WSMS STUDENT DROP OFF AND PICK UP

IMPORTANT ~ INFORMATION

STUDENT CELL PHONE USE

Students at our middle school are NOT allowed to carry cell phones with them throughout the school day. If a student brings a cell phone to school it:

Must be turned off

Must be kept in the student's locker

Cell phones are absolutely NOT allowed on the playground or in the bathroom/locker room.

Students are NOT allowed to use cell phones to take video recordings of other students at school. Students not following the guidelines will be subject to disciplinary action. Please call if you have any questions.

ALLERGIES

We have several students in the district who have severe allergies to peanuts, tree-nuts and latex. For this reason we are asking that you follow the district policy below:

Our schools are latex-controlled schools. Materials that contain high concentrations of latex, such as most balloons, are prohibited. Our schools are also peanut/tree-nut aware. Please do not send any foods that contain peanuts or tree-nuts (cashews, almonds, pecans, etc.). Please contact the office or the school nurse w/questions regarding any product or material you may wish to bring to the school before bringing the item into the school.

EMERGENCY CONTACT INFORMATION

Please remember to keep the office informed of any changes in your contact information as soon as possible. It is important for us to be able to contact you in the event of an emergency.

If you have caller ID and you have a missed a phone call from the middle school, please understand that we are unable to identify the person, extension number, or department that was trying to reach you. Rest assured that if your child is sick or injured, the school nurse will leave a message for you.

Please remind your child to leave a message if they call you.

*Even though students are not allowed to use their cell phones in school, we understand that they may need to text, email or call you if they are not feeling well. Please make sure they have been to the school nurse first and the nurse will then contact you.

SCHOOL SECURITY

The middle school doors will be locked during the school hours of 8:00am - 3:10pm. When coming to the middle school, you will need to be buzzed into the building by using the button located on the east wall of the main entrance on East Ave (door A). Once you enter the building, please sign in in the office.



ATTENDANGE

Each day we are in school, it is very important for us to have the most up-to-date attendance for our students. There are several ways to report absences for illness, appointments, vacations, etc:

We highly encourage you to <u>report any absences</u>, <u>appointments</u>, <u>or vacations by 8:00 a.m.</u> each day. Even if your child was sick the day before and will be out again, we still need to hear from you. If you are not in contact us, we then have to call each family that has not reported their child's absence, which can become very time-consuming.

You can call 608-786-2090, Option 1, and leave a message at any time of the day or night. You can leave all absence messages on this voicemail. You can even leave information that is scheduled weeks to months in advance. We keep a yearly spreadsheet with all absences that are reported to us.

You can email at msoffice@wsalem.k12.wi.us. The office will be able to update your child's attendance in Skyward and call you back if there are any questions.

While we understand that appointments are sometimes forgotten, **advanced notification** allows us to have your child ready for pickup in a timely manner.

Final reminder....if your child has an appointment with a medical professional, **please try your best to get a doctor's note** so that we can verify the time away from school. Students are allotted 10 absences per year, and these doctor's notes are used so that appointments are not counted in the 10-day total.

Our goal is to work side-by-side with families to ensure that all students are safe and accounted for each day!

TOO SICK FOR SCHOOL?



Below are guidelines to help parents and school districts determine when to keep children/students home from school. The recommendations are based on guidelines provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and state public health professionals. They were developed to help prevent the spread of potentially contagious disease. Home is the best place for a child who is ill. If your child is sick with a diagnosed communicable disease, please notify the school as soon as possible. This notification will greatly assist others who, due to medical reasons and/or treatments, have weakened immune systems and may require immediate and specialized care.



FEVER

With fever greater than 100.4° F*. Student may return when fever-free for **24 hours** (WITHOUT use of fever-reducing medicine).



RASH

Any new rash accompanied by a fever. May return after rash goes away or clearance given by a health care provider.



VOMITING/DIARRHEA

Any unexplained vomiting episode. May return 24 hours after last episode. Diarrhea = three or more unexplained episodes of watery or loose stool in 24 hours OR sudden onset of loose stools. May return 24 hours after last episode.



SKIN LESIONS/SORES

Drainage from a sore that cannot be contained within a bandage OR sores are increasing in size OR new sores are developing day-to-day.



COUGH

Serious, sustained coughing, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing.



OTHER

Symptoms that prevent the student from active participation in usual school activities OR student is requiring more care than school can safely provide.

^{*} Many authorities use either 100 (37.8 degrees Celsius) or 100.4 F (38.0 degrees Celsius) as a cut-off for fever, but this number actually can range depending on factors such as the method of measurement and the age of the person. CDC has public health recommendations that are based on the presence (or absence) of fever. What is meant by this is that the person's temperature is not elevated beyond their norm. In order to provide clarity the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction supports the use of 100.4°F.



5TH GRADE DECEMBER UPDATE





Math: Students will continue to work with decimal numbers. They will focus on adding and subtracting decimal numbers and focusing on place value. They will also be doing an ugly sweater math project. This project will apply what the students have done with adding/subtracting decimals numbers to keep an accurate budget.



Writing: We have shifted our focus to informational writing. They have been introduced to paraphrasing and note taking. Students will apply that knowledge to their informational writing about a historical event which they research. They will support their information with a variety of text features.

Reading: We will be finishing our unit on Native Americans. We will be assessing students on nonfiction comprehension and vocabulary. AIMSWeb screening will also be taking place in December.

Social Studies: Students are wrapping up the ship simulation and the Western Exploration portion of the unit. They will start to focus more on the first English settlements in America and colonization.

Science: We will be wrapping up our Ecosystems and Matter Cycling Unit. Students have been learning what matter is, where energy originates, and how both matter and energy move throughout the food chain. We will begin our Matter Properties unit in mid-December.



D.A.R.E:

Students will begin weekly D.A.R.E. lessons with La Crosse County Deputy Cody Bernhardt. This program gives kids the skills they need to handle the pressures that adolescence brings. This will eventually lead to a reflection paper and visual project. Our D.A.R.E. program will end with a graduation ceremony on Thursday, March 5th.

OTH GRADE NEWSLETTER DECEMBER 2025

Reading & Englisth - Mrs. Schultz & Mrs. Buisman

OMG-N-G! Oh My Gods and Goddess, we are studying Greek Mythology! Gods, Goddesses- the immortals; men, women, and heroes- the mortals; these beings will be the focus of our next unit of study on myths. Myths are stories which teach morals or lessons and proper human behavior. In some instances, myths give explanations of nature and why things are as they are. This December, we will be combining Reading and English to explore Ancient Greek myths and Greek Drama. Students will investigate fractured fairy tales to see how authors have given those traditional stories a modern twist with added humor. Then, in groups, the sixth graders will create and perform a skit involving one of the myths studied, giving it their special twist to "fracture" it. At the end of December, the Greek Drama Festival will feature the best groups from each class and their mythological creation! We plan on live streaming and recording this performance so the adults can enjoy the creations as well. Be sure to find out your student's favorite Greek myth, god, goddess, or hero!

Social Studies - Mrs. Jeranek

Ancient Egypt will be our focus in December. We will explore the location and geography of Egypt, and researched the unintended (nature-made) and intended (man-made) technologies that improved Ancient Egyptian lives. Some of those technologies are still used throughout the world today!

Further into December, we continue to studies Ancient Egypt with a focus on Economy: the jobs people held and the conflicts that occurred between social classes. Ancient religion allows us to study scientific and mathematical developments necessary for pyramid construction and mummification to reach the afterlife,

along with the movement of Israelites out of Egypt to reach their Promise Land.

To culminate our unit, students will be asked to research an Egyptian topic they'd like to know more about. Focusing on reading informational strategies, students will share their findings with their classmates. Have a wonderful December!



Math - Mrs. Alo & Mrs. Jehn

In December, students will continue working in Chapter 4 which covers percentages and real-life percent problems. This is another great chapter because it focuses on skills they will use the rest of their lives such as finding the best deal in order to save the most money. Ask your student to help you find the price after coupons and discounts that take a percentage off the original price. Have them help you figure out the tip for the server at the restaurant or for the hairdresser. Maybe with their new skills they will be able to help you save money as you shop for Christmas!

Right before break, students will begin the first half of Chapter 5 which is all about algebraic expressions and properties. Many of the concepts such as variables, combining like terms, and the various properties will be new to students.

Accelerated Math - Mrs. Jehn

Students will work in Chapter 7 in the month of December which covers geometry topics including area, surface area, and volume. Students will learn the areas of parallelograms, triangles, trapezoids, kites, and composite figures. Then they will then learn to find the surface area and volume of three-dimensional figures including prisms and pyramids.


They will also begin working in the first half of Chapter 8 - Integers, Number Lines, and the Coordinate Plane. Understanding positive and negative integers typically is easy for students because they have grown up in Wisconsin. Later when they extend their thinking to use the basic math operations with positive and negative integers this concept becomes a little more difficult.





Science - Mrs. Jarosh

6th Grade students have been working to learn the first 20 Elements of the Periodic Table. We celebrated their efforts by making mini models of atoms with shrinky dinks!

Class Supplies: All students are required to have their binder and composition notebook. Both are left in the classroom to ensure they are never lost and are easily accessible. In addition, students should bring headphones and an independent book to class each day.

Science Mr. Baker





Some students may have even made bread at home as part of a bonus activity! In December, we will jump into genetics and dissect deer hearts!

Social Studies Mr. Mahlum



In 7th grade social studies, we will start to look at the Bill of Rights. These first ten Amendments to the US Constitution include many of the freedoms we have. Students will first look at the 1st Amendment and examine how those five freedoms impact our lives. Students will also look at the rights of those accused of a crime and how they protect us from being treated unfairly.





DECEMBER EDITION

ELA- Mrs. Meyer & Ms. Sackett



In 8th grade ELA, we have been focusing on identity since the start of the year. Beginning in December, we will transition from looking at our own identity to looking at the barriers faced by people throughout time. Students will start by selecting one book from a list of over 200 books to read with a character facing some type of barrier. We will use the topics from their selected books and the following WI State Civics Standard to guide exploration for their research paper. SS.PS2.c.m (6-8 grade) Compare and contrast the political, social, and economic status of marginalized groups both historically and in the present, both in the United States and worldwide. Investigate how groups (e.g., women, religious groups, civil rights groups, indigenous peoples, LGBTQ) have advocated for access to greater rights. Students have complete choice in all activities leading up to research and in the topic that they choose to research. Once students have selected their topic, we will do some practice note taking to prepare them for eventually taking their own notes for a research paper. Although our major writing focus is changing, our classroom routine is staying the same, allowing for plenty of practice reading and writing a variety of pieces. We also started our next read aloud, Where Wolves Don't Die by Anton Treuer, prior to leaving for Thanksgiving break and will finish it before winter break.

SOCIAL STUDIES- Ms. Morgan

As we move into December, our classes are wrapping up our study of the American Revolution. Students have explored major battles, key figures, turning points, and the powerful ideas that shaped the founding of the United States.

Next, we'll begin an exciting project: creating individual podcasts for our Voices and Stories of the American Revolution unit. Each student will research a person or event from the founding of our nations. They will investigate Patriots, Loyalists, soldiers, civilians, enslaved people, Native Americans, or others whose voices help tell a fuller story of the Revolution. Students will complete their research and begin drafting their podcast scripts before we leave for the holiday break. Final podcast episodes will be due in mid-January. We're looking forward to hearing the thoughtful, creative work our students produce.

We will addressing the following learning targets this month:

MATH 8- Mrs. Coe & Mrs. Snook

We finished up Angles and Triangles (Unit 3) mid November and started working on Unit 4 Graphing and Writing Linear Equations. We will test on Unit 4 and start working on Systems of Linear Equations (Unit 5) in December.

Regular Math (Unit 4) - Mrs. Coe and Mrs. Snook

The learning targets for Unit 4:

- \rightarrow 4.1: Graph linear equations.
- ightarrow 4.2: Find and interpret the slope of a line.
- → 4.3: Graph proportional relationships.
- ightarrow 4.4: Graph linear equations in slope intercept form.
- \rightarrow 4.5: Graph linear equations using intercepts.
- \rightarrow 4.6: Write equations of lines in slope intercept form.
- \rightarrow 4.7: Write equations of lines in point-slope form.



ALGEBRA- Mrs. Coe

We will wrap up Unit 4 on Writing Linear Functions and begin Unit 5 on Solving Systems of Linear Equations. We had our first two Mathcounts competitions in November, and will have our last in school competition in December. We will decide our official Mathcounts team before the holiday break!

The learning targets for Unit 5:

- \rightarrow 5.1: Solve linear systems by graphing.
- \rightarrow 5.2: Solve linear systems by substitution.
- \rightarrow 5.3: Solve systems of linear equations by elimination.
- \rightarrow 5.4: Solve linear systems with different numbers of solutions.
- \rightarrow 5.5: Solve equations by graphing.
- \rightarrow 5.6: Graph linear inequalities in two variables.
- \rightarrow 5.7: Graph and write systems of linear inequalities.

SCIENCE - Mrs. Smith-Waller

Science - 8th Grade - Ms. Smith-Waller

We just finished up our unit learning about weathering, erosion, and deposition focusing on how those processes change the surface of the Earth. We are going to take a little break from Geology and start our Astronomy unit next. We will begin by looking specifically at the Earthmoon-sun system and how those objects interact with each other. Our first focus will be the phases of the moon. We will complete a few activities demonstrating how the phases change and why we see what we see. Enjoy the season change as we near the Winter Solstice!


6TH GRADE

Winter Squash is the Harvest of the Month!

Add winter squash to your favorite family meals:

- Dice, microwave or roast and add to salad, tacos, rice, or mac and cheese.
- Halve squash, roast cut side down, then add stuffing
- Puree microwaved or roasted squash for a soup or pie!

Make meals and memories together. It's a lesson kids will use for life.

- Select Choose squash that are heavy, firm, and have a full stem.
- Store Store in a cool, dark place for up to one month.

Prepare – Squash with thinner skin, like delicata and sweet dumpling, can be eaten without being peeled. Other winter squash, like butternut or acorn, have a hard rind that can be peeled with a vegetable peeler or sharp knife. You can peel squash before or after cooking.

Did you know?

In Aztec, Incan, Mayan, and Native American cultures, squash was grown in companionship with corn and beans. Squash, corn, and beans make up the traditional "Three Sisters".

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Squash Soup Serves 6

Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoon olive oil (or cooking oil of choice)
- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 2 medium carrots, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 cup no salt added canned tomato sauce
- 5 cups low-sodium chicken or vegetable broth
- 4 cups winter squash, cooked
- 1 1/2 tablespoons dried oregano
- 1 1/2 tablespoons dried basil

Direct ions:

- 1. Wash hands with soap and water.
- 2.In a large saucepan, heat oil over medium heat.
- 3. Stir in onions, carrots, and garlic.
- 4. Cook for about 5 minutes, covered.
- 5.Stir in the tomato sauce, chicken broth, cooked squash, and herbs.
- 6.Bring soup to a simmer and cook, covered, for 30 minutes.
