MORNING PROCEDURES

Doors open at 7:30. At this time, students will be allowed into the building, or they may stay outside on the playground until 7:43, when the bell rings.

Students are expected to be in their classrooms and ready for instruction at 7:50.

Absences, appointments, and messages

If your child will be absent from school, please call the office by **7:50** in the morning. In the event you receive the voice mailbox, leave a message that includes your child's name, grade, and the reason for the absence. If your child is ill, **please be specific with his/her symptoms.** We are required by state law to report numbers of students ill with strep throat, stomach flu, colds, and chicken pox, so it is important that we have accurate count. We do not report student names, just numbers. If your child's absence is not called in to the school in a timely manner, it is considered an unexcused absence and consequences may be assigned to the student.

You may also call ahead or send a note to the office with any pre-planned absences. We will document it, and you will not have to call again on the day of the absence.

If you notify your student's teachers, PLEASE notify us as well, as sometimes the information doesn't make it to the office.

If your child needs to be picked up for an appointment, please send a note or call the office ahead of time so that your child can be given an out-pass in advance. We appreciate advance notification as it eliminates the need for us to find your child at the last minute when they are being picked up. If your child brings a note from the medical or dental appointment as verification, it is not counted toward the 10 days allowed for your child to be absent from school. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping your child's attendance up to date and informing the school of absences in a timely manner.

We receive many calls daily from parents asking us to relay messages to their children. Please make every attempt to relay these messages to your child before they leave for school.


Middle School Security...

We share a common goal: provide the best education we can as well as fostering rich social and emotional lessons, the aim of which is to develop a well-rounded, responsible and respectful young adult.

Homeroom lessons this month will focus on emotional regulation and values. Having strong feelings is common, normal, and healthy. The key is for us to be able to regulate our feelings instead of our feelings controlling us. There can be many instances throughout the day that cause us to have a quick reaction. Positive self-talk and counting are two strategies that can be helpful in preventing spontaneous reactions. Reminding ourselves to take a deep breath and calm down, count backwards from 10 or naming the feeling can all have a positive impact on our responses. Of course, there are many other strategies you can utilize to help regain control of your feelings. Be sure to have several different options to choose from for yourself.

The average person makes over 35,000 choices a day. Many of these choices -- whether we are aware of them or not -- are motivated by what we value. It's interesting that many of our decisions are based on our values, but seldom do we formally discuss our values with our family telling them 'this is what we value.' It is through our everyday interactions we tend to demonstrate what our values are. Of course, November reminds us to be grateful for the many blessings we have in life. If we truly stop to think about all the good in our lives, that list would be endless! Thank you for entrusting us with your children!

Tips for the Middle Years



Attendance Matters

Missing even a few classes, whether they're in person or online, can have a snowball effect. Not only does being absent make it hard for your child to keep up, but chronic absenteeism is linked with a higher dropout rate. Make sure your middle grader knows you expect him to be in every class every day, unless he's sick or there's a family emergency.

Digital Manners

Before your tween sends a text, post, or email, suggest that they ask themself, "Is this nice? Would I say it in person?" If the answer to either question is no, it's a good idea to reword. Tip: If they feel the need to type a disclaimer like "No offense, but ... " they probably shouldn't hit "send."



Fine tune that Study Routine

Set the scene- Silence electronics, set a timer to take breaks, and gather supplies and snacks before starting homework.

Always have a plan-Your middle grader could find a regular time to study each day that fits with mealtimes and other activities. It might be at 5 p.m. most days and 7 p.m. on Wednesdays when your family eats dinner early. Then, they can start each session by listing specific tasks and how long they expect them to take.

Personalize the approach-The "right" way to study is different for every student. Suggest that your child experiment with study methods to find favorites-sometimes music helps for others silence is best. Desk, bed, kitchen table, all are okay, but make sure the environment is working for your learner.

During math, we will continue to work with decimals. Students will start to add and subtract decimals and whole numbers. They will also apply that knowledge to various word problems.

We will continue to work on our reading strategies to help reach our reading goals. Students should continue to read at home and fill out reading logs. After we finish comparing characters, our lessons will start to shift to nonfiction features and reading strategies.

Math - Ms. McKinney and Mrs. Jehn

October in 6th grade math was all about fractions and decimals. Students spent the month multiplying, dividing, adding, and subtracting them.

November will consist of working in Chapter 3 - Algebraic Expressions and Properties. They will learn to write and evaluate algebraic expressions using coefficients, variables, and constants. Students will also learn about various properties of addition and multiplication including the commutative, associative, and distributive properties to combine like terms and simplify expressions. This will be very new and very abstract for many students.

As November comes to an end, students will begin work in Chapter 4 - Area of Parallelograms. They will learn about the areas of parallelograms, triangles, and trapezoids. Students will also learn how to determine the area of an irregular shape known as a composite figure and how to use a coordinate plane to find the area of a polygon.

Accelerated Math - Mrs. Jehn

Students will complete Chapter 4 - Areas of Polygons at the start of November and be assessed on areas of parallelograms, triangles, trapezoids, composite figures, and polygons in the coordinate plane. In November students will begin working in Chapter 5 which includes ratios, ratio tables, rates, unit rates, comparing ratio and rates, percents, and converting measures. This is one of my favorite chapters because it is so applicable to their lives now and forever. Who doesn't want to find the best deal to save the most money? Ask them to help you shop. They will have learned to find the unit price and compare unit prices - maybe they will be able to help you save money as you shop for Christmas. Happy shopping and saving!

Science: Mrs. Jarosh

We are moving into our Matter and Its Interactions unit which explores the basics of Chemistry. Students will be mastering the foundational skills of atomic composition and learning how to develop models of particle motion. Students will be provided the opportunity to choose an element to research and build a model of. They will continue to work hands-on and collaboratively to develop these skills.

Language Arts: Mrs. Buisman

In the month of November, 6th grade English students will be focusing on summary writing. We will practice and perfect writing summaries as we read different Greek Mythology stories. These stories will build background knowledge of Greek characters and stories because students will be writing and performing skits about their own fractured Greek Mythology story in December. In grammar, we will be focusing on correcting fragments and run-on sentences as well as combining sentences.

Social Studies: Mrs. Jeranek

We have finally settled into routines in 6th Grade Social Studies!

During the month of November, we will work on note-taking and informational reading strategies while learning in person and at home. Our topic will be Ancient Egypt. Students will learn about Egypt's geography, the mummification process, pyramid building, and Egyptian pharaohs. The following standards will be covered:

- -Analyze how technology interacts with the environment.
- -Differentiate between intended and unintended consequences of various forms of technology and how they may affect societies.
- -Locate the major regions on a map and their physical features including continents, cities, countries, bodies of water, landforms, and mountain ranges.
- -Draw evidence from literary or informational texts to support analysis and reflection.
- -Use multiple perspectives to analyze and explain issues or events within and across time periods, events, or cultures. I'm looking forward to another exciting month of learning!

Reading - Mrs. Schultz

SURVIVAL and CHANGES!! Those are some of the themes of the unit we started mid-October. As students are reading and discussing the class novel, Touching Spirit Bear by Ben Mikaelsen, they will be identifying and explaining the themes of the novel as well as the types of conflict found within. We will be focusing on analyzing characters, identifying figurative language devices, and how to use discussion etiquette to have meaningful discussions in which all students can participate. At the end of the unit, students will complete an end of the book project demonstrating their knowledge of theme, conflict, and the changes the characters made throughout the novel. The essential question for this novel has the students thinking how Touching Spirit Bear helps them better understand different human experiences. The question is: How does reading this novel helps you to understand yourself and others? Talk with your student about the novel and how the characters have been changing throughout!



7th Grade

Language Arts - Ms. Friell

Classroom Supplies: All students are required to have a binder and two composition notebooks (one for grammar and one for writing). The binder and notebooks are left in the classroom so they are never lost and remain easily accessible.

Agendas/Lessons: A general plan is posted on the Homework Hotline. The specific plan (along with any materials) is posted in Google Classroom. If a student needs to miss school, please check GC for required work.

Each class period, we practice working on sentences and parts of speech. We've reviewed nouns and verbs and are working on identifying and writing complete sentences. The students have learned the R.A.C.E.S. strategy to write paragraphs. This strategy helps them answer a question while citing and explaining their reasons and evidence. In addition to this more academic writing, they are also preparing to write their own narratives by reading and responding to a variety of short narratives as models.

Math 7- Mrs. Weber and Mrs. Piersma

Happy Fall!! We wrapped up one of our toughest units on rational numbers. This includes fractions and decimals and is usually pretty challenging for many kids. Most did a great job this year, and if they struggled a bit, we will continue to review these concepts throughout the year. We are now learning some basic algebra; solving simple and complex equations with variables. Keep working hard!!!

Pre-Algebra- Mrs. Weber

We are flying through the 7th grade book pretty quickly and will be starting the 8th grade book very soon. The kids are doing a great job of keeping up with the homework and math counts. We had our first school competition in math counts at the end of October. We will have a total of 3 of these which we will use to determine the math counts team. Happy Fall and keep up the hard work!



Reading - Mrs. Rochester

The students have just finished up The Outsiders. Many of the students thoroughly enjoyed the book! It was great to hear the students tell me their parents read this book when they were the same age and enjoyed it! We will also be watching the movie upon completion of the book. Your son/ daughter will be bringing home a permission slip to sign since the movie is rated PG-13. We will be starting our dystopian unit this month. A dystopia is a society that usually has a group of people making negative decisions for the rest of the society. The conditions of the society are usually grim due to overcrowding, sickness, lack of food, and misery. The Hunger Games is a perfect example of a dystopia. During this unit, the students will be given a choice of eight novels to read. They will choose one book and participate in meaningful book activities with other students. They will be discussing characteristics of dystopias and looking at real life examples. Finally, seventh grade students are continuing to study Greek and Latin root words.

Social Studies - Mr. Mahlum

For 7th grade Social Studies, the students will start to explore the early governments we had here in the United States. We will study the first attempt at a written plan of government...which was called the Articles of Confederation. Students will understand why this plan failed and how its failure led to the U.S. Constitution. Once we study the Constitutional Convention, we will then start to pick apart the structure of the U.S. Constitution.

Science - Mr. Baker

In science, we are finishing up with cells and cell processes including one of my favorite labs, the Osmosis Lab! Students dissolved the shells off eggs and then conducted experiments on their egg babies to see what would happen to them in different solutions. Some eggs swelled up and others shriveled! Finally, we took our eggs outside to get rid of them in the most fun way possible! Coming up we will be dissecting deer hearts, so if you hunt please send deer hearts to school for us to use!



8th Grade

Science - Ms. Smith-Waller

It is hard to believe we have already completed two months of school! We finished up our Weather Unit and started learning about how Earth's surface changes. We have been looking at the processes of weathering, erosion, and deposition. In this unit, we will make observations of how things like wind, water, ice, and gravity wear down Earth's surface, move sediments, and then deposit them to build Earth's surface back up again. Next up, we are continuing to look at how geoscience processes have changed Earth's surface by looking at what is going on under the surface. We will be learning about plate tectonics, volcanos, earthquakes, and locations of fossils around the world to get a bigger picture of how Earth's surface has changed throughout its history. Enjoy what is left of the fall! Essential Learning Outcomes:



- Construct a scientific explanation based on valid and reliable evidence obtained from sources and the assumption that theories and laws that describe nature operate today as they did in the past and will continue to do so in the future.
 - MS-ESS2-2: Construct an explanation based on evidence for how geoscience processes have changed Earth's surface at varying time and spatial scales.
- Analyze and interpret data to provide evidence for phenomena.
 - MS-ESS2-3: Analyze and interpret data on the distribution of fossils and rocks, continental shapes, and seafloor structures to provide evidence of the past plate motions.

Social Studies - Ms. Morgan

We have been working our way through the American Revolution this fall. We have explored the events of the revolution and the events leading up to it through multiple perspectives. We have been working on the skills of historians including taking a position on an issue and developing a well-supported argument from quality sources. Students have been challenged to analyze primary source materials from people who were actually there. Later this month, students will have the opportunity to "Be Washington", an interactive leadership experience from Mt. Vernon, as we learn about the events surrounding the Second Battle of Trenton and the Newburgh Conspiracy. Check it out for yourself at www.bewashington.org.

Students also received information related to the DC trip at the end of the year. Students and potential chaperones are asked to return the form on or before 11/4. Fundraising materials were also distributed for the fall candle fundraiser.

English/Language Arts - Ms. Meyer and Ms. Sackett

In 8th grade ELA, we will continue discussing our Identity theme - What makes you....you? by focusing on beliefs. After watching videos, close reading both fiction and non-fiction pieces, and discussing different beliefs, students have written and will turn in a paragraph about one of their own beliefs by using examples from their own lives. Additionally, we will continue the Global Read Aloud, *The Barren Grounds*, and make connections with students from other parts of the country/world as pen pals. Finally, we will further our understanding of and practice with sentence variety by continuing with both compound and complex sentences.

Math - Mrs. Coe & Mrs. Bentzen

Regular Math (Chapter 4) Mrs. Bentzen and Mrs. Coe

We finished up Chapter 3 at the end of October. We will be covering Chapter 4 called "Graphing and Writing Linear Equations" in the month of November.

The objectives for Chapter 4:

- *understand that lines represent solutions of linear equations
- *graph linear equations
- *find slopes of lines by using two points on the line and by using tables
- *identify parallel and perpendicular lines using slopes
- *write and graph proportional relationships
- *find slopes and y-intercepts of graphs of linear equations
- *graph linear equations written in slope-intercept form and in standard form
- *write equations of lines in slope-intercept form
- *write equations of lines using the slope and a point and by using two points

Algebra (Chapters 6) - Mrs. Bentzen

We will finish chapter 5 on November 9th. We will learn how to solve and graph linear inequalities in chapter 6. We completed our first in-school Mathcounts competition at the end of October. We will do our second competition before Thanksgiving break.

The objectives for Chapter 6:

- *write, solve, and graph one-step and multi-step inequalities
- *learn to reverse an inequality sign when multiplying or dividing by a negative number
- *solve and graph compound inequalities using "and" and "or"
- *solve absolute value equations using "or"
- *solve and graph absolute value inequalities using "and" and "or"
- *graph linear inequalities in two variables

Music 5 - Mrs. Glasel (Kjos) and Ms. Nimm (Burdick)

October has been a busy but fun month for making music. The students continued to accompany their singing on the autoharps and barred instruments, but they also added two new instruments - Recorders and Bucket Drums. The recorders reinforce pitch reading, and bucket drumming uses ice cream buckets with chopsticks to make a classroom full of drums to reinforce rhythm playing to pop songs.

A big focus this month was on the 4 families of instruments - Woodwinds, Brass, Percussion, and Strings. Through videos, interactive websites, and worksheets, the students learned what makes each family and each instrument different. The unit will conclude with a neat book called "The Remarkable Farkle McBride".

Keyboards and More 6 - Mrs. Glasel

The students have been continuing to learn some basic skills on the keyboard. We are learning about the names of the lines and spaces in bass clef and treble clef reading.

The students are working on different types of composing. The first project was a parody. The students read an article about parodies, and then wrote one on their own to the tune of "Jingle Bells" using a music writing program on the iPad. The lyrics focused on something about the autumn season. They divided the words to fit with the rhythm of the music. The second project was a Scary Sound Story, which allow the students to explore and create sounds in the Garage Band app.

Our Music Alive magazine article this month will focus on The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

Guitars and Musicals 7 - Mrs. Glasel

Guitars - The students are continuing to play songs on the guitar. They have moved to the second string and added the pitches of B, C, and D. They are able to play songs going back and forth between the 1st and 2nd strings. They also added half notes, dotted half notes, and whole notes to their songs.

Musicals - After learning a little about the theater scene called Broadway, the students started to watch the musical "Hello, Dolly". This humorous musical will show how music helps enhance the story, develop the characters, and shows life in the 1890s.

From Ms. Nimm...

Choirs - All three choirs continue to work on sight-singing and preparing our 2 and 3-part harmony concert music. They also continue to work on sight-singing. A new note (SoI) has been introduced, as well as a new key signature, or place where Do is located. All three grades will do at least one voice recording during class to check on pitch matching, rhythm reading, and part independence.

Small Choir - Students in Small Choir will be finalizing a study on rhythm reading with a project called Pizza Rhythms. This project will require them to write a short piece of music that can be played on 4 different auxiliary percussion instruments. After the piece has been written, the class will perform all of the different Pizza Rhythms.

Soundscapes - Students in Soundscapes will be concluding a study of the voice by finding and then describing a good, okay, and bad singer who has auditioned for one of our many talent based TV competitions. Students will be writing about the singers and then presenting their singers to the rest of the class. Later in the month, we will begin learning about some styles of music that aren't as popular as what can be heard on the radio.

African Drumming - Students in African Drumming continue to practice reading music using Rhythm Cup Explorations. They will be working on Ensemble 5 and will need to make a how-to video that can be presented to my 7th grade Soundscapes class. The video will demonstrate and instruct all of the different instruments, patterns, and the complete ensemble.



Allied, Etc.

Spanish - Mrs. Phillips

6th Grade

Sixth grade Spanish is learning to discuss likes, dislikes and food. We will also look into authentic recipes and traditional dishes. The cultural focus will be on the Day of the Dead traditions, which includes decorating sugar skulls!

7th Grade

The seventh grade Spanish classes have been working on describing themselves and friends. In the month of November, students will work on the verb tener. They will describe things they have and have to do. ¿Qué tienes que hacer?

8th Grade

Students in 8th grade Spanish will practice talking about themselves and family members. To wrap up the trimester, students will discuss families, birthdays and celebrations. We will also read stories and learn about the Quinceañera.

Spanish I/8th Grade Elective

Students in 8th grade elective Spanish are expanding on eighth grade Spanish materials. In the month of November, we will also read about Day of the Dead and the Recycled Orchestra.

Healthy Living - Mr. Brewer, Mrs. Olson, Mr. Reader, Ms. Serres

Colder weather is coming!!! We will be starting some new units to kick off November and one of those will be an Inclusion unit. We still plan to take our classes outside as much as possible until there is a significant amount of snow on the ground, so please remind your children to wear warmer clothes on days they have Healthy Living. We will be transitioning to net/wall activities when we move to indoor classes. We will also be starting our Health-focused lessons.

STEM - Mr. Jones

6th Grade STEM

We are working hard at designing the sturdiest toothpick bridge. Soon, students will be able to test their designs to see who made the best bridge that holds the most weight.

7th Grade STEM

The students are using what they learned with the multi-view sketches to make a puzzle cube. The puzzle cube consists of five separate pieces. Once finished, have fun solving your students' cube!

8th Grade STEM

The students are working hard to get their paper roller coaster finished in class. We are trying to see who can come up with the longest lasting coaster when a marble gets sent down the track. After we finish the coasters, we should have time to design something for the 3D printer.

Robotics

We just finished learning about gears and gear ratios. Next, we will begin building each mechanism (simple gear trains, bevel gears, rack and pinion, leadscrew, crank and slider, worm and wheel). After that, we will use what we learned about the mechanisms to build our own pull toy.

Grade 5

In November, 5th graders will be finishing up their clay work! They will glaze their cupcake container and paint their miniature set of three. They will choose how to finish their choice piece. We will photograph these and then wrap them carefully for home! All projects reviewed a variety of clay techniques that they have learned since they were in Kindergarten. We will also be reviewing color and the color wheel by using a variety of techniques and materials to create 4 separate wheels. We will then move on to a variety of drawing practice projects and the creation of a handmade book to store them all in.

Grade 6

In November, 6th grade will also be finishing their clay. Their carved container will be glazed and refired. They will also be creating a clay animal rattle or whistle, they will choose how to finish these as well as their choice object.. We will also be working on a variety of drawing projects as we complete the trimester.

Grade 7

This month, 7th graders will be finishing up their large scale collage pieces. We will them move on to create a mandala or radial design as well as drawing small objects that they brought from home.

Grade 8

Students in 8th grade will complete their wall block designs as we begin November. They continue to work with acrylic paint to create two large scale abstract paintings that will be woven into a final piece of art. They have also started using Google Drawings to create a mosaic piece of digital art. Hopefully, these classes will also be able to spend a few days drawing in the open air as well as a bit of clay time.

8th Grade Elective

As we begin November, the elective class will be finishing their acrylic tree painting that involves multiple layers and techniques. We will then be working on a cardboard construction project that will review joining techniques as well as sculptural concepts. Lastly, this class will be creating watercolor palettes that will be used to paint a liquid watercolor painting. We continue ongoing work that includes small samples of the materials, and examples of work we have been completing.

One cup of cooked Brussels sprouts has 60 calories and provides vitamin $\mbox{\sc C}$ and $\mbox{\sc A}.$

Fun Facts

Brussels sprouts got their name from Brussels, Belgium, where they originated!

One serving of Brussels sprouts contains as much vitamin C as an orange.

In Wisconsin, peak Brussels sprout season is from about September through December. Look for them at winter farmers' markets!

Uses

Sprouts can be baked, roasted, steamed, or sautéed. The method of cooking greatly influences the flavor . If you don't like them steamed, try them roasted or sautéed.

Try adding sliced sprouts to soups, casseroles or stews!

Try caramelized sprouts – saute sliced sprouts with a little olive oil, minced garlic, salt and a teaspoon or two of brown sugar. Yum!

Family Friendly Activities

Check out your local farmers' market and purchase sprouts that are still in the stalk. Count the number of sprouts on each stalk!

How many cruciferous vegetables can you name? Here are a few examples to get you started: Brussels sprouts, radishes, napa cabbage, and kale!

Roasted Brussels Sprouts

Serves 8 (1/2 cup per serving)

Ingredients:

2 pounds fresh Brussels sprouts 1 Tbsp. olive oil ½ tsp. salt ¼ tsp. black pepper

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Wash and remove the ends of each sprout, along with any discolored leaves. Chop larger sprouts in half to ensure even cooking. Place the sprouts into a bowl with the olive oil, salt and pepper. Spread the sprouts onto a sheet pan and place into the oven for 15-20 minutes until edges are brown and crispy.

This program is voluntary. However, we do require permission from parents for students to attend. Once a student begins the program, we strongly suggest that he/she remains in the program for a minimum of six weeks. We would need to be notified by a parent if a child will no longer be attending the program.

This program is a voluntary opportunity for students and as such, disruptive behavior will not be tolerated. The following rules and expectations will apply:

- Students are expected to attend EDP every day, even if all of their homework is completed. The earliest they can leave is 3:35. They are to bring a book to read which will be a part of the nightly 20 minutes reading
- If a student cannot attend EDP on a certain evening, please notify the office or the EDP supervisor through a phone call or e-mail or a note from a parent.
- If a student does not check in with the EDP supervisor, it will be considered an unexcused absence. We will attempt to notify the parents by telephone or e-mail if a student is not in attendance after school.
- If a student's behavior is disruptive to others, they will call home and may be asked to leave.
- If a student is involved in an after school activity, he/she needs to stay in EDP until 3:35 p.m. and then report to practice.

- We will provide an assignment booklet for each student to keep track of assignments and homework. The EDP supervisor will HIGHLIGHT or CIRCLE incomplete work and initial completed work in order to help communicate with parents. It is suggested that parents require their child to bring this notebook home in order to share where they are at with their work.
- Students are expected to attend EDP every day, even if all of their homework is completed. The earliest they can leave is 3:35. They can read a book or review/study if "all of their work is done."
- If all of their work is completed for the day but still have multiple Fs, they will remain in EDP until 4:15. We expect them to connect with teachers to create a plan to get those grades up.
- If a student cannot attend EDP on a certain evening, please notify the office or the EDP supervisor through a phone call or e-mail or a note from a parent.
- If a student does not check in with the EDP supervisor, it will be considered an unexcused absence. We will attempt to notify the parents by telephone or e-mail if a student is not in attendance after school.
