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MORNING PROCEDURES

Doors open at 7:30. At this time, students will be allowed into the building, or they may stay outside on the playground until 7:43, when the bell rings.

Students are expected to be in their classrooms and ready for instruction at 7:50.

Absences, appointments, and messages

If your child will be absent from school, please call the office by **7:50** in the morning. In the event you receive the voice mailbox, leave a message that includes your child's name, grade, and the reason for the absence. If your child is ill, **please be specific with his/her symptoms.** We are required by state law to report numbers of students ill with strep throat, stomach flu, colds, and chicken pox, so it is important that we have accurate count. We do not report student names, just numbers. If your child's absence is not called in to the school in a timely manner, it is considered an unexcused absence and consequences may be assigned to the student.

You may also call ahead or send a note to the office with any pre-planned absences. We will document it, and you will not have to call again on the day of the absence.

If you notify your student's teachers, PLEASE notify us as well, as sometimes the information doesn't make it to the office.

If your child needs to be picked up for an appointment, please send a note or call the office ahead of time so that your child can be given an out-pass in advance. We appreciate advance notification as it eliminates the need for us to find your child at the last minute when they are being picked up. If your child brings a note from the medical or dental appointment as verification, it is not counted toward the 10 days allowed for your child to be absent from school. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping your child's attendance up to date and informing the school of absences in a timely manner.

We receive many calls daily from parents asking us to relay messages to their children. Please make every attempt to relay these messages to your child before they leave for school.

Middle School Security...

The middle school doors will be locked during school hours of 8:00am - 3:10pm. When coming to the middle school, you will need to be buzzed into the building by using the button located on the east wall of the main entrance (on East Ave). Once you enter the building, please sign in the office.

Buses will drop off students at the high school sidewalk, then they will use the new sidewalk by the track/football field to walk to the middle school.

In the interest of your child's safety, all students dropped off or picked up by parents needs to take place on East Avenue. **Temporarily stopping your vehicle on Mark St. to have students get out is NOT safe**, as Mark St. is very busy during peak morning and afternoon hours.

Student Immunization Law Age & Grade Requirements to enter the 2021-2022 School Year

Ages Pre-K through 4 years: 4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 3 polio, 1MMR**, 3 Hep B**, 1 Varicella*

Grades K and 1 4 DTP/DtaP/DT, (1st dose after 1st birthday) 4 polio, 2MMR, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella*

Grade 5 4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 4 polio, 2MMR, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella*

Grades 6-12 4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 4 polio, 2MMR, 1 Tdap, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella


*Varicella is the chickenpox vaccine. Chickenpox disease history is also acceptable. **MMR is measles, mumps, and Rubella. Lab evidence of immunity is also acceptable for MMR or Hepatitis B.

Any student not up to date by the 30th day of school may be excluded from school by state statute. What you need to do to avoid exclusion is: • Provide school with month, day and year of the required immunizations

• Have your child immunized OR

• Sign a <u>waiver</u> (also available from School Nurse office)

• In the event of a communicable disease outbreak, such as measles, children who are not vaccinated are often required to stay home from school and school-related functions until the outbreak ends or they get vaccinated, for their safety.

While those feelings are difficult, it is important to trust that our children are resilient and can get through these little 'fires', in order for them to become 'fireproof'. We are more than happy to assist with this.

Lastly, we also love it when students just stop and say 'hi.' We like to hear about the positive things that are going on in their life, too! Please encourage your child to stop in 'down the hall'. We would love to see them and get to know them more!

Youth Risk Behavior Survey

WSMS (grades 6-8) will participate again this year in the Youth Risk Behavior Survey. The YRBS focuses on health-related behaviors that result in the most significant mortality, morbidity, and social problems during both adolescence and adulthood. These include many topics such as: diet and physical activity; alcohol, tobacco and drug use; sexual activity; access to food and housing; bullying and school safety; anxiety, stress and suicidality. In addition, the YRBS measures assets -- such as a sense of belonging and healthy relationships -- which have the power to protect youth from engaging in risk behaviors and help keep them safe, healthy and successful. Students will be taking this survey early November. More information about the YRBS will be sent out via Skyward.

Writing: Students have been working on brainstorming topics for free writing time and having stamina to write for long periods of time. Students have also been working on capital letters. They will be starting Narrative papers this month.

Word Work: Our word work program this year will consist of weekly instruction in 5th Grade sight words, grammar lessons, and spelling patterns. If it is a sight word week, we ask that the students be practicing words at home to prepare for their test at the end of the week. Students will have various homework assignments related to spelling and grammar.

Math: We will finish up our fraction unit in the beginning of October. Students will also be doing a mini-project related to the skills their learned in our first unit. We will start the second unit this month which focuses on adding and subtracting decimals. Kids are practicing math facts at school daily and are encouraged to practice these facts at home using the Timed Test app on their iPad or other resources from home.

Academic Updates

Reading: Students are continuing to choose great books to read and get into the habit of reading daily. We encourage all students to read an additional 20 minutes per day when not in class.

Science: Students have started the matter unit. They will cover concepts from atoms to the states of matter. They will get to do a lot of experiments as well.

Social Studies: Students are wrapping up their map skills unit which included global awareness. 5th grade concentrates on US history. One of the first units is learning about explorers heading over to the New World.

Homework Hotline: This tool is available on the school website. If you go under schools and click on the Middle School, then click on Academics you will see Homework Hotline listed. This is a shared google sheets document that every teacher updates at the beginning of the week. It will list the assignments that were assigned each day. Most are due the next day, but if they have a longer time to work on it, then the teacher will list the day it is due. This is extremely helpful if you child is sick or leaves school early. We usually leave the previous and current week up.







6th Grade

Math - Ms. McKinney and Mrs. Jehn

6th grade math is off to a great start! Students are reviewing concepts from previous years to be ready for new concepts this year. It would be beneficial for all students to review their multiplication and division facts, as these are vital for success in 6th grade math.

Students completed Chapter I at the start of October and took their first chapter test which covered topics such as powers and exponents, order of operations, greatest common factor, and least common multiple.

The rest of the month, we will work in chapter 2 which is all about fractions and decimals. Students will spend most of the month working in this chapter. By the end of the month and chapter, students will be able to multiply and divide fractions and mixed numbers as well as add, subtract, multiply, and divide decimals efficiently.

Accelerated Math - Mrs. Jehn

Students will have finished chapter I at the end of September and taken the first chapter test covering topics such as powers and exponents, order of operations, greatest common factor, and least common multiple.

They will complete chapter 2 by the start of October which is all about fractions and decimals. Students will be able to multiply and divide fractions and mixed numbers as well as add, subtract, multiply, and divide decimals efficiently.

Chapter 3 will take up the middle part of October which works on algebraic expressions and properties. At the end of this chapter, they will be able to write and evaluate algebraic expressions using the commutative, associative, and distributive properties.

The rest of the month of October will bring Chapter 4 - Areas of Polygons. Students will learn the areas of parallelograms, triangles, trapezoids, and composite figures. Students will also work with polygons in the coordinate plane.

Science: Mrs. Jarosh

Students have been working hard to freshen up their scientific skills. They have practiced measuring mass, temperature, density, and three ways of measuring volume. We have also been working on the importance and value of working with others. Science labs provide so many learning opportunities. In October, we will focus on the parts of the Scientific Method also called Science and Engineering Practices (SEP MS-I). Asking Questions and Defining Problems is the first step. Students will explore this first hand by asking questions to define a testable problem to set up and perform an "Alka Seltzer Lab".

Language Arts: Mrs. Buisman

6th grade English students will be continuing work on their narrative stories. Drafts will be finalized to tell their moments filled with details while staying in perspective of the narrator. Students will continue to practice mechanics of writing while writing quality sentences.

Social Studies: Mrs. Jeranek

Social Studies allows us to focus on non-fictional reading strategies to formulate a main idea and supporting details for better understanding of informational texts.

In September, we got to know each other and worked to improve our geographic skills. Map patterns had us analyzing various data on different types of maps. October will find us in the Paleolithic and Neolithic periods as well as the ancient civilization of Mesopotamia. Our focus will be on human-environmental interactions, movements of people and technological innovations of these various groups of people.

Standards Covered:

RI.6.2 Determine a central idea of a text and how it is conveyed through particular details; provide a summary of the text distinct from personal opinions or judgments.

Geog. I.a Map Use- Use various maps to ask and answer geographic questions

Geogl.B. Spatial Thinking- Interpret patterns in a variety of maps, charts, and graphs to display geographic information and explain relationships among them.

<u>Geog2.b.m Reasons People Move</u>- Analyze patterns of migration of various types (e.g., age, sex, ethnicity, race) in the community & country.

<u>Geog5.a.m Human Environment Interaction</u>- Analyze how technology interacts with the environment and how increased use of technology affects the burden/use of natural resources.

As we navigate through this school year, please remember to be patient with your learners and educators! I am blessed to have the opportunity to work with all 6th graders and many amazing people!

Reading – Mrs. Schultz

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We have started out the word work portion of the year with prefixes. Understanding what different prefixes, suffixes and roots mean will help students develop a larger and stronger vocabulary since the literature they will be reading in the future will include more sophisticated language. Each set of words follow similar routines. We start out by accessing our background knowledge and seeing what words are familiar to us. Students complete sorting activities, play games, and complete other practice activities using what I call their "cheat sheet". Each pair of words end with a quiz. We also have been discussing different learning styles (visual, auditory, and kinesthetic) and students are trying to figure out the best way they learn in order to be successful learners!

SSR and creating a regular routine of independent reading is another focus of 6th grade Reading. Students should be reading at least 20 pages or 20 minutes between class periods. If students read 20 pages every two days, a book of approximately 200 pages should be completed within a month or so. Students know to adjust their reading amount if their book is longer than 200 pages.

We have started a **15 Book Challenge** where students set a goal of how many books they will read this school year. Check in with your student to find out their goal! Some of the books counted will be class novels, but most will be independent. At the beginning of a new independent reading unit, I allow at least 2 class periods for students to browse Destiny Discover, go to the LMC, and choose a book they are interested in reading. My rule is they have to get at least 15-20 pages into a novel before abandoning it for another. This eliminates students picking up a new book each independent reading time, and ensures they will finish their "keeper". Their first choice read Book Critique is due early in October. In November, we will be focusing on the Action/Adventure genre.

The class novel we will begin mid-October, *Touching Spirit Bear*, falls under the genre of action/adventure. This class novel will be read within the class day. I provide the option of listening to the audio version or reading the book independently. This option accompanies only this first novel, the rest of our class novels will be independently read. Please make sure your student has a pair of **earbuds/headphones** that he or she can bring to school on a consistent basis. Students may be bringing their journals home to reflect on the day's reading, but the books stay at school.

Please encourage your child to be vigilant about using their assignment notebook, check emails once a week, and to look over Google Classroom information posted by all 6th grade teachers.

7th Grade

Language Arts - Ms. Friell

Classroom Supplies: All students are required to have a binder and two composition notebooks (one for grammar and one for writing). The binder and notebooks are left in the classroom so they are never lost and remain easily accessible.

Agendas/Lessons: A general plan is posted on the Homework Hotline. The specific plan (along with any materials) is posted in Google Classroom. If a student needs to miss school, please check GC for required work.

Each class period, we practice working on sentences and parts of speech. We reviewed nouns in September and are now moving to verbs and identifying complete sentences. As we prepare to write our own narratives this trimester, we have been reading and responding to a variety of short narratives as models.

Math 7- Mrs. Weber and Mrs. Piersma

It has been a great first month back!! It has been so wonderful to start the year out in person, together! We just finished up our first unit on integers. The kids learned how to work with negative numbers using all the operations. It can get a little confusing, but most seem to catch on quickly. We will move on to rational numbers, which means we will be working with fractions and decimals. Should be fun!!

Pre-Algebra- Mrs. Weber

Wow!! One month is already over. It always amazes me how quickly time goes, and it seems to get faster every year. This group of kids is off to a great start! I appreciate their hard work and great attitude. It should be a great year! We finished our first unit on equations already and moved onto inequalities. I told the kids we would be moving very quickly through this unit as it is a review for them. :)

Reading - Mrs. Rochester

During the month of October, seventh graders will be continuing to study greek and latin roots, and reading short fiction and nonfiction pieces. They will be studying the elements of fiction and nonfiction as well. We started <u>The Outsiders</u> at the end of September and we will continue into October. <u>The Outsiders</u> explores themes of family, friendship, and growing up. We will be reading the novel as a whole class, but they will be expected to read at home. In addition, the students will also be given an opportunity to listen to <u>The Outsiders</u> via Google Classroom. Finally, students will be expected to answer questions that pertain to each chapter.

Science - Mr. Baker

In science this year, we are starting small and then working our way up to the big stuff! We broke out the microscopes and started looking at all the things we don't normally get to see. Students have been working on building their own three dimensional cells and spent a day at the Trempealeau Wildlife Refuge and Perrot State Park! We went canoeing, hiked up Brady's Bluff, searched the muck for macroinvertebrates, and used all our senses to make observations of the world around us!

Social Studies - Mr. Mahlum

In October, the students will finish up the unit on immigration. Then, we will turn our attention to the beginning of our nation. We will look at what led up to the Revolutionary War and how we started out as a newly independent nation. Towards the end of October, we will start looking at the Constitutional Convention and how the people there created the document we still follow today.

Science - Ms. Smith-Waller

The first month of school has already passed us by, how is that possible?!? After reviewing the steps of the Scientific Method (PHEOC), we started our Weather unit where we made observations both on maps and of the current weather we saw outside. We have collected data on the weather and now we will use that information to make a prediction. We will spend the rest of the month learning about the Earth's surface and how it changes through weathering, erosion, and deposition. Please don't hesitate to contact me with questions or concerns.

Essential Learning Outcomes:

- Planning and Carrying Out Investigations: Collect data to produce data to serve as the basis for evidence to answer scientific questions or test design solutions under a range of conditions.
 - MS-ESS2-5: Collect data to provide evidence for how the motions and complex interactions of air masses results in changes in weather conditions.
- Construct a scientific explanation based on valid and reliable evidence obtained from sources and the assumption that theories and laws that describe nature operate today as they did in the past and will continue to do so in the future.
 - Construct an explanation based on evidence for how geoscience processes have changed Earth's surface at varying time and spatial scales.

Social Studies - Ms. Morgan

October brings us to our study of the American Revolution. We will delve deeper into not just the battles but the human story of those living during the time period. We explore how this era produced many of the founding documents that still govern our democracy today. We've looked at the causes leading to the Revolution, including a close look at the trial transcripts from the Boston Massacre Trial.

When we have completed our study, students should be able to:

- 1. Discuss the causes of the American Revolution
- 2. Explain why some colonists supported the patriots and others supported England in our fight for independence
- 3. Describe how the American Revolution shaped the history of our country.

English/Language Arts - Ms. Meyer and Ms. Sackett.

Things are rolling in 8th grade ELA as we have gotten into our routine which includes both reading and writing each day. Our theme for the year is diversity; we are starting with personal identity. Students will continue to read a variety of texts and relate them to their own identity while writing paragraphs to understand their identity and how it changes. One book we have started that connects to identity is this year's middle school Global Read Aloud, *The Barren Grounds*. We are listening to the book in class and connecting with other schools from the United States and Canada who are also reading it.

Math - Mrs. Coe & Mrs. Bentzen

Regular Math (Chapters 2 & 3) Mrs. Bentzen and Mrs. Coe

We began Chapter 2 called "Transformations" at the end of September, and will be taking our test mid-October. We will then complete Chapter 3 called "Angles and Triangles."

The objectives of Chapter 2:

- *identify congruent figures and name corresponding parts (angles and sides) of congruent figures
- *identify translations and translate figures in the coordinate plane *identify reflections and reflect figures in the x-axis and y-axis of the
- coordinate plane
- *identify rotations and rotate figures in the coordinate plane *identify similar figures and name corresponding angles and sides *find unknown measures of similar figures
- *understand the relationship between perimeters and areas of similar figures, and find ratios of those perimeters and areas *identify dilations and dilate figures in the coordinate plane *use more than one transformation to find images of figures

The objectives for Chapter 3:

- *identify the angles formed when parallel lines are cut by a transversal
- $^{\ast}\mbox{find}$ the measure of the angles formed when parallel lines are cut by transversals
- *understand that the sum of the interior angle measures of a triangle is 180 degrees
- *find the measures of interior and exterior angles of triangles *find the sum of the interior angle measures of polygons
- *understand that the sum of the exterior angle measures of a any polygon is 360 degrees
- *find the measures of interior and exterior angles of polygons *understand the concept of similar triangles
- *identify similar triangles
- *use indirect measurement to find missing measures

Algebra (Chapters 4 & 5) - Mrs. Bentzen

We will be completing Chapter 4 "Graphing Linear Equations and Functions" in mid-October. We will then begin Chapter 5 called "Writing Linear Equations." We will continue with our weekly Mathcounts sheets.

The objectives of Chapter 4:

- *identify and plot points in a coordinate plans
- *graph linear equations in a coordinate plane
- *graph linear equations using intercepts
- *find slope of a line and interpret slope as a rate of change
- *graph linear equations using slope-intercept form
- *write and graph direct variation equations
- *use function notation

The objectives for Chapter 5:

- *write equations of lines in slope-intercept form given the slope and y-intercept, the slope and a point, or two points *write and graph equations using slope and a point, using a graph of a line or using real-world data
- *write equations of lines in standard form and use those equations to solve real-world problems
- *write and find equations of lines parallel or perpendicular to a given line
- *make scatterplots of data and use a line of fit to model and interpret data
- *perform linear regression to find the best-fitting line for data *make predictions using the graph and the equation

Music 5 - Mrs. Glasel (Kjos) and Ms. Nimm (Burdick)

Our music standards are based on 4 concepts - Perform, Create, Respond, and Connect, and all year we will be doing activities that focus on these areas.

To begin the year, we searched for our singing voices with a lot of welcome songs including "Good Morning" and "Hello to All The Children of the World" which includes some foreign words to greet each other. We start every class with a song, so ask your child to sing "America", "Fifty Nifty United States", "America, the Beautiful", "God Bless America", and "God Bless the U.S.A."

Beat and rhythm are big topics in our class. Many activities from playing instruments, pulling a rope, doing body percussion, and playing rhythm sticks reinforce those concepts.

We connected to history by learning about the characteristics of folk music. We played the autoharps on "This Land is Your Land" and "Cumberland Mountain Bear Chase" which also stressed the verse - refrain/chorus form. We played the barred instruments on "Erie Canal" and learned about sea shanties with "Haul Away Joe, "Goin' to Boston", and "The Wellerman". We learned the importance of singing these work songs to help the workers accomplish their jobs.

At the end of the month, we learned our state and school song to get us ready to celebrate Homecoming. Oktoberfest time gave us an opportunity to learn about some German culture, including dancing the polka and singing a song that counts to 7 in German.

Keyboards and More 6 - Mrs. Glasel

Music Reading - The students have been learning pitch names in the treble and bass clefs, as well as basic rhythms (notes and rests) and terms. They have been doing a lot of activities to review these concepts in preparation for playing the keyboards.

Music Appreciation - The students did a survey so that I could see their level of interest when it comes to music in their lives. It was interesting to hear the variety of opinions on how and why music is or isn't important to them. They also learned about me through a Musical Me Padlet project, and then they created one of their own. Ask your child to show it to you. We also read articles in our <u>Music Alive</u> magazines on marching bands and the polka. This month will focus on the article about song parodies which will lead us into writing our own parody using a music writing program.

Guitars and Musicals 7 - Mrs. Glasel

Musicals - The students have begun to learn about the different components of a musical, the role of the music in musicals, and about Broadway. This month we will start watching a musical called <u>Hello, Dolly</u>.

Guitars - The students have also begun to play their guitars. So far, they have only learned the 1st string and using only open string, first finger and third finger on the frets to play E, F and G, respectively.

Some students have asked if they could take the guitars home. Even though it is not a requirement since they have enough time in class to practice, they may do so as long as they know they are responsible for the proper care and handling of the guitar and bring it back on days that we have class.

Band - Mr. Waldhart

Spanish - Mrs. Phillips

6th Grade

In October, students will work on describing themselves and friends. They will read several short stories in Spanish using the descriptive vocabulary and we will listen to the popular song Soy Yo. By the end of this unit students will be able to answer the question: ¿Cómo eres?

7th Grade

Students are continuing to expand their vocabulary. Students will be working with ser, negative words and tener to describe themselves and things around them using new vocabulary and cognates. We will be using Señor Wooly stories to expand on the content.

8th Grade

Students are learning to discuss things they like, dislike and foods! We will discuss many things that we do and compare with each other. In addition to learning ways to discuss food likes and dislikes, students will also learn about authentic recipes in Mexico and other Spanish speaking countries. We are continuing to work on our special person interviews.

Spanish 1/8th Grade Elective

Students are working on the SUPER 7 verbs as they correspond with the 8th Grade Spanish units. We have covered two and will move on to "gustar-like" verbs this month. Students are doing a great job building on their vocabulary, reading, and interpreting short stories.

Grade 5

We will begin October with students finishing up their pop art portraits and realistic self portraits. 5th graders will have an opportunity to experience clay this month. They will create a pinch pot animal and also create a cupcake container. Both projects will be a review of a variety of clay techniques that they have learned since they were in Kindergarten. Both of these projects will also be glazed before a second firing. We will then move on to a variety of drawing practice projects and the creation of a handmade book to store them all in.

Grade 6

In October, 6th grade will also be working in clay. They will be working on a new technique that involves carving a solid form to create a container. They will also be creating a clay animal rattle or whistle. We will also be working on a variety of drawing projects, and if the weather continues to cooperate, we will be going outside to draw.

Grade 7

This month, 7th graders will complete their one point perspective work. We will also be working on a drawing that includes three different styles in one piece. Our final piece will be a collage painting using magazine pages to add the color to the drawings that we create.

Grade 8

Students in 8th grade will soon begin their wall block designs. They continue to work with acrylic paint to create two large scale abstract paintings that will be woven into a final piece of art. They have also started using Google Drawings to create a mosaic piece of digital art. Hopefully these classes will also be able to spend a few days drawing in the open air as well as a bit of clay time.

We begin the month by completing our altered clocks. These were incredibly creative interpretations on a variety of interesting themes and were created using a wide variety of tools and materials. - Only use tablets or devices in common areas at home.
- Use the privacy settings to keep your child's account private.
- Pause before you post. Remember, yours and your child's digital footprint lives forever.
- Remind teens to only friend people you know IRL (in real life), even if you have multiple mutual friends. They should not respond to anyone that they don't know.
- Don't share sensitive information about yourself or your family online. GPS and location services can pinpoint exactly where you are, alerting predators.
- Tell children not to give their password to anyone but their parents or primary caregiver. As their guardians, you do have the right to check their social media, texts and other apps.
- Kids should choose usernames and passwords that don't give out personal information. A child should never use their first and last name in their handles, this makes it easier for predators to locate them.
- Children should never agree to see someone in person that they "met" online.
- If your child sees any type of mean texts or cyberbullying, tell them to not respond or participate. Tell an adult immediately.

NUTRITION INFO

One medium apple has 95 calories and provides vitamin C, potassium and fiber.

PICK

Choose apples that are firm with no bruises or soft spots. Color may vary depending on variety – not an indicator of ripeness. Apples can be sweet, tart or in between!

STORE

Apples can be stored at room temperature for a few days or in a plastic bag in the refrigerator for a few weeks.

PREPARE

Wash before eating. Leave the skin on for best nutritional value! Dip sliced apples in a mixture of lemon juice and water to prevent browning.

USE

Sliced apples can be added to sandwiches and wraps. Try granny smith apple slices on a grilled cheese sandwich! Slices can be dipped in peanut butter, yogurt, caramel, and fruit dip.

Warm Cinnamon Apples

Serves 6

Ingredients:

- 4 large apples, sliced
- 2 Tbsp. brown sugar or maple syrup
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- ¹/₄ tsp. ground nutmeg
- 2 Tbsp. water
- 1 Tbsp. butter

Directions:

In a large bowl, combine apples, syrup/sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. In a medium saucepan, cook apple mixture, water and butter over medium heat. Stir occasionally for 8-10 minutes or until apples are tender.


