## **Attendance Reporting**

Each day we are in school, it is very important for us to have the most up-to-date attendance for our students. There are several ways to report absences for illness, appointments, vacations, etc:

- We highly encourage you to report any absences, appointments, vacations by 8:00 a.m. each day. Even if your child was sick the day before and will be out again, we still need to hear from you. If you are not in contact us, we then have to call each family that has not reported their child's absence, which can become very time-consuming.
- While we understand that appointments are sometimes forgotten, advanced notification allows us to have your child ready for pickup in a timely manner.
- You can call 608-786-2090, Option 2, and leave a message at any time of the day or night. You can leave all absence messages on this voicemail. You can even leave information that is scheduled weeks to months in advance. We keep a yearly spreadsheet with all absences that are reported to us.
- You can email the Attendance Secretary, Stephanie Pearson, at <a href="mailto:pearson.stephanie@wsalem.wi.k12.us">pearson.stephanie@wsalem.wi.k12.us</a>. She will be able to update your child's attendance in Skyward and call you back if there are any questions.
- Final reminder....if your child has an appointment with a medical professional, please try your best to get a doctor's note so that we can verify the time away from school. Students are allotted 10 absences per year, and these doctor's notes are used so that appointments are not counted in the 10-day total.

Our goal is to work side-by-side with families to ensure that all students are safe and accounted for each day!

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## 5th Grade Update

### Math:

Students will be reviewing fraction operations and start working on dividing with fractions and whole numbers. The biggest focus will be on problem solving and understanding what is really happening as they multiply and divide fractions. After the unit we will be doing a project adjusting traditional recipes using multiplication and division.

### Reading:

Students will continue to focus on nonfiction reading and comprehension skills. Some classes will be wrapping up finding the main idea and supporting details. They will be working on summarizing to find the theme. They will have the option to read graphic novels.

## Writing:

Students will be creating their own graphic novel that has a theme in the story. Students will write the story and illustrate the pictures. Kids will be participating in classroom spelling bees.

### Science:

Students will continue to learn about space. This month we're focusing on the solar system. As part of this unit, students will complete a project about a space-related topic. The majority of the project will be completed during science class.

### D.A.R.E:

Students will continue having weekly D.A.R.E. lessons with Deputy Cody. This will eventually lead to a reflection paper and visual project.

## **Social Studies:**

Colonial America is up next in history. Students will learn about the villages, schools, people, and laws associated with this time period. We'll map the 13 colonies before moving to the US state/ capital maps.









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Students have been demonstrating their knowledge by building and drawing atoms and molecules. After the break we will be hands on with chemical reactions!





### Regular Math with Mrs. Alo and Mrs. Jehn

Students will complete the second half of Chapter 5 in January which works on algebraic expressions and properties. At the end of this chapter they will be able to write and evaluate algebraic expressions using the commutative, associative, and distributive properties.

Before the end of the month students will begin Chapter 6 titled Equations. They will learn to write, solve, and graph one-variable equations and inequalities using the four basic operations. They will also work with writing and graphing two-variables equations.

#### Advanced Math with Mrs. Jehn

In January students will complete Chapter 8 - Integers, Number Lines, and the Coordinate Plane. Understanding positive and negative integers typically is easy for students because they have grown up in Wisconsin. Later when they extend their thinking to use the basic math operations with positive and negative integers this concept becomes a little more difficult. In the second half of the chapter students will recall skills they learned to write and solve equations and apply those to writing and solving inequalities.

We will also work in Chapter 9 in January learning about statistical measures including mean, median, and mode as well as quartiles, interquartiles, range, mean absolute deviation. The concepts of measures of variation and mean absolute deviation will be new to students and may bring back fond memories of a statistics course you might have taken years ago. These are difficult topics and very abstract for 6th grade minds.







#### Mrs. Buisman - Language Arts

Happy New Year! With the beginning of 2024, we are starting a new unit in writing. Students will begin their opinion/argument unit in January. Students will practice using a variety of topics to research and make a claim that shows their opinion. Students will then back up their claims with factual evidence. We will have 2 larger papers during this unit. The first will be about whether chocolate milk should be allowed in school and the other will be a choice between 3 other school related topics.

#### Mrs. Schultz - Reading

In January, we revisit our word work with prefixes and suffixes, as well as continuing our novel study. Towards the end of January we will begin the 6<sup>th</sup> grade unit on Social Issues. During this unit students will learn about discrimination, social issues, and read one or more novels dealing with race relations in the mid-1900s. The unit begins with mini-investigations on important events, groups and people of the Civil Rights Era. We will look critically at some of the actions and opinions of people during the Civil Rights Movement and those in the novels, revisiting and connecting with the types of conflicts we explored in Touching Spirit Bear. Another aspect of this unit is to realize the diversity of human experience and see this period of our history through the eyes of the reporters and people who were living at the time, as well as the characters in our novels. Happy 2024!



### Reading/ELA - Mrs. Rochester and Mrs. Friell

<u>Agendas/Lessons</u>: Work to be turned in for grade is posted on the Homework Hotline. The specific daily plan is posted in Google Classroom. If a student needs to miss school, please check GC for required work.

<u>Writing and Language</u>: Each class period, we practice working on sentences and/or parts of speech. In January we will work on compound sentences. We will also continue to review the four parts of speech we've reviewed so far (noun, verb, and adjectives). Word work will continue to include learning roots and spelling words. We have been working on paragraph structure and this month will focus on citing text evidence to support arguments.

<u>Reading</u>: Students have been reading self-selected books and argument articles about various topics. In January, they will read articles about social media and write an argument essay on this topic. They will be posted in GC.

#### Mr. Mahlum - Social Studies

In 7th grade Social Studies the students will continue to focus on the Bill of RIghts. Students will look at the rights we as citizens have due to the first ten amendments to our Constitution. Towards the end of the month we will look at some of the other Amendments outside of the Bill of Rights that have given citizens more rights here in America.

#### Math 7- Mrs. Weber and Mrs. Piersma

Welcome Back and Happy New Year! We hope everyone had a wonderful break and holiday. As we return, we will be reviewing a few things on inequalities before the break and then finishing up that unit. We will also be taking our winter Fastbridge test as part of our district screener. Let's make it a great 2024.

#### Pre- Algebra- Mrs. Weber

Happy New Year to all of you. I hope everyone had a wonderful break and enjoyed the holidays. We will be continuing with the 8th grade book and unit on angles. We will be Fastbridge testing the week we return as part of the district screener. Let's make it a great 2024!

#### Science - Mr. Baker

Even though we are getting into the heart of the cell process unit, we made a switch to dissect deer hearts before winter break! After break we will finish up with some discussions on how cancer works in your body and then move on to genetics and why we are the way we are. ## ELA- Mrs. Meyer & Ms. Sackett



To start the new year, we will hand out new books selected by the students to be read independently. These books will lead to researching some barriers faced by people in the reading. We will read these books each day, respond in our journals, and discuss the content with our Barriers Book Groups. In addition, we will spend time reviewing how to take good notes and how to find credible sources. We will use these skills as we begin to study what barriers exist and what steps have been taken to break down the barriers. Eventually, we will put the research together into a five-paragraph essay. Additionally, we will continue to practice writing a variety of sentence types and will incorporate them in our research papers.

We wrapped up Unit 5 on Solving Systems of Linear Equations. We will expand our knowledge of functions and sequences and begin Unit 6 on Exponential Functions and Sequences in January.

### MATH 8- Mrs. Coe & Mrs. Snook

We finished up Unit 4 Graphing and Writing Linear Equations just before Winter Break. During January, we will be investigating Systems of Linear Equations (Unit 5).

## SCIENCE-Ms. Smith-Waller

Happy New Year! We have been learning about Plate Tectonics and this month we will finish up a group project. For this project, groups will research a topic supporting Plate Tectonic Theory and then present their work to the rest of the class. We will conclude that unit with an assessment. After our assessment we will be moving on to focus on Earth's history and Geologic Time. We will learn to determine the relative age of rocks and how to match layers of rock from different locations. Then we will complete an activity to demonstrate how radioactive decay of elements is used to find the absolute age of rocks. To round out this unit, we will learn about fossils and look more closely at the eras of Earth's history as well as the significant events that help us organize our history into the geologic time scale. As a unit project students will create a timeline of Earth's history using a predetermined scale. After finishing up our unit on Earth History, we will finish up the year learning about Astronomy.

#### Essential Learning Outcomes:

- Analyze and interpret data to provide evidence for phenomena.
  - MS-ESS2-3: Analyze and interpret data on the distribution of fossils and rocks, continental shapes, and seafloor structures to provide evidence of the past plate motions.
- Construct a scientific explanation based on valid and reliable evidence obtained from sources and the assumption that theories and laws that describe nature operate today as they did in the past and will continue to do so in the future.
  - MS-ESS1-4: Construct a scientific explanation based on evidence from rock strata for how the geologic time scale is used to organize Earth's 4.6-billion-year-old history

## **SOCIAL STUDIES- Ms. Morgan**

The start of 2024 finds our 8th-grade social studies students wrapping up their study of the American Revolution. Our next destination is the challenging years faced by the new republic as we moved toward effectively governing ourselves. We will do a short review of the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and government structure before looking at the early presidents.

#### Our learning targets will include:

- 8.FE.1: Critique the effectiveness of the Articles of Confederation and the U.S. Constitution
- 8.FE.2: Summarize the roles and powers of each of the three branches of the government and the requirements for anyone involved in each.
- 8.FE.3: Explain the challenges that the new nation faced following the American Revolution
- 8.FE.4 Interpret the role of important individuals and events leading to the result of the American Revolution
- 8.FE.5: Assess Washington's and Adams' contributions to the creation of the presidency







#### Grade 5

Welcome to MS grade 5 families! This trimester, Mrs. Kjos and Mrs.Burdick's classes are attending art. We began the trimester working on an abstract painting of our names. After that they have been working on a variety of portraits. A painting of an animal that represents them in personality was first focus followed by a pop art portrait. Later this month, portraits will turn to a more realistic style where we will look at facial features and proportions.

#### Grade 6

6th grade continues to work on some mini-works in various styles. Our first task was creating a portfolio for storage. Students will fill this portfolio with completed works by the end of the trimester. Our first large scale project guided a review of material use by creating a portrait sampler. Students will then move on to some artist research and will create an informational poster as well as a parody.

#### Grade 7

7th graders will spend the month experimenting with drawing from different points of view. One of the projects will require students to create the entire drawing from start to finish by observing an inanimate object of their choice. We will also be working to complete our unit focusing on one point perspective.

#### Grade 8

Students in 8th grade continue to work on projects that represent themselves this trimester. Our first project was a design that will be considered for this year's class t-shirt. They then created a medallion or a coat of arms to tell the story of them. Now we will move on to practicing Acrylic Paint techniques. 8th graders will also begin to design their wall block as a lasting way to represent their 8th grade self.

#### 8th Grade Elective



After that we will move to liquid watercolor techniques and use the clay palettes that they created during the 1st trimester. If time allows, we will move on to various drawing techniques and media at the end of January.

In 5th and 6th grade PT, we learned greetings and farewells along with the Spanish alphabet. We will be finishing up the rotation learning numbers 0-100. As with the other two units, we will be playing lots of learning games to help assimilate their Spanish vocabulary.

#### 7th & 8th Grade Panther Time

In 7th and 8th grade PT, we have been watching YouTube videos and having subsequent discussions about the various cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. We started with Spain and from there, we explored the cultural aspects of Mexico, as well as some of the other hispanic nations of Central and South America and the Caribbean.

#### 7th Grade Spanish

In December, we learned some expressions with greetings and farewells, along with some Christmas vocabulary. We even sang Deck the Halls in Spanish! We will next be starting our 4th unit, La universidad, which generates students' interests in future endeavors while in the target language.







# HARVEST OF THE MONTH NEWSLETTER JANUARY 2024





#### Select – Choose beets with firm, smooth skins and crisp leaves. Smaller beets are more tender.

Store – Remove greens leaving about 1 inch of stem. Store beets in a plastic bag in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.

Prepare – Rinse beets under cool running water and scrub with a vegetable brush. Beets can be eaten raw or cooked. You can eat the beet greens too!

#### **Beets are The Harvest of the Month!**

#### Add beets to your favorite family meals:

- Add grated raw beets to salad.
- Mix cooked beets into mashed potatoes for a pop of color.
- Add raw or leftover cooked beets to canned vegetable beef soup and simmer until tender.

Make meals and memories together. It's a lesson kids will use for life.

#### Did you know?

Most of the beets grown in Wisconsin are red beets, but there are also pink, purple, white, and yellow beets. Try a rainbow of beet colors!

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## Recipe of the month

#### Root Vegetable Gratin

#### Serves 8

#### Ingredients:

- 1 Tbsp softened butter
- 1-2 sweet potatoes
- 3 medium beets
- 3 parsnips
- 14 Tbsp milk, divided
- 5 oz grated parmesan cheese, divided
- 1 Tbsp fresh thyme (or 1 tsp dried)
- 1 clove garlic, minced (or 1/2 tsp powder)
- Salt and Pepper to taste

#### **Directions:**

Preheat oven to 400°, grease a 3-quart baking dish with softened butter. Peel vegetables and thinly slice and transfer each vegetable to its own bowl. Pour 4 T milk onto potatoes and parsnips, and 2 T onto beets. Add 1/2 oz cheese, thyme, and salt and pepper to each bowl. Toss each bowl until all slices are well coated. Pour remaining milk, parmesan, thyme, and garlic into bowl and mix well, pour into bottom of baking dish. Layer and arrange vegetable slices neatly in the baking dish, pouring any remaining liquid in bowls over the top. Season with salt, pepper and remaining 1 oz parmesan. Cover with foil and bake for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake an additional 15-20 minutes until edges and cheese are lightly browned and vegetables are fork tender.
