From the Office

Absences, appointments, and messages

If your child will be absent from school, please call the office by **7:50** in the morning or you can call or send a note in advance. In the event you receive the voice mail, leave a message that includes your child's name, grade, and the reason for the absence. If your child is ill, **please be specific with his/her symptoms.** We are required by state law to report numbers of students ill with strep throat, stomach flu, colds, and chicken pox, so it is important that we have accurate count. We do not report student names, just numbers. If your child's absence is not called in to the school in a timely manner, it is considered an unexcused absence and consequences may be assigned to the student.

You may also call ahead or send a note with any pre-planned absences, and we will document it. Therefore you will not have to call again the day of the absence.

If your child needs to be picked up for an appointment, please send a note or call the office ahead of time so that your child can be given an out pass in advance. We appreciate advance notification as it eliminates the need for us to try and find your child at the last minute when he/she is being picked up. If your child brings a note from the medical or dental appointment as verification, it is not counted toward the 10 days allowed for your child to be absent from school. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping your child's attendance up to date and informing the school of absences in a timely manner.

We receive many calls daily from parents asking us to relay messages to their children. Please make every attempt to relay these messages to your child before he or she leaves for school.

Messages called into the office after 1:30 may not get to your child before dismissal.







We have several students in the district who have severe allergies to peanuts, tree-nuts and latex. For this reason we are asking that you follow the district policy below:

Our schools are designated as latex-controlled schools. Materials that contain high concentrations of latex, such as most balloons, are prohibited. Our schools are also designated peanut/tree-nut aware. We ask that you do not send any foods that contain peanuts or tree-nuts (cashews, almonds, pecans, etc.). If you have questions regarding any product or material you may wish to bring to the school, please contact the office or the school nurse before bringing the item into the school.

Student Prop Off and Pick Up

On page 17 you will see a picture of our front loop for the morning traffic flow drop off.

Buses will drop off students at the high school sidewalk then they will use the new sidewalk by the track/football field to walk to the middle school.

In the interest of your child's safety, all students dropped off or picked up by parents needs to take place on East Avenue. **Temporarily stopping your vehicle on Mark St. to have students get out is NOT safe**. Mark St. is very busy during peak morning and afternoon hours.

Please pull forward all the way to the end of the sidewalk to drop off your child so that more cars can get out of the street and in to the lot.

5th Grade Update:

We are so excited for you to be the second group to "Meet Us in the Middle" at our new school. It was great to see so many of you at open house. We know there are going to be a lot of new and exciting experiences for us all, but we wanted to give you a few important reminders.

With a new building comes new expectations for 5th graders. Students are responsible for dressing appropriately for the weather. We want students to stay healthy and be at school because it is the best thing for their learning. If they do miss school, then they are also responsible for catching up after any absences. In 5th grade, we use Google Classroom and the Homework Hotline to help keep students up to date on assignments. They can utilize the Success Center to help them catch up or complete assignments. This is a new resource for 5th grade, and we are very excited to offer this to our students. The Success Center is open before and after school to allow students to finish assignments or make up tests and quizzes. The staff is equipped to assist students with things they may have missed or do not understand. It is open from 7:00am-7:45am and 3:10pm-4:00pm. The students will also have three different CORE teachers. CORE classes include: Math, Reading, Writing, and Science/Social Studies. Their homeroom teacher will teach them two CORE classes, and then they will rotate to two different teachers for their other two CORE classes.

As a 5th grade team, we decided that iPads will not be sent home every night. Instead, iPads will only come home when students have an assignment or activity that they need to complete that night. We want to ensure that students understand that the iPads are tools to help them be successful in school, so we feel that this is a fair way to help them understand that responsibility. As the year progresses, we might start to allow them to go home on a more regular basis.

We understand that there will be some new challenges for our students, but we are here to help that transition go as smoothly as possible. With the help of WEB leaders and the rest of the Middle School staff, we can help all of our students feel comfortable and excited for this new adventure!

Music 5 - Trimester I - Mrs. Glasel (Kjos) and Ms. Nimm (Burdick)

Welcome to Middle School. Your music class will take on a little different format by having music every day for a trimester. Let's meet your teachers.

Hi, I am Mrs. Glasel, and I'm starting my 30th year of teaching, all here at West Salem. Last year was my first year back to teaching 5th grade music. I taught 5th grade for my first 16 years of teaching before moving completely to the middle school to teach middle school general music and band lessons.



Hi, I am Ms. Nimm, and I'm starting my 14th year of teaching, all here at West Salem, just like Mrs. Glasel! This is my first year teaching 5th grade music and I'm very excited to get started. I also teach Choir (6, 7, 8), Soundscapes (7), and African Drumming (8).



Our classes will be based around the four main concepts of performing,

creating, responding and connecting, so you can bet that they will doing a lot of moving, singing, and activities. We will start off each class with a song, mostly from the Get American Singing...Again! books which are songs that should be common repertoire in our American culture. Then after doing a rhythm or pitch activity, we will focus on a topic or song that reflect history and culture, folk music, and holidays. We will end with a listening or movement activity.



General Music 6 - Mrs. Glasel

This month will focus on getting to know the 6th grade students and making them feel comfortable with middle school. They will learn some basic music skills (pitch reading and rhythms) to get started at learning the piano keyboard, while also doing music appreciation activities to learn about their musical tastes and interests. We also read articles from a music magazine called Music Alive. Articles this month will focus on marching bands and the polka.

General Music 7 - Mrs. Glasel

Welcome to 7th grade music. The students will begin to learn/review basic music reading and as well as applying those skills to playing the guitar. We will begin to learn some simple songs on the first string. Also, they will learn about what is a musical and some terminology related to musicals.





From the 6th Grade Team...

Welcome to 6th Grade!

Thank you for the great turnout at WSMS Open House. For those of you who couldn't make it or those of you who were overwhelmed, we wanted to remind you of a few things.

Personal responsibility is very important in middle school. Included in that is attendance, which is critical with block scheduling since we only see students every other day. However, please have your child stay home if he/she is truly sick. If your child is absent, there are several ways to get caught up. Students should go speak with their teachers about what they missed, but they should also check Google Classroom and Homework Hotline, call or email friends, and utilize the Success Center to receive support in homework completion and understanding.


Google Classroom is an educational app we use to inform students of homework, assessments, classroom activities, etc. Students are also able to view information from classes they may have missed and will need to make up. The Success Center is a resource room for students before and after school to receive help from staff who attend various classes in the building and are equipped to walk students through information they may have missed or just do not understand. It is also where students make up tests and quizzes. It is open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:45 a.m. and again from 3:10 until 4:00 p.m. If students attend the Success Center, parents are responsible for transportation to and from school.

Speaking of homework, students should expect to have homework in math and reading on a nightly basis. Math homework will be an extension of what is learned during class. Students will be given class time to work but most will have to take the homework home to complete. In reading, students are expected to read an independent reading book nightly for a minimum of 20 minutes. Most other classes will have homework on an intermittent basis. Please encourage your child to complete homework the same night it is assigned so they are able to recall what they learned more readily.

During the first few weeks of school, the 6th grade team will be working with your student to make this transition run as smoothly as possible. Your child is in good hands!



We only get to see you every other day! A lot of what we do in class cannot be made up.

Google Classroom- We are continuing to use Google Classroom this year.

Teachers post to Google Classroom daily. The posts include the daily plan and handouts students need. When you are absent, it is your responsibility to check it and talk with the teacher about make up work.





Skyward- Homeroom teachers check grades on Skyward weekly. Students and parents can check Skyward, too. Teachers usually enter grades weekly. Please be patient with teachers to get grades entered after a test or project.



Please, please, please keep your iPad charged! Plug it in every night.



Homework- Students will usually have time to start homework during class. However, there will be times when the students need to finish work at home. Please have a reliable method for you to keep track of your homework- it could be an assignment notebook, planner, or some other way to keep track of homework.



Grade 8 news...

Math - Mrs. Bentzen and Mrs. Coe

Regular Math (Chapter I)

This will be our sixth year in our textbook series called "Big Ideas Math." This series exposes students to highly motivating and relevant problems. Woven throughout the series are the depth and rigor students need to prepare for career-readiness and other college-level courses. In addition, the "Big Ideas Math" series prepares students to meet the challenge of state testing.

The objectives for Chapter 1:

*solve simple equations using addition, subtraction, multiplication or division

*use inverse operations to solve multi-step equations

*use Distributive Property to solve multi-step equations

*solve equations with variables on both sides

*determine whether equations have no solution or infinitely many solutions

*rewrite equations to solve for one variable in terms of the other variable(s)

Algebra (Quick Review Chapters I and 2, Chapter 3)

We will be practicing some basic skills of algebra while learning abut the real number system. We will solve linear equations. We will start Mathcounts early in the month. Students will be required to complete a problem solving worksheet every week.

The objectives for Chapter 1:

*write and evaluate expressions, equations and inequalities

*apply the order of operations to solve real world problems

*represent functions as rules and as tables

*graph functions given a rule or table of values

The objectives of Chapter 2:

*classify real numbers/compare and order integers and rational numbers

*perform basic operations and find square roots

*apply properties to evaluate and simplify expressions

*use the Distributive Property to write equivalent expressions

*use conditional statements and logical reasoning to reason with real numbers

The objectives of Chapter 3:

*use properties of equality to solve one-step, two-step and multi-step equations in one variable *use properties of equality and the distributive property to solve equations with variables on both sides

*write ratios and proportions, solve proportions using cross products *solve percent problems, such as finding the percent of a number, a base, and part of a base *rewrite equations in function form

*solve formulas and literal equations for one variable

English - Mrs. Sackett and Mr. Tashner

In 8th grade English, we are beginning the year by getting to know each other and establishing our classroom routine. We begin each class with a journal write and then move on to lessons developing writing skills. The first writing focus of the year will be various paragraph types. In addition, this fall, in Reading and English classes, we are going to be participating in a global read aloud. A book was selected for this read aloud, and we will join classrooms around the world in reading this book and making global connections. We will also start the year reviewing some of the grammatical principles learned in 7th grade; for example, we will review parts of speech and compound sentences. We are excited to work with this group of 8th graders and look forward to a great year!

Science - Mrs. Smith-Waller

Welcome back everyone! I am so excited to be starting another new year at West Salem Middle School. I hope you enjoyed the summer break and are eager for a fun-filled year in 8th grade science. I am excited to teach you all about the Earth! Before we dig into learning about many aspects of our amazing planet Earth, we will briefly refresh our memories on how to become better scientists. To do this, we will take a look at some Science and Engineering Practices (SEPs) to help us in the process of thinking like a scientist. Then we will begin our Astronomy unit with a focus on the Earth-sun-moon system. Please don't hesitate to contact me with questions or concerns, and once again, welcome!

Essential Learning Outcomes:

- Developing and Using Models: developing, using, and revising models to describe, test, and predict more abstract phenomena and design systems.
- Develop and use a model of the Earth-sun-moon system to describe the cyclic patterns of lunar phases, eclipses of the sun and moon, and seasons.





Reading - Miss Friell

Supplies: To be prepared for class, students must bring the following to class every day: pen/pencil, iPad, book of choice (fiction or non-fiction), and a Reading binder. The students' Reading binders will stay in the classroom, so they only have to get it off the shelf at the beginning of class!

Independent Reading: In the first two weeks of school students will go to the library and check out books of their choice. They should be reading these books at home on a daily basis (a minimum of 20 minutes). They are also given 20 minutes to read their choice books during every Reading class. Please ask your son/daughter to tell you about what he/ she is reading.

Vocabulary: In addition to "A Word A Day" (from the book 100 Words Every Middle Schooler Should Know), we will work on vocabulary in the following ways: studying Greek and Latin roots, working with new words in the fiction and non-fiction works we read as a class (often coordinating with other 8th grade curricular areas), and by keeping an independent vocabulary list.

Right away in the beginning of September, 8th graders will participate in the Global Read Aloud, a project created in 2010. The goal of the project is to have students around the world read a book that is relevant to all of us. During the reading, students are able to connect with other students around the world. This year's Global Read Aloud is *The Bridge Home* by Padma Venkatraman. Students will be required to apply their knowledge of literary elements. And, as the book is set in India, 8th graders will read informational text about India.

Social Studies - Miss Morgan

Eighth grade Social Studies explores the history of our nation from the events that led to the American Revolution through the Civil War which nearly tore the country apart. Throughout the year, students will work to develop the skills that historians use each and every day-- analysis, research, critical thinking, and so much more.

Students will once again be research and developing a National History Day project which will focus on this year's theme "Breaking barriers in History". Students may choose a historical topic of their choice as long as it occurred 25 years or more ago and it fits with the theme. Upon completion of their research, students will present their findings in the form of one of the following: exhibit, website, documentary, historical paper, or performance. The best projects from WSMS will participate in the regional competition at UW-La Crosse in mid-March.

Watch for information on the DC trip late September to early October. If you are planning ahead, this year's trip will be May 31-June 5th. We will also be in need of parent chaperones for this trip. Parents wishing to participate should return the permission form which will be sent home ASAP. Prices are still be negotiated, but we hope to have more information shortly.

Following their learning in September, students will be able to:

- Explain pop culture and historical events that occurred within their lifetimes
- Describe important facts (who, what, when, where, why) of current events
- · Develop an argument about why the American Revolution was justified





Spanish - Mrs. Phillips

6th Grade

Hola, ¿Cómo estás? Sixth grade is working on basic conversations and pronunciation. During the month of September we will continue to practice conversations and add in vocabulary including numbers, weather expressions, days of the week and months. Hispanic Heritage month begins September 15!

7th Grade

In seventh grade Spanish we are starting off by practicing conversational skills. Students will add more details to basic conversations and ask each other questions. We will also discuss the weather in Spanish speaking countries. ¿Qué tiempo hace?

8th Grade and 8th Grade Elective

In eighth grade Spanish we will work on using the classroom phrases regularly. We will also continue developing conversational skills by speaking to each other in Spanish. Our cultural focus will be Hispanic Heritage month which begins September 15.



Art - Mrs. Hemker

Grade 5

Welcome to MS grade 5 families! This month 5th graders will be working on a variety of portraits. A painting of an animal that represents them is the first focus. Also this month, portraits will turn to a more realistic style where will will look at facial features and proportions.

Grade 6

As we begin the Trimester, 6th grade will be working on two main projects. The first is a self portrait. These will be large material samplers, realistic in style and include backgrounds that describe the artist. The other painting will be abstract. For this work students will discuss the elements and principles of art for creating a quality piece.

Grade 7

7th graders will spend the month of September experimenting with drawing from different points of view. One of the projects will require students to recreate and alter an already existing work of art. Another project will be the complete opposite, where students will create the entire drawing from scratch by observing an inanimate object. We will also be working on observational drawings of shoes.

Grade 8

Students in 8th grade will be working on projects that represent themselves this trimester. Our first project will be a design that will be considered for this year's class t-shirt. The next will be a Poster featuring a quote that describes them. The poster will include a hand written font. 8th graders will also begin to design their wall block as a lasting way to represent themselves.

If students attend the Success Center, parents are responsible for transportation to and from school.

Homework

Students should expect to have homework in math and reading on a regular basis. Math homework will be an extension of what is learned during class. Students will be given class time to work, but most will have to take the homework home to complete. In reading, students are expected to read an independent reading book nightly for a minimum of 20 minutes. Most other classes will have homework on an intermittent basis. You should not expect more than an hour of homework nightly. When absent, students should be getting the information missed off Google Classroom.

Take good risks

Encourage your tween to try an activity that appeals

to her, even if she's a little nervous. Maybe she wants to join the crosscountry team but hasn't run longer distances. Or perhaps she's interested in the improv club but is hesitant about public speaking. Stepping out of her comfort zone will stretch her abilities and build confidence.

Agree to disagree

If your usually agreeable child starts poking holes in your opinions, that's a sign his reasoning skills are developing. Try not to take it personally, and ask him to share his views respectfully. He'll learn that it's okay to disagree, as long as he's polite about it.

Puzzle me this

Crossword puzzles boost your tween's vocabulary. Have her print free puzzles she finds online or get crossword books from a dollar store. Or she and her friends could make crosswords for each other on graph paper or with a website like puzzlemaker.discovery education.com.

A good attitude = more learning

Starting the year with a positive attitude about school goes a long way toward a student's success. Inspire your tween to develop a winning outlook with these strategies.

Look for positives

Your middle grader can find something interesting about every class. Suggest that he start a list of fun facts, one from each class every week. After a biology lesson on genetics, he might write, "I had a 50 percent chance of having blue eyes since Mom's are brown and Dad's are blue." Encourage him to share his discoveries with you.

Celebrate achievements

Tell your tween to congratulate himself on a job well done. Maybe he earned a higher score on this week's vocabulary quiz than he did on last week's. Or perhaps he picked a topic for his history paper, even though he was tempted to

put off getting started. Saying "I did it!" will make him feel good about himself and motivated to keep working hard.

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Seek help

Successful students know how to get help when they face challenges. For example, your child could post a schedule of teachers' office hours or homework-help sessions in his locker. Then if he's struggling, he can sign up for a slot. Having a plan in place will help him stay upbeat. €

Fall family fun

Strong parent-tween relationships help kids resist risky behaviors and make family life more enjoyable. Try these ideas.

■ Outings. Ask your child to find outings that sound fun, such as a fall festival or a paint night. For ideas, she could look in the newspaper or check library and community center websites. Tip: Suggest that she ask classmates where their families like to go on weekends.

Wanted: Involved parents

What does parent involvement look like in middle school? While you probably won't be volunteering in your child's classroom, she still wants your support (even if she doesn't act like she does). Consider these tips for being a partner in her education.



At school. Make it a priority to attend school events like curriculum nights and school plays. Also, look for ways to help that are related to your tween's activities. If she plays in the band, you could volunteer to set up for a concert. If she belongs to a book club, you might offer to shelve library books and talk to her afterward about

books you noticed. Or if she's an athlete, maybe you'll work at the concession stand during sporting events.

At home. Offer to quiz your middle grader on material she's studying or to look over a paper she's working on. To stay in the loop about what's happening in school, read the website regularly and sign up for email or text alerts. Mention the announcements to your child so she knows you're interested in her school. €\

Getting started with community service

Q My son is required to complete community service hours this year, but he can't decide what to do. How can I help him?



A Doing community service will let your son help others and gain work experience. The main office or his school counselor may have a list of places where he can volunteer. He could also ask friends, relatives, and neighbors for ideas.

Then, suggest that he choose a job that matches his interests—he'll get more out of it that way. For example, he might participate in a beach cleanup if he's concerned about the environment. Or if he likes working with younger children, he may play games or read with little ones at a homeless shelter while their parents attend job training.

Finally, encourage him to keep track of his work, including names of supervisors, so he'll receive credit-and even have references for a job someday.




The "elevator speech"
