From the Office

Absences, appointments, and messages

If your child will be absent from school, please call the office at 608-786-2090, Option 1, by 7:50 a.m., or you can call/send a note in advance. In the event you receive the voicemail, leave a message that includes your child's name, grade, and the reason for the absence. If your child is ill, please be specific with his/her symptoms. We are required by state law to report the number of students ill with strep throat, stomach flu, colds, and chicken pox, so it is important that we have accurate information. We do not report student names, just numbers. If your child's absence is not called in to the school in a timely manner, it is considered an unexcused absence and consequences may be assigned to the student.

If your child needs to be picked up for an appointment, please send a note or call the office ahead of time so that your child can be given an out pass in advance. We appreciate prior notification as it eliminates the need for us to find your child at the last minute. If your child brings a note from the medical or dental appointment as verification, it is not counted toward the 10 days allowed for your child to be absent from school. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping your child's attendance up to date and informing the school of absences in a timely manner.








DOES YOUR CHILD HAVE A NUT OR LATEX ALLERGY?

We have several students in the district who have severe allergies to peanuts, tree-nuts and latex. For this reason we are asking that you follow the district policy below:

Our schools are designated as latex-controlled schools. Materials that contain high concentrations of latex, such as most balloons, are prohibited. Our schools are also designated peanut/tree-nut aware. We ask that you do not send any foods that contain peanuts or tree-nuts (cashews, almonds, pecans, etc.). If you have questions regarding any product or material you may wish to bring to the school, please contact the office or the school nurse before bringing the item into the school.



Student Drop Off and Pick Up

Buses will drop off students at the high school sidewalk then they will use the new sidewalk by the track/football field to walk to the middle school.

MUSIC

Grade 5 General Music

Students will be studying folk songs this trimester, and they started with reviewing the song "This Land is Your Land" by Woodie Guthrie. Personal responsibility is very important in middle school. If your child is absent, there are several ways to get caught up. Speaking of homework, students should expect to have homework in math and reading on a daily basis. Math homework will be an extension of what is learned during class. Typically in reading, students are expected to read an independent reading book nightly for a minimum of 20 minutes or 20 pages. Most other classes will have homework on an intermittent basis. Please encourage your child to complete their homework the same night they had class so they are able to recall what they learned more readily.



SOCIAL STUDIES- Ms. Morgan

Welcome to 8th Grade Social Studies! This year we will explore the history of our nation from the events that led to the American Revolution through the Civil War. Throughout the year, students will work to develop the skills which historians use each and every day— analysis, research, critical thinking, and much more. Beginning last school year Act 30 went into effect, so the end of our year will

include an exploration of the Holocaust and other genocides.

Our learning targets for September include:

- 8.HTS.2: Communicate and critique conclusions
- 8.CE.1 Express personal reactions to current events.

- 8.RR.2: Compare and contrast the view of the loyalists and patriots
- 8.RR.3: Analyze the impact of important individuals on the events leading up to the American Revolution
- 8.RR.4: Justify the Patriots' decision to break away from Great Britain

MATH 8- Mrs. Coe & Mrs. Snook

Welcome back! We will start the year getting to know each other through a student survey, math inventory, and spirolaterals. We are really looking forward to getting back into the routine of school!!!

This will be our second year in our new textbook series called "Big Ideas Math." This series exposes students to highly motivating and relevant problems. Woven throughout the series are the depth and rigor students need to prepare for career-readiness and other college-level courses. In addition, the "Big Ideas Math" series prepares students to meet the challenge of state testing.

The learning targets for Chapter 1:

- \rightarrow 1.3 (pt 1): Write and solve one-step equations
- \rightarrow 1.3 (pt 2): Write and solve multi-step equations
- \rightarrow 1.3 (pt 3): Write and solve equations with variables on both sides
- \rightarrow 1.4: Solve literal equations for given variables





ALGEBRA- Mrs. Coe

We will be reviewing some basic skills of algebra like solving linear equations while learning about absolute value and inequalities. We will start Mathcounts early in the month. Students will be required to complete mathcounts problems as a daily warm up.

The learning targets for Unit 1 and 2:

- \rightarrow 1.1: Write and solve equations.
- →1.6: Write and solve equations involving absolute value.
- \rightarrow 2.4: Write and solve inequalities.
- \rightarrow 2.5: Write and solve compound inequalities.
- \rightarrow 2.6: Write and solve inequalities involving absolute value.

Art - Mrs. Hemker

Grade 5

Welcome to the middle school, 5th grade families! This trimester, Mr. Ringlien and Mrs. Fink's classes will attend art. We begin the trimester working on an abstract painting of our names. After that, we will be working on a variety of portraits. A painting of an animal that represents them is the first focus. Later this month, portraits will turn to a more realistic style where we will look at facial features and proportions.



Grade 6

As we begin the trimester, 6th grade will be working on some mini-works in various styles. Our first project will include creating a portfolio for storage. Students will fill this portfolio with completed works by the end of the trimester. Our first large scale project will guide a review of material use by creating a portrait sampler. Students will then move on to some artist research and will create an informational poster as well as a parody.

Grade 7

7th graders will spend the month of September experimenting with drawings from different points of view. One of the projects will require students to create the entire drawing from start to finish by observing an inanimate object of their choice. We will also be working on a unit focusing on one point perspective.

Grade 8

Students in 8th grade will be working on projects that represent themselves this trimester. Our first project will be a design that will be considered for this year's class t-shirt. We will then move on to practicing acrylic paint techniques. 8th graders will also begin to design their wall block as a lasting way to represent their 8th grade self.

8th Grade Elective

Welcome to Art Elective!!! Art elective students will work with a more in-depth media technique, as well as varied subject matter and creative problem solving strategies. They will create practice samplers of materials, as well as completed pieces using these various techniques. Our first technique sampler will be focusing on the many uses of watercolor pencil. We will be working on a few different projects using this versatile material.



Engineering, Technologies and Careers (Formerly Tech Ed) Mr. Shrake

Welcome back to another year in the workshop. This year, Engineering, Technologies & Careers (formally known as Tech Ed) has moved into the trimester rotation with an addition of a new class called Panther Creations and Retail, which is available to 8th grade only.

This year, 6th graders will be designing their own websites to organize their educational journey at West Salem Middle, as well as an introduction to some of the tools and applications in the workshop.

7th graders will have their first experience in the workshop, as they will learn about all of the machines in the shop and complete a 4-week fiber project and 4-week woods project. September is focused mainly on measurement and safety exams. Please make sure your child has a pair of safety glasses for class.

8th grade will be working towards a final project of creating a LED sign that they will be able to build, wire, and customize themselves. The class will also be focusing on measurement and safety exams. Please make sure your child has a pair of safety glasses for class. Our new 8th grade Panther Time is taking over the school video announcements known as WSMS live. Working with staff, we have started off with some memorable moments, while creating captivating content for our students and staff to start the day.

Our 8th grade Panther Creations & Retail class is a year long class built around giving our students an introductory experience to entrepreneurship. This year is starting off with learning the tools in the shop and branding ourselves. We are also making staff t-shirts to start the year.

Recipe of the month

Bell Pepper Nachos

Serves 8

Ingredients:

- 4 bell peppers
- 1 cup salsa
- 2 teaspoons seasoning (try a mixture-chili powder, garlic powder, ground cumin, pepper)
- 2 cups cooked chicken, shredded, or chopped (or beans or tofu -- or try a combination)
- 3/4 cup cheddar cheese, shredded

Directions:

Wash hands with soap and water. Preheat oven to 350 °F. Wash bell peppers, remove seeds and cut into bite-sized pieces. Arrange pieces close together in a single layer on a large foil-lined baking sheet. In a medium bowl, combine salsa, seasonings and meat, beans or tofu. Spoon the mixture evenly over pepper pieces. Top with cheese. Bake for 15 minutes, or until peppers are heated through and cheese is melted. Serve warm.
