# Absences, appointments, and messages


If your child will be absent from school, please call the office by **7:50** in the morning or you can call or send a note in advance. In the event you receive the voicemail, leave a message that includes your child's name, grade, and the reason for the absence. If your child is ill, **please be specific with his/her symptoms.** We are required by state law to report the number of students ill with strep throat, stomach flu, colds, and chicken pox, so it is important that we have accurate count. We do not report student names, just numbers. If your child's absence is not called in to the school in a timely manner, it is considered an unexcused absence and consequences may be assigned to the student.

You may also call ahead or send a note with any pre-planned absences, and we will document it. Therefore you will not have to call again the day of the absence.

If your child needs to be picked up for an appointment, please send a note or call the office ahead of time so that your child can be given an out pass in advance. We appreciate advance notification as it eliminates the need for us to try and find your child at the last minute when he/she is being picked up. If your child brings a note from the medical or dental appointment as verification, it is not counted toward the 10 days allowed for your child to be absent from school. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping your child's attendance up to date and informing the school of absences in a








# DOES YOUR CHILD HAVE A NUT OR LATEX ALLERGY?

Our schools are designated as latex-controlled schools. Materials that contain high concentrations of latex, such as most balloons, are prohibited. Our schools are also designated peanut/tree-nut aware. We ask that you do not send any foods that contain peanuts or tree-nuts (cashews, almonds, pecans, etc.). 


# Student Prop Off and Pick Up

Welcome to middle school. Your music class will take on a little different format by having music every day for a trimester. Let's meet your teachers.

Hi, I am Mrs. Kinstler, and I am new to the middle school this year and to teaching 5th grade. I've taught band and general music in Cashton, Bangor, and La Crosse. Along with 5th grade, I am teaching 6th grade Keyboards and More, 7th grade Guitars and Musicals, and band lessons for grades 6-8.

Hi, I am Ms. Nimm, and I'm starting my 17th year of teaching, all here at West Salem! Along with 5th grade, I also teach Choir (6, 7, 8), Soundscapes (7), and African Drumming (8).

Our classes will be based around the four main concepts of performing, creating, responding and connecting, so that will involve a lot of moving, singing, listening, and rhythm/pitch activities. We learn about songs reflecting American history and culture, as well as different holidays.





# MORE MUSIC!

## 6th Grade Keyboards and More

In Keyboards and More, students started the year off reviewing rhythms. They then got their own piano keyboard to start learning how to play piano and have already done one performance assessment on using the black keys on the keyboard. Students are now learning how to play music using middle C position and learning the names of the white keys. Next they will take a short break away from the keyboards and learn about traditional Chinese instruments and compose some music using traditional Chinese instruments in Garageband.

#### 7th Grade Guitars and Musicals

In Guitars and Musicals class, students started out learning the parts of the guitar and began playing single notes on the E string. Soon they will be learning the B string and reading music to perform short exercises on the guitar using those two strings.

## Welcome to 6th Grade!


Thank you for the great turnout at the open house. For those of you who couldn't make it or those of you who were overwhelmed with the amount of information, we wanted to remind you of a few things.

Personal responsibility is very important in middle school. If your child is absent, there are several ways to get caught up. Students should communicate with their teachers about what they missed, but they should also check Google Classroom, contact other students, and look at the Homework Hotline.

Speaking of homework, students should expect to have homework in math and reading on a daily basis. Math homework will be an extension of what is learned during class. Students will be given plenty of class time to work, but may have to take some math work home to complete it. Typically in reading, students are expected to read an independent reading book nightly for a minimum of 20 minutes or 20 pages. Most other classes will have homework on an intermittent basis. Please encourage your child to complete their homework the same night they had class so they are able to recall what they learned more readily.

During the first few weeks of school, the 6th grade team will be working with your student to make the transition run as smoothly as possible. Your child is in good hands!



## 8th Grade Mathematics

Welcome back! We will start the year getting to know each other through a student survey, math inventory, and spirolaterals. We are really looking forward to getting back into the routine of school!!!

## Regular Math (Unit 1) - Mrs. Coe and Mrs. Snook

This will be our first year in our new textbook series called "Big Ideas Math." This series exposes students to highly motivating and relevant problems. Woven throughout the series are the depth and rigor students need to prepare for career-readiness and other college-level courses. In addition, the "Big Ideas Math" series prepares students to meet the challenge of state testing.

## The learning targets for Chapter 1:

- → 1.1: Write and solve one-step equations
- → 1.2: Write and solve multi-step equations
- →1.3: Write and solve equations with variables on both sides
- →1.4: Solve literal equations for given variables

# Algebra (Unit 1 and 2) - Mrs. Coe

We will be reviewing some basic skills of algebra like solving linear equations while learning about absolute value and inequalities. We will start Mathcounts early in the month. Students will be required to complete Mathcounts problems as a daily warm up.

# The learning targets for Unit 1 and 2:

- →1.1: Write and solve equations.
- →1.6: Write and solve equations involving absolute value.
- →2.4: Write and solve inequalities.
- →2.5: Write and solve compound inequalities.
- →2.6: Write and solve inequalities involving absolute value.





# Grade 8 news (cont)

Eighth-grade Social Studies explores the history of our nation from the events that led to the American Revolution through the Civil War. Throughout the year, students will work to develop the skills which historians use each and every day-- analysis, research, critical thinking, and much more. Act 30 comes into effect this year, so the end of our year will include an exploration of the Holocaust and other genocides.

Our learning targets for September include:

- 8.HTS.1: Develop claims using evidence to support reasoning
- 8.HTS.2: Communicate and critique conclusions
- 8.CE.1 Express personal reactions to current events.
- 8.CE.2 Summarize current events.
- 8.PS.1: Evaluate primary and secondary sources to understand different viewpoints of an event
- 8.RR.1: Analyze the role of propaganda in spreading revolutionary ideas
- 8.RR.2: Compare and contrast the view of the loyalists and patriots
- 8.RR.3: Analyze the impact of important individuals on the events leading up to the American Revolution
- 8.RR.4: Justify the Patriots' decision to break away from Great Britain

You may notice you do not have a separate reading and English class this year. You will read and write everyday in ELA. Having the same class each day opens the door for unique opportunities of working with the other ELA class. We join together for various activities, specifically Book Clubs. Both ELA classes are planned together by Mrs. Meyer and Mrs. Sackett, so students in either class can expect the same content. The middle school is moving toward doing more team teaching. Team teaching provides many benefits for students: more adult help and connections, a variety of teaching styles, more feedback, and individualized attention. At the beginning of the year, we will get to know each other and classroom expectations. Once we have established our routine, we will begin digging into our own identities as readers, writers, and people. We look forward to a fun, fantastic, and fabulous school year!





## Spanish - Sra. Kirchner

Bienvenidos to Spanish in Middle School. I am Sra. Kirchner, the new Spanish teacher here at the middle school. I am from Barcelona, Spain and I am really excited to get to know all the students and share with them my language and my culture.

#### 6th Grade

Sixth grade Spanish will begin with basic conversation words and pronunciation. We will be able to introduce ourselves, use classroom phrases, and continue to add new vocabulary. I am going to try to teach as much Spanish as possible, so they get the most real experience they can!

#### 7th Grade

In seventh grade Spanish we will begin by reviewing and building our conversational skills. Students will use cognates to add more details to basic conversations and ask each other questions. #### 8th grade

The interviews are a really fun way to get to know each other and speak in Spanish!

#### Art - Mrs. Hemker

#### Grade 5

Welcome to MS grade 5 families! WE begin the trimester working on an abstract painting of our names. After that will be working on a variety of portraits. A painting of an animal that represents them is the first focus. Later this month, portraits will turn to a more realistic style where we will look at facial features and proportions.

#### Grade 6

As we begin the Trimester, 6th grade will be working on some mini-works in various styles. Our first project will include creating a portfolio for storage. Students will fill this portfolio with completed works by the end of the trimester. Our first large scale project will guide a review of material use by creating a portrait sampler. Students will then move on to some artist research and will create an informational poster as well as a parody.

#### Grade 7

7th graders will spend the month of September experimenting with drawing from different points of view. One of the projects will require students to create the entire drawing from start to finish by observing an inanimate object of their choice. We will also be working on a unit focusing on one point perspective.

#### Grade 8

Students in 8th grade will be working on projects that represent themselves this trimester. Our first project will be a design that will be considered for this year's class t-shirt. We will then move on to practicing Acrylic Paint techniques. 8th graders will also begin to design their wall block as a lasting way to represent their 8th grade self.

#### 8th Grade Elective

Welcome to Art Elective!!! Art Elective students will work with more in depth media technique as well as varied subject matter and creative problem solving strategies. They will create practice samplers of materials as well as completed pieces using these various techniques. Our first project is an individual response to the creation of a page for an alphabet book. Our first technique sampler will be with watercolor pencil.

The Healthy Living team is excited for another school year! We plan to get our students outside as often as possible, so please have your children prepare for that. In the mornings, the grass can still be a little wet, so having an extra pair of shoes to change into is helpful. We're looking forward to another year where we can help create lifelong movers!

#### Success Center

The Success Center is a resource room for students before and after school. Here, students can receive help from staff who attend WSMS classes and are equipped to walk students through information they may have missed or just do not understand. If students attend the Success Center, parents are responsible for transportation to and from school.

#### Homework

Students should expect to have homework in math and reading on a regular basis. Math homework will be an extension of what is learned during class. Students will be given class time to work, but most will have to take the homework home to complete. In reading, students are expected to read an independent reading book nightly for a minimum of 20 minutes. Most other classes will have homework on an intermittent basis. You should not expect more than an hour of homework nightly. When absent, students should be getting the information missed off Google Classroom.
