It's been a strong start to the 2021-2022 school year! We are looking forward to working together as a team to provide your child the very best educational experience. On our first day, we focused on getting to know our students and familiarizing them with our procedures and expectations. Some items that were highlighted with students were....

Now, grades 5-8 behavioral/life skills grades will be assessed and reported out using defined rubrics. We are calling this <u>P.A.W.s.</u> (click on the link). This stands for .....
  - 1. **PRACTICE KINDNESS**
  - 2. ACT RESPECTFULLY
  - 3. WORK HARD

Please reference this information within the Newsletter and the previous link. Each teacher will report out a score for their classroom on report cards. We're excited to report out not just student academic progress, but also how they are showing their PANTHER PRIDE in the classroom.

WSMS is committed to ensuring a positive learning environment for all. This commitment comes with a focus on learning, consistent attendance, and adherence to the school rules. Consistency in these three areas will allow our students the opportunity to develop the positive habits that will make them successful young adults. ### **MORNING PROCEDURES**

Doors open at 7:30. At this time, students will be allowed into the building, or they may stay outside on the playground until 7:43, when the bell rings.

Students are expected to be in their classrooms and ready for instruction at 7:50.

#### Middle School Security...

The middle school doors will be locked during school hours of 8:00am - 3:10pm. When coming to the middle school, you will need to be buzzed into the building by using the button located on the east wall of the main entrance (on East Ave). Once you enter the building, please sign in the office.





### Absences, appointments, and messages

If your child will be absent from school, please call the office by **7:50** in the morning, or you can call or send a note in advance. In the event you receive the voice mailbox, leave a message that includes your child's name, grade, and the reason for the absence. If your child is ill, **please be specific with his/her symptoms.** We are required by state law to report numbers of students ill with strep throat, stomach flu, colds, and chicken pox, so it is important that we have accurate count. We do not report student names, just numbers. If your child's absence is not called in to the school in a timely manner, it is considered an unexcused absence and consequences may be assigned to the student.

You may also call ahead or send a note with any pre-planned absences, and we will document it. Therefore you will not have to call again the day of the absence.

If your child needs to be picked up for an appointment, please send a note or call the office ahead of time so that your child can be given an out pass in advance. We appreciate advance notification as it eliminates the need for us to try and find your child at the last minute when he/she is being picked up. If your child brings a note from the medical or dental appointment as verification, it is not counted toward the 10 days allowed for your child to be absent from school. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping your child's attendance up to date and informing the school of absences in a timely manner.

We receive many calls daily from parents asking us to relay messages to their children. Please make every attempt to relay these messages to your child before he or she leaves for school.

### **Student Drop Off and Pick Up**

Buses will drop off students at the high school sidewalk then they will use the new sidewalk by the track/ football field to walk to the middle school.

In the interest of your child's safety, all students dropped off or picked up by parents needs to take place on East Avenue. **Temporarily stopping your vehicle on Mark St. to have students get out is NOT safe**. Mark St. is very busy during peak morning and afternoon hours.

Please pull forward all the way to the end of the sidewalk to drop off your child so that more cars can get out of the street and in to the lot.

#### Student Immunization Law Age & Grade Requirements to enter the 2021-2022 School Year

Ages Pre-K through 4 years: 4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 3 polio, 1MMR\*\*, 3 Hep B\*\*, 1 Varicella\*

**Grades K and 1** 4 DTP/DtaP/DT, (1st dose after 1st birthday) 4 polio, 2MMR, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella\*

**Grade 5** 4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 4 polio, 2MMR, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella\*

**Grades 6-12** 4 DTP/DtaP/DT, 4 polio, 2MMR, 1 Tdap, 3 Hep B, 2 Varicella

\*Varicella is the chickenpox vaccine. Chickenpox disease history is also acceptable. \*\*MMR is measles, mumps, and Rubella. Lab evidence of immunity is also acceptable for MMR or Hepatitis B.

Any student not up to date by the 30th day of school may be excluded from school by state statute. What you need to do to avoid exclusion is: • Provide school with month, day and year of the required immunizations

• Have your child immunized OR

• Sign a <u>waiver</u> (also available from School Nurse office)

• In the event of a communicable disease outbreak, such as measles, children who are not vaccinated are often required to stay home from school and school-related functions until the outbreak ends or they get vaccinated, for their safety.

ALLERGY ALLER

We have several students in the district who have severe allergies to peanuts, tree-nuts and latex. For this reason we are asking that you follow the district policy below:

Our schools are latex-controlled schools. Materials that contain high concentrations of latex, such as most balloons, are prohibited. Our schools are also peanut/tree-nut aware. Please do not send any foods that contain peanuts or tree-nuts (cashews, almonds, pecans, etc.). Please contact the office or the school nurse w/questions regarding any product or material you may wish to bring to the school before bringing the item into the school.

### Welcome to 6th Grade!

Thank you for the great turnout at the open house. For those of you who couldn't make it, or those of you who were overwhelmed with the amount of information, we wanted to remind you of a few things.

Personal responsibility is very important in middle school. If your child is absent, there are several ways to get caught up. Students should communicate with their teachers about what they missed, but they should also check Google Classroom, call or email friends, and look at the <u>Homework Hotline</u>.

Google Classroom is an educational app we use to inform students of homework, assessments, classroom activities, etc. Students are also able to view information from classes they may have missed and will need to make up.

Speaking of homework, students should expect to have homework in math and reading on a daily basis. Math homework will be an extension of what is learned during class. Students will be given plenty of class time to work but may have to take some math work home to complete it. Typically in reading, students are expected to read an independent reading book nightly for a minimum of 20 minutes or 20 pages. Most other classes will have homework on an intermittent basis. Please encourage your child to complete their homework the same night they had class so they are able to recall what they learned more readily.

During the first few weeks of school, the 6th grade team will be working with your student to make the transition run as smoothly as possible. Your child is in good hands!

#### Google Classroom

**Homework**- Students will usually have time to start homework during class. However, there will be times when the students need to finish work at home. Please have a reliable method for you to keep track of your homework- it could be an assignment notebook, planner, or some other way to keep track of homework.



#### Note from Mr. Mahlum, 7th Grade Social Studies:

We will start our year with an introduction to government. We will examine the reasons why we have a government as well as introduce the three different levels of government we have in the United States; Federal, State, and Local. Towards the middle of the month, we will start understanding what it means to be a citizen and how one becomes a citizen here in the U.S. Finally, the students will start to research a particular group of immigrants who have come to our country. Many students will look towards their own ancestry for an immigrant group to learn more about.

#### Science - Ms. Smith-Waller

Welcome back everyone! I am so excited to be starting another new year at West Salem Middle School. I hope you enjoyed the summer break and are eager for a fun-filled year in 8th grade science. We are going to have a great time learning all about the Earth and its systems! Before we dig into learning about many aspects of our amazing planet Earth, we will briefly refresh our memories on how to become better scientists. To do this, we will take a look at some Science and Engineering Practices (SEPs) to help us in the process of thinking like a scientist. Then we will begin our Weather unit where we will make observations and predictions. Please don't hesitate to contact me with questions or concerns, and once again, welcome!

Essential Learning Outcomes:

- Planning and Carrying Out Investigations: Collect data to produce data to serve as the basis for evidence to answer scientific questions or test design solutions under a range of conditions.
  - MS-ESS2-5: Collect data to provide evidence for how the motions and complex interactions of air masses results in changes in weather conditions.



#### Social Studies - Ms. Morgan

Eighth grade Social Studies explores the history of our nation from the events that led to the American Revolution through the Civil War. Throughout the year, students will work to develop the skills which historians use each and every day-- analysis, research, critical thinking, and much more.

Following their learning in September, students will be able to:

- Explain what history is and why it is important to study
- Describe important facts (who, what, when, where, why) of current events
- Begin to develop an argument about whether the colonists were justified in revolting.

Unless COVID results in conflicts, students will once again be researching and developing a National History Day project that focuses on this year's theme "Debate and Diplomacy in History". Students may choose a historical topic of their choice as long as it occurred 25 years or more ago and students can prove how the topic meets this year's theme. Upon completion of their research, students will present their findings in the form of one of the following: exhibit, website, documentary, historical paper, or performance. The best projects from WSMS will participate in the regional competition hosted by UW-La Crosse in mid-March.

#### English/Language Arts - Ms. Meyer and Ms. Sackett.

You may notice you do not have a separate reading and English class this year. We will be combining reading and writing daily. We get to have class every day instead of every other day! Another change is that you will have two teachers. You will report to the teacher's room that appears on your schedule; however, throughout the year, you will be switching between classes occasionally . The middle school is moving toward doing more team teaching. Team teaching provides many benefits for students: more adult help and connections, a variety of teaching styles, more feedback, and individualized attention. At the beginning of the year, we will get to know each other and classroom expectations. Once we have established our routine, we will begin digging into our own identities as readers, writers, and people. We look forward to a fun, fantastic, and fabulous school year!





# From the 8th Grade Team

#### Math - Mrs. Coe & Mrs. Bentzen

Welcome back! We will start the year getting to know each other through a student survey, math inventory, and spirolaterals. We are really looking forward to getting back into the routine of school!!!

#### Regular Math (Chapter I) - Mrs. Bentzen and Mrs. Coe

This will be our eighth year in our textbook series called "Big Ideas Math." This series exposes students to highly motivating and relevant problems. Woven throughout the series are the depth and rigor students need to prepare for career-readiness and other college-level courses. In addition, the "Big Ideas Math" series prepares students to meet the challenge of state testing.

The objectives for Chapter I:

\*solve simple equations using addition, subtraction, multiplication or division

\*use inverse operations to solve multi-step equations

\*use Distributive Property to solve multi-step equations

\*solve equations with variables on both sides

\*determine whether equations have no solution or infinitely many solutions

\*rewrite equations to solve for one variable in terms of the other variable(s)

#### Algebra (Quick Review of Chapters I and 2, Chapter 3) - Mrs. Bentzen

We will be practicing some basic skills of algebra while learning abut the real number system. We will solve linear equations. We will start Mathcounts early in the month. Students will be required to complete a problem solving worksheet every week.

The objectives for Chapter I:

\*write and evaluate expressions, equations and inequalities

\*apply the order of operations to solve real world problems

\*represent functions as rules and as tables

\*graph functions given a rule or table of values

The objectives of Chapter 2:

\*classify real numbers/compare and order integers and rational numbers

\*perform basic operations and find square roots

\*apply properties to evaluate and simplify expressions

\*use the Distributive Property to write equivalent expressions

\*use conditional statements and logical reasoning to reason with real numbers

The objectives of Chapter 3:

\*use properties of equality to solve one-step, two-step and multi-step equations in one variable \*use properties of equality and the distributive property to solve equations with variables on both sides \*write ratios and proportions, solve proportions using cross products \*solve percent problems, such as finding the percent of a number, a base, and part of a base \*rewrite equations in function form \*solve formulas and literal equations for one variable

Welcome to Spanish class, sixth graders! Sixth grade Spanish will begin with basic conversation words and pronunciation. We will be able to introduce ourselves, use classroom phrases, and continue to add new vocabulary. In the month of September, we celebrate Hispanic Heritage month by learning about individuals that have influenced our country! I look forward to meeting you all! ¡Bienvenidos!

#### 7th Grade

¡Hola! In seventh grade Spanish we will begin by reviewing and building our conversational skills. Students will use cognates to add more details to basic conversations and ask each other questions. We will also discuss and compare the weather in Spanish speaking countries. ¿Qué tiempo hace? I am looking forward to seeing you all again!

#### 8th Grade

¡Bienvenidos! We have accomplished a lot so far in middle school Spanish and we will continue to build on our skills In eighth grade. We will use our conversational skills by having simple conversations in Spanish. During the month of September we will be conducting "Special Person Interviews." The interviews are a really fun way to get to know each other and speak in Spanish!. Our cultural focus will be Hispanic Heritage month which begins September 15. ¡Hasta pronto!

#### Spanish 1/8th Grade Elective

¡Hola! In the month of September, Spanish I we will expand on everything we are working on in 8th grade Spanish. Reading stories as a group will be a significant part of our class. We will learn about the SUPER 7 verbs and include them in our daily activities. I am very excited to see you all grow and build on your Spanish skills throughout the school year!

#### Healthy Living - Mr. Brewer, Mrs. Olson, Mr. Reader, Ms. Serres

Welcome back! We are excited to get the new school year started. A few reminders for all students are that we will be going outside as much as possible so please bring the proper footwear and clothing for class (morning classes will get a bit chilly towards the end of October and beginning of November). Speaking of footwear, all students must have athletic footwear for class every day they have Healthy Living. Crocs are not athletic footwear, even if they have the adventure strap up! 7th and 8th grade students will be assigned PE lockers and will have the option to have athletic clothing/shoes stored in there so they do not have to plan their outfits for days that they have Healthy Living. Changing for class will be encouraged, but not required. We have a lot of fun life-long activities planned for you this year!

#### The Healthy Living department is accepting any lightly used shoes if anyone is willing to donate, as our inventory of shoes has gotten low.







## Art - Mrs. Hemker

While the start of this year will certainly look a little different than it usually does, we still plan to work on as many topics/units/projects as we would under regular circumstances in art. We have a large space to spread out to work, we are getting creative with materials and looking forward to seeing students back in the studio! All grades will be creating a "zine", and we look forward to learning more about that. In addition to those, each grade has other topics to consider, those are listed below.

#### Grade 5

Welcome to MS grade 5 families! This month 5th graders will be working on a variety of portraits. A painting of a dog or another animal that represents them is the first focus. WE will also be creating postcard designs looking to create our new P.A.W. logo. Also this month, portraits will turn to a more realistic style where we will look at facial features and proportions.

#### Grade 6

As we begin the Trimester, 6th grade will be working on some mini-works in various styles. Our first project will include creating a portfolio for storage. Students will fill this portfolio with completed works by the end of the trimester. Our first large scale project will guide a review of material use by creating a portrait sampler. Students will then move on to some artist research and will create an informational poster as well as a parody.

#### Grade 7

7th graders will spend the month of September experimenting with drawing from different points of view. One of the projects will require students to create the entire drawing from start to finish by observing an inanimate object of their choice. We will also be working on observational drawings of shoes, which will include a shading review.

#### Grade 8

Students in 8th grade will be working on projects that represent themselves this trimester. Our first project will be a design that will be considered for this year's class t-shirt. The next will be a Poster featuring a quote that describes them. The poster will include a hand written font. 8th graders will also begin to design their wall block as a lasting way to represent their 8th grade self.

#### **8th Grade Elective**

During this year long experience, students will work in many mediums and in many styles. We will begin with some dry drawing tools, such as pencil, color pencil and tube inks. We have so many things to explore, I am looking forward to working with them.

### **STEM Encore**

In 6th grade STEM, students will be learning about the design process and developing a foot orthosis prototype for a student in need for their first project. This project gives the 6th graders a good introduction to what STEM is and how to use the design process in all of their projects in the future. In 7th grade STEM, we will be learning about multiview sketches and technical drawings. We will then use what we've learned to design and create a puzzle cube out of wood. In 8th grade STEM, we will be designing and building a paper coaster project. This is a fun friendly competition to see who can make the marble last the longest while spending the least for materials.

#### Robotics

For the month of September, we will be researching various robots and designs that are used in the real world today. Students will have their eyes opened on how much technology is used in their everyday lives. # Back-to-school questions, answered

The start of a new school year is an exciting time. But the disruptions this year may have left you wondering how to help your tween do her best. Here are answers to questions from parents like you.

#### Q: My tween is struggling to get back into learning mode this school year. What can I do?

A: Children—and adults—face many distractions in the era of COVID-19. Help your child get on track by showing enthusiasm for what he is learning, whether it's in school or online. You might watch a movie that's set in an era he's studying in history or ask him to explain an engineering project he's working on.



# Q: With all the COVID-19 news, my daughter is a little nervous about school. What should I say?

A: Getting the facts may help your child feel better. Ask what, specifically, she's concerned about. If she has a question you can't answer, look it up together. Explain that by following rules—even hard ones for middle graders like social distancing from friends—she reduces her risk of getting sick or spreading germs to you, her grandparents, and others.



#### **Q**: My child is concerned that she won't remember what she learned last year. How can I help?

A: Explain to your tween that her classmates are in the same situation. Teachers know that students may need to review last year's work, such as math formulas or Spanish vocabulary, before moving on to new material. If your child doesn't understand something, encourage her to speak up. Her teacher will understand—and provide support.

Want to learn about your tween's day while putting a smile on everyone's face? During

dinner, pose upbeat questions like "What made you happy today?" or "What are you looking forward to this week?" *Idea*: Ask your child to come up with tomorrow's questions.

### Middle school: A parent's role

When my daughter was in elementary school, I was very active in her school life. Now that she's older, should I still be so involved?

Research shows that students of all ages do better when their parents are involved. But that involvement may look a little different now that your daughter is in middle school. For instance, she's expected to take more

responsibility for her learning. So you might offer to brainstorm ideas for a project, but let her choose the topic. Or if she's not sure how to approach an assignment, encourage her to ask her teacher for help rather than having you reach out for her.

On the other hand, some things will look the same. Attend back-to-school night and parent-teacher conferences, just as you did when she was in elementary school. Introduce yourself to your child's teachers, and ask how they prefer to be contacted. Finally, visit the school website and sign up to receive emails—then be sure to check the site and your inbox regularly for news. receive = 1

# **Organized from the start**

In middle school, staying organized is one of the most important steps to success. Help your child stay on top of his schoolwork with these strategies.

**Use a planner.** Make sure your tween has a planner—and takes advantage of it. He should write in assignment deadlines, study sessions, and test dates. Then he could estimate and enter the time he'll spend on each task. That will help him plan work sessions.



**File everything.** Setting up and using a filing system means your tween will always find what he needs. He might choose a different-color folder for each class. Or he could have one folder for notes and assignments and another for completed work. *Tip:* Suggest that he turn a shower caddy into a portable school-supply station.

#### Invest 10 minutes each day.

Encourage your child to take five minutes before school to consult his planner and check that he has

what he needs for that day. After school, he can spend five minutes filing papers and throwing away anything he doesn't need.  $\leq 2$ 



My son Matthew can be really hard on himself.

When he was eliminated early during last year's spelling bee, he called himself a "failure" and said he wouldn't enter this year.

His English teacher told Matthew she hoped he'd try again. In fact, she encouraged him to look at the setback as an opportunity to build "resilience" (the ability to bounce back

from tough situations). Following the teacher's lead, I asked Matthew to tell me what he'd learned from the spelling bee. He said he had trouble with the words that came from French. Then he said he guessed he could spend more time studying those words for this year's bee.

To try to build up his resilience, I'm encouraging Matthew to take chances with other things that interest him. For

instance, he recently took up baking. When he frosted his first cake before it cooled and the icing melted down the sides, he learned that slipups aren't the end of the world. That messy cake still tasted great!

Uses

Fresh cut tomatoes can be added to salads, sandwiches, or wraps.

When making guacamole, substitute <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> of the avocado with tomato.

For an easy side, try grilling tomato halves brushed with olive oil.

#### **Stuffed Quinoa Beefsteak Tomatoes**

Serves 4

#### Ingredients:

1 Tbsp. olive oil
 ½ cup diced white onion
 1 glove garlic, diced
 ½ cup quinoa
 1 tsp. basil
 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
 1 cup vegetable stock
 ¼ cup diced broccoli
 4 large tomatoes

#### **Directions:**

Add olive oil to the bottom of a sauce pan. Sauté onions and garlic on low heat until the onions are translucent. Add quinoa, basil, lemon juice, and stock and bring to a boil. Turn to low heat and allow quinoa to absorb all the water (about 20 minutes). Stir in broccoli to the quinoa mix. Cut open the top of the tomatoes and remove the seeds. Fill the space inside the tomato with the quinoa broccoli mixture and bake in the oven for 15 minutes.
