by creating a portrait sampler. Students will then move on to some artist research and will create an informational poster as well as a parody.

Grade 7

7th graders will spend the month of December experimenting with drawing from different points of view. One of the projects will require students to create the entire drawing from start to finish by observing an inanimate object of their choice. We will also be working on observational drawings of shoes, which will include a shading review.

Grade 8

Students in 8th grade will be working on projects that represent themselves this trimester. Our first project will be a design that will be considered for this year's class t-shirt. The next will be a poster featuring a quote that describes them. The poster will include a hand written font. 8th graders will also begin to design their wall block as a lasting way to represent their 8th grade self.

8th Grade Elective

This month we will be glazing and using our handmade clay watercolor palettes and completing our cardboard sculptures. If time allows, we will also be working on color pencil skills and abstract drawings.







During our Healthy Living Inclusion Activities, students had the opportunity to experience sitting volleyball.We introduced the activity by watching a clip from the Paralympics.





ROASTED GARITC PARMESAN BRUSSELS SPROUTS

INGREDIENTS:

- 16 oz Brussels sprouts, rinsed and cut in half 1 tablespoon olive oil
 - 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning ½ teaspoon garlic powder ¼ cup grated parmesan cheese
 - Salt and Pepper to taste

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 400°F (200°C).
- 2. Wash Brussels sprouts to remove any dirt. Remove any yellow or damaged leaves.
- 3. Trim the bottom of the Brussels sprouts, and slice each Brussels sprout in half, top to bottom. Prepare a large baking sheet (you can line it with foil or parchment paper if you like).
- 4. Pat the Brussels sprouts dry with paper towels and place them in a large bowl. Add olive oil, Italian seasoning, garlic, salt, and pepper. Toss gently to coat the Brussels sprouts evenly. Sprinkle parmesan and stir to coat.
- 5. Place the Brussels sprouts on the prepared baking sheet, spreading evenly into one layer. Bake the parmesan Brussels sprouts on the center rack for 25 to 30 minutes -Adjust the time depending on your oven. The vegetables should be golden brown.
- 6. Transfer the parmesan roasted Brussels sprouts to a serving bowl or plate and enjoy!


